Of course it is our hope that education of the public will lead to preservation of Village treasures. We do not want there to be any misunderstanding of our role and purpose.

## Dot Rixey Recollection

Below are some excerpts from John Diehl's oral history transcript with Mrs. Eppa Rixey (Dorothy "Dot" Meyers Rixey) on April 8, 1989. Dorothy was born in Terrace Park and lived here most of her life. The entire transcript will be available soon on www.tphistoricalsociety.org.

## Do you remember much about the Robinson Circus business?

They let us out of school the day Tillie died. In the old days, down there in that hollow, between Robinson's house and Wooster Pike you could ride the elephants.

#### Were the barns down there?

No, the barns were always back of the house. I can remember Eppa and I took our children when they were little tiny things down to see the elephants. And young Eppa wanted to ride and they said if you bring him on Sunday you can take him and ride and so we did. He loved it. Tillie got sick and we went down there one Sunday and old...John Robinson was there and he was a good friend of my husband and he said come on and watch me give him a pint of whiskey. And you know it was prohibition then...and he brought out a pint of whiskey and he poured it down that elephant's throat...the elephant just lapped it up but it died the next day.

#### Was that Tillie?

That was Tillie. And they had a cistern way on the back of the property down there and we were all let out of school that day to go down to watch them bury Tillie in the cistern. And they cut off one of Tillie's feet and Mr. Robinson had an umbrella stand made out of it. John Robinson was a fine fellow. His father was an old reprobate. And he married his nurse and she'd get on the train with a water bottle...glass water bottle because he might want a drink on the way to town.

## ON HER HUSBAND BASEBALL HALL OF FAMER EPPA RIXEY:

You lived in Terrace Park while he was in his heyday in baseball, right?

Oh, yes. Well, we lived...we rented an apartment on Madison Road and we lived there...we were married in

October and we got back there in December 1924. We went to Cuba...went to New York and saw some shows.

#### On your honeymoon?

Went on a boat to Cuba and he played golf down there and then we came back to New Orleans. We didn't get back to December and then he decided he was going to play ball again. Well, I had no idea he would ever play ball again. I don't think my mother and father would have let me marry him if they knew he was going to play ball again.

### He was really big time.

Well, believe it or not he had a Masters degree in Latin. He went to the University of Virginia. And the thing of it was most of those fellows on the team had had three years of schooling. And I said to Eppa how can you stand it and he said there's just as many good ones as there are bad. And they all liked him.

You said Eppa had his degree in Latin from the University of Virginia. Did he ever think about teaching?

Oh yes, he did teach at the Episcopal High School for boys for one year. His sister, who didn't know a damn thing about Latin went and took his minutes

> for him when the baseball season ended too late for school. I think school started in September and the season didn't end till October or something and anyway she would go and she would write down all this stuff and she didn't know one damn thing about

what it meant.

#### ON CHARLES MEURER:

Did you know Charlie Meurer, the Terrace Park artist?

Sure.

#### What sort of person was he?

Well, he was real German and he had a German wife and his older daughter spoke kind of broken English. They lived at the very end of Miami and Stanton, on the corner. They had four children.

## Did he have a studio of some kind? Is that where he did his painting?

Oh yes, he painted in his home/studio and every once in a while he rode the streetcar. I can remember one time sitting next to him on the streetcar and he asked me more questions about Terrace Park and I said I can't answer all these questions and he said no but your mother and father can. My parents were from Terrace Park too.

## CIRCUS TRICKS! DID YOU KNOW?

- In the early 1900's the largest and most popular touring spectacle was the John Robinson Circus.
- A bank panic in 1916 caused John Robinson to sell out to Ringling Brothers but Robinson kept four of his oldest elephants: Clara, Tillie, Tony and Old Pitt on his Terrace Park property which had always served as their winter quarters.
- John G. Robinson died 1921, but his widow also kept the elephants for some years at the Terrace Park headquarters. One by one they died, and in the end, the last one, Old Pitt, was sold to Cole Brothers Circus.
- John G. Robinson had a particular fondness for Tillie. Stories say that he taught her to call him "Papa". Whenever she wanted him, she would call out his name, and he would come running. It is said that Tillie called out, "Papa", right before she died at the ripe old age of one hundred and twenty.
- Tillie's funeral was a civic event, involving the entire village. School was cancelled, and the children staged a pageant. A private plane dropped flowers from overhead, and the Cincinnati Enquirer carried a full obituary. Tillie's remaining elephant friends, Tony, Pit, and Clara, fired a military salute with the canons from their act.
- Information from Erin Purcell's John Robinson's Circus of Terrace Park, Ohio, Part 1 and Part 2. Erin is the granddaughter of Lynn and AI Nelson, Lifetime Members of TPHS. Soon her essay in its entirety can be seen on the TPHS webpage, complete with many photos.
