Council Discusses Assessed Property Valuation Increase

A recently announced 37% increase in village assessed property valuations is likely to have little effect on individual real estate tax payments, members of village council agreed at August's council meeting.

The discussion arose as council voted to drop the village tree assessment to four-tenths of a mill. It previously had proposed to set the levy at a half-mill. The current levy is six-tenths of a mill.

Councilman John Prues, finance committee chairman, noted that operating levies are designed to produce specific amounts of revenue, and so are reduced as valuations rise. That, he said, applies not only to existing levies, but also to the 9.8 mill levy approved by the

voters in the May primary elections. That levy is affected because it was passed before the valuations were increased.

(A recent real estate summary reported 26 Terrace Park homes as being on the market, 19 of them at prices above \$200,000 and three of those at \$347,000 or above. It listed 19 recent sales, seven of them at over \$200,000 and three at above \$300,000, with a top of \$395,000.)

With Mayor Randy Casteel casting the deciding vote, the village council of non-smokers defeated an ordinance which would have prohibited smoking in the Community House.

Councilmembers Barbara Howland, Julie Rugh and John Prues voted for the ban, while Sally

Gilchrist, Dan Startsmann and Rusty Wilson voted against it.

As originally proposed by Mrs. Howland, the ordinance would have prohibited smoking in any village-owned buildings. She amended it to cover only the Community House when the measure came up for final

Freak Accident Results In Village Power Outage

A freak accident on August 7 cut power to parts of Terrace Park and Milford for a time and caused damage to several electronic appliances.

A telephone pole in Elm Avenue, below Princeton, fell for no apparent reason and carried two other poles down with it. Disruption of electric power caused a power surge that resulted in damage to

microwave ovens, home computers and VCRs of several nearby residents.

Allan McAllister, 835 Douglas, reported to council that David Goodard of the Cincinnati Gas & Electric Co., had indicated that the utility might pay for damage under some circumstances, and urged residents to file their claims. Mayor Randy Casteel also instructed Police Chief Bob Bacon to press for utility action.

What caused the pole to fall is somewhat of a mystery since there was no wind and the pole had not been hit by a car. There was no indication that it had rotted at the base.

Chief Bacon theorized that the fall could have been a result of the long dry spell. The pole was leaning, he said, and the sandy soil in which it was set could have dried and loosened to the point that the already leaning pole toppled of its own weight.



Principal Sasson Urges Residents To Drive Carefully As School Opens

The "dog days" of August bring Cincinnati's famed heat and humidity, a winding down of summer's activities, and... the start of another school year. The first day for students of the Mariemont school district this year is Wednesday, August 25. For students attending Terrace Park Elementary, the daily schedule is the same as in the past—8:35 am to 3:10 pm. Children are asked NOT to arrive more than ten minutes before the start of school, as the playgrounds are NOT supervised before that time.

As in every good relationship, Terrace Park staff members promise "something old and something new" for the 1993-94 school year. For the second year, students will be working on the "school theme": STUDENT RESPONSIBILITY. Students will again be encouraged to understand the concept that each action has a consequence and that each student must accept the responsibility for his or her actions. New this year are the installation of new electric emergency exit signs, emergency lighting (to go into effect when power is halted), safety glass and panic bars on designated doors. These upgrades in the emergency systems will further

ensure the safety of the students, staff and school visitors. In addition, the staff has adopted a new report card, one which more accurately reflects the effort a student seems to be exerting in given subject areas.

The school staff also plans a change in school crossing guard procedures. In the past, this responsibility has been assigned to fifth grade students. Beginning this fall, these services will be handled by the sixth graders. As Dr. Jerry Sasson, Terrace Park Principal, stated in an August 5 letter to parents: "The steady increase in our student enrollment and the number of vehicles moving about our village streets throughout the day has made this responsibility even more critical and challenging. With the safety of our students in mind, and after deliberation with the village police and carefully studying this issue, we have decided to make a few changes to improve this service. The primary change will be to utilize our oldest students for this most important responsibility."

Dr. Sasson continues by urging parents, "...to drive slowly and alertly through village streets, especially as children come and go to school." Parents are asked to not pull into the school playground area to deliver or pick up their children and to use extreme caution in parking in front of the building on Elm.

