## **New Ordinance** To Call For Smoke Alarms

First reading approval was voted at the November council meeting on a proposed amendment to the village fire code ordinance that would require installation of a smoke detection system in all new village construction.

The recommendation, suggested by Fire Chief Lee Stegemeyer, was endorsed by the Safety Committee. The committee would like transfers of home ownership to also be incorporated into the ordinance. However, Solicitor Leming and several council members, expressed doubt that the amendment could practically be enforced on home transfers.

Safety chairman Griffith reported the cost of a batteryoperated smoke detector is **\$25-\$50**.

# On School Board

Two incumbents and one newcomer won the race for the three vacancies on the Mariemont school board. Voters returned Jo Lakeman and Tom Allman, and selected Sandra Small over writein candidate Barkley Campbell. Each was elected to a four year term.

John Hodges, Terrace Park's representative, and Carl Slater, round out the five member board. Their terms expire December 31, 1978.

Two open meetings are scheduled November 21 and 28 at 7:30 p.m. at the high school. At these sessions the screening and selection process to be used in choosing a successor to Supt. Robert Crabbs will be reviewed.

# **Zoning Goes Back To Court**

Overwhelming 2-1 defeat of the Planned Unit Development amendment to the village zoning ordinance in the November 8 referendum leaves unanswered the question of what BBS Co. developer Jack Brendamour plans for the property on which he hoped to build condominiums.

The long-standing controversy found villagers battling down to the finish line on election day. Those backing council's endorsement of the ordinance distributed door-to-door flyers as did those in opposition to the condos.

A civil suit attacking village zoning, initiated by BBS Co. last summer, remains pending in court. All action had been halted until after the referendum.

At the November council meeting Solicitor Leming advised a hearing has been set for November 18 before Judge Klusemeyer. Both parties will be asked what steps they next anticipate taking. Leming stated it was his opinion the result of the referendum "strengthens the village posture in reference to defense of the BBS Co.

#### Greenbelt Aid **Turned** Down

Suggestions for village improvements were offered at a November 7 public meeting for possible inclusion in an application for 1978 community development funds. A second meeting is set for Monday, November 21, at 7:30 p.m. at the Community House, according to Dottie Vogt, chairing the recently appointed CD Citizens Advisory Committee.

Rick Merritt, member of the Hamilton County Development Department, told the meeting the county anticipates receipt of \$4 million in funds next year. But he acknowledged that "Terrace Park will be one of our problem communities" in difficulty of establishing need.

Other villagers serving on the committee are Richard Ward, Ray Allison, Eleanor Winchester, Eileen Burklow, and Richard Mileham.

Merritt said, that with very few exceptions, any project must be an eligible activity benefitting low and middle income citizens, defined by HUD as having a family income of \$12,200 or below.

Following the November 21 meeting, the committee will refer all suggested projects to council, which will make the final choices to be submitted in a fund application. Suggestions include:

Purchase of the school athletic field, purchase of the Grady property, updating of the storm sewer system, tree replacement, street crown and drainage repair, pedestrian walkways for elderly, development of recreational land, repair and possible addition to the log cabin, better street lighting, building of bikeways, rehabilitation of the Community House, a recreation program for the elderly, and coping with the "blight" along the abandoned Penn Central tracks.

# **Prospects Dim for CD Funds**

Louise Halley, Building and Grounds chairwoman, reported to the November council meeting that the village application for matching greenbelt funds was not approved by the Ohio Department of Natural Resources.

It was held that the land proposed (the landfill) does not lend itself well to recreation, and the DNR does not give a high ranking to beautification as a qualifying standard. Additionally, the fact the landfill is currently serving other needs was also viewed as a possible han-

The Department of Natural Resources received 178 applications, Halley advised, of which 90 were accepted. But the Building and Grounds Committee was urged to reapply next year.

Other council news in-

- Granting of a variance to the village septic tank ordinance to George Porter who plans construction of seven new homes on his property. The variance is subject to approval by the village engineer.
- Criticism of poll workers who parked their cars all day on the Community House lot, thereby depriving voters of convenient parking.
- A formal request by councilmembers Henley and Halley that a study of the village building permit process be made with regard to who sets fees, situations requiring fees, where the money goes, etc. Mayor Cadwallader referred the request to the

Finance Committee.

- A request that Chief Pottorf instruct his men to remove garage sale signs posted on utility poles.
- First reading approval to a proposed amendment to the septic tank ordinance relative to granting of variances on property which does not pass the percolation test and where the variance would remain under complete control of the village.

Terrace Park's long-time amateur radio enthusiast Mel Aichholz, 727 Floral Ave., says it's CB radio interference, easily solved by connecting what is called a CB filter across the antenna terminals of the TV. The device can be obtained from a TV technician for about \$4.

Mel says the interference. usually in the form of horizontal bands moving up the screen, results because a side emission of a widelyused CB channel (a harmonic in radio terms) happens to fall on the Channel 5 frequency.
