GOP Vote Heavy Here

Terrace Park showed more interest than the rest of Hamilton County in the November 4 elections, bucking the trend by going Republican by better than 8 to 1 in the Second District race for Congress.

Of a total of 1,546 registered voters, 967 or 62% cast ballots. County-wide, the figure was only 51%.

Willis D. Gradison was top vote-getter, winning re-election to Congress with 864 votes here to only 86 for William F. Stineman his Democratic opponent. The voting here:



Recreation Commission Ends Soccer Season


The 1986 soccer season has drawn to a conclusion and the Terrace Park Recreation Commission extends sincere thanks to the many volunteers who helped to make it successful.


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

52 Signed As **Basketball Season Opens**


Terrace Park Recreation Commission will sponsor five basketball teams this season for youths grades three through six. To date, 52 children have been registered.