"Finally, you are asked to be considerate to our student crossing guards," continues Dr. Sasson in his letter. "Sometimes they are asked to make spontaneous decisions, and they need everyone's patience and thoughtfulness to assure that no child or adult is placed in harm's way. We feel extremely fortunate to have such a responsive and conscientious group of sixth grade students. With the ongoing cooperation of the village police department and adults in the community, we should have a very successful crossing guard program this year."

Village Tree Specialist, Randy Haller Earns Certified Arborist Ranking

Randy Haller of the village maintenance crew has won ranking as a certified arborist by the International Society of Arboriculture.

The society is a professional scientific and educational group devoted to the dissemination of information on the care and preservation of shade and ornamental trees. Haller took the day-long certification test given by the Ohio chapter of ISA in Cleveland in late July.

"It was tough," he said, "and I was surprised that I did so well," especially after learning that usually about 60% of the applicants fail the test on the first try.

His success, said Barbara Howland, "adds considerable credibility" to handling of the village street program.

Haller, a village employee for 12 years, has become the maintenance crew specialist in seeing to the village "street forest" of some 2,400 trees. He showed an interest early in the village street tree program of recent years, and was encouraged to expand his knowledge by Steve Sandfort, village tree consultant, and Alan Bunker, state forester for this area.

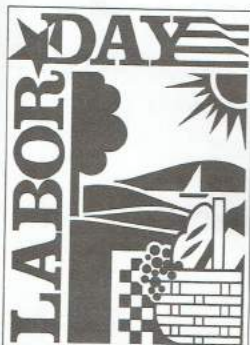

Terrace Park Labor Day 1993 Tradition With A Twist

The kiddies parade, favorite games, familiar faces and some you haven't seen for years. Labor Day in Terrace Park promises these elements of tradition in addition to new activities and new ways of doing things.

The festivities, sponsored by the Terrace Park Recreation Commission, will be held over two days rather than one. The fun begins on Sunday, September 5, with Sports Night - a first for Terrace Park - and continues on Monday with the parade, program and festival.

Scott Rosson, chairman of the weekend events, encourages residents to come to Drackett Field at 4 p.m. Sunday for a round of 30-minute soccer games played by kids and adults. There will also be seven "sporting" events - a coaches and celebrity dunking booth, and golf, softball and basketball accuracy and distance contests, in addition to Little Tykes play area for toddlers.

At 7 p.m., entrants can compete for Terrace Park Athlete of the Year honors in two categories -- 15 and under and 15 and over. Winners will receive trophies and passes for free food and games at the next day's Labor Day festivities on the green.

Food, soft drinks and beer will be sold throughout, beginning at 4 p.m.

Activities will begin early the next day when the young and young-at-heart gather behind the elementary school for the parade. "Hollywood Comes To Terrace Park" will be the theme of this year's parade and children are encouraged to wear costumes to illustrate favorite movies or celebrities. Decorated bicycles are also welcome. To be eligible to win an "Academy Award" in the costume and bicycle competitions, entrants must be on site by 9

a.m. for judging. The awards will be presented on the green after the parade.

The parade, under the direction of Denise Hall, will feature community leaders, fire and police equipment, a few surprises and, of course, our children. It begins at 10 a.m. on Myrtle Avenue behind the school and proceeds to the green.

A bake sale, coffee and doughnuts will be available on the green before and after the parade so residents can enjoy a late breakfast and purchase bakery goods for their own Labor Day festivities.

Opening ceremonies will begin after the parade on the green. Dedication of the renovated Log Cabin basketball facilities will follow the Labor Day address by Mayor Randy Casteel.

The festival follows on the green. At last count, 20 booths were planned - each sponsored by a generous Terrace Park business or resident.

Bingo, always a favorite attraction, will be played under a tent. Cash prizes will be offered this year.

Turtle races, which proved to be a big hit at their debut last year, will return under the direction of John Gislason. They'll run from 11:30 to 2 p.m. in 15 categories sponsored (again) by generous Terrace Park businesses and residents.

Beer will be back in the refreshment stand after several year's absence. In addition, there will be hot dogs, brats, snow cones, cotton candy, funnel cakes and soft drinks.

Proceeds from the two-day event will finance Terrace Park Recreation Commission projects, which include soccer, softball, baseball, basketball and Summer Fun for youth, and maintenance of Drackett Field.
