The tentative $\$ 594,933$ bud get, required by law to be filed with the county auditor in July is $\$ 174,089$ below the village's estimated expenditures for this year. That figure, however, includes one-time costs of $\$ 135,000$ for a new police/office building, $\$ 11,000$ for a new police cruiser, and $\$ 25,000$ for a new maintenance department truck. Without those items, the current budget total is $\$ 543,720$.

The village started the year with a $\$ 450,000$ surplus, largely as the result of estate tax wind falls, and so was able to meet the added expenses without calling for additional financing.

In presenting the figures, Councilman Bob Payne, chairman of the finance committee, called for early termination of the tree levy and asked for twoyear renewal of the 3.11 levy. But he said that as matters now stand he could "be comfortable" with a lower figure urged by Councilman Rich Gilchrist.

Payne noted, though, that two other extra levies - one for 1.6 mills and the other for 13.15 mills - expire at the end of next year. That, he said, could call for proposals for increased taxes going on the ballot in November of 1988

But, he continued, "extraordinary estate tax receipts or sale of additional property could delay the increase until November, 1989, when the 3.11 mill levy would be subject to renewal again."

He already, he said, has had discussions with one prospective developer concerning the remaining BBS Co. property the village owns, and he urged efforts to interest still others. Part of the tract was sold earlier this year for $\$ 41,000$, and Payne estimated the remainder would bring \$130,000 or more

## How To Make Brush Pickup More Efficient

Here are some suggestions from Terrace Park service employees to help their tree and brush pick-up be more efficient. 1. Stack tree limbs so that the large or cut ends are all placed in the same direction. They have to feed these into their chopper, large ends first. 2. Do not stack so high so that limbs are likely to fall over into the street. Instead, make a series of piles, if necessary.
3. Cut long branches or limbs into lengths of about 6 to 8 feet.
