



Council Approves Proposal Reducing US 50 to 3 Lanes Plus 7 Foot Bike Path

Two subjects of long range interest occupied Terrace Park Council's considerations at the August 9 meeting.

Reiterating that Terrace Park residents are still opposed to the Little Miami bike trail cutting through the village along the old railroad right-of-way, Council member Sally Gilchrist up-dated the status of this plan. Ohio Department of Transportation has plans to bring US 50 up to federal standards, which call for the four current ten foot wide lanes to be increased to 11 or 12 feet with turn lanes. A committee of village residents opposing the paving of the bike trail has suggested US 50 have three lanes plus a seven foot bike trail. Ohio Department of Natural Resources still wants a bike trail which will run through the village, but is willing to study alternatives which include engineering studies and cost estimates. Council approved the proposal.

The pending 15 year franchise renewal with Warner Cable is also of concern to residents. Julie Rugh stressed that citizen input at the Public Hearing on September 13 is extremely important. Warner representatives will also explain how fiber optics will be used to improve reception and reduce outages.

For several years the village has provided space for recreational vehicles in the landfill. The only charge is a key deposit. It is now necessary to re-key the protected area and all those who are using this service will be advised by letter. Those vehicles not in compliance with the proper registration will be towed. There is no space available for additional vehicles.

Church Break In Makes Secretary "Cautious"

St. Thomas Church secretary Phyllis Engle confesses she was startled when she unlocked the church door just after 8 a.m. Thursday, July 28 and found a man "standing in the narthax."

Ms. Engle said the man asked if she could send him some place for help. After telling him of the Inter Parish Ministry he asked her if he could go in the church for a while.

It wasn't until she had gone upstairs to the office that she discovered the window of the office door had been broken. She immediately called the police.

Nothing was taken from the office, according to Ms. Engle, because the door "has a double lock on both sides, so he couldn't get in." She noted the man, who was identified as James Bailey of Cincinnati, "volunteered he entered through the patio door which had not been shut securely."

Terrace Park Police Officer Sgt. Mike Wright said Bailey was processed by the Terrace Park police and taken to the Hamilton County Jail until arraignment by Common Pleas Court. Bailey, who has a previous criminal record, was charged with burglary, but was indicted by the Hamilton County Grand Jury for trespassing.

Ms. Engle said the new rule now at the church is to come in with someone. She concluded, "Cautious is the word now."

Police Chief Bob Bacon reported the past month's police activity in some detail. Two arrests were made as a result of under-age drinking at a teenage party in the village on August 6. Several residents had complained and the chief and council agree that these situations will not be tolerated.

Pizza and music will abound while village residents participate in the games, which include lacrosse distance, basketball shot, soccer kick accuracy, softball throw accuracy, softball throw distance and speed pitch. New School Superintendent Dr. Gerald Harris To Meet Village Residents Aug. 22



Dr. Gerald Harris, Mariemont School District's new superintendent, will meet with Terrace Park residents at an open house Monday, Aug. 22 from 6:30 to 8 p.m. in Terrace Park Elementary's newly refurbished library.

Dr. Harris moves to the superintendent's office, having occupied the principal's offices at the high school, the middle school and Fairfax and Terrace Park Elementary schools. His experience with each age level and each village in the district uniquely qualified him for his new position.

He said he plans to be a curriculum superintendent and to foster greater community involvement in the critical decision-making process involved in education. Superintendent Harris noted he will not have a district car because he does not plan to travel to Columbus often enough to require one. He concluded Mariemont will, however, continue its leadership role in education.

His superintendent's contract, effective Aug. 15, sets his salary at \$77,000 annually with a stipulation that the Board of Education could adjust it at any time.

Superintendent Harris has taught English, French and social studies at the collegiate and high school levels and he has been the Visiting Professor in the Department of Education at Miami University. As a history, French and English major, Dr. Harris received his B.A. from Eastern Kentucky University. He earned his M.Ed. in Secondary Education and American History from Xavier University and his Ph.D. in Educational Administration and School Law from Miami University.

He has also studied French linguistics at the University of Kentucky, French at the University of Cincinnati and German at the University of Maryland. Conversant in French and German, he is an avid reader of both languages. He has taught at schools in Germany and Japan and attended the Naganuma School of Japanese Language in Tokyo.

Dr. Harris said he will continue to build on the excellent programs that currently exist in the Mariemont School district. He concluded, "My plan is to work with the board to involve the public in taking a look at where we are, where we need to go and what resources we need to get there."

General social meetings are held every other month. For more information, please call Erin Rosson at 831-5259 or Marilyn Chapman at 248-4705. Any village resident is

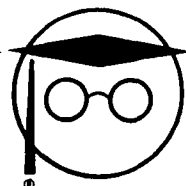
welcomed at Newcomer functions, as the group was formed to help new families feel a part of village life, make new friends and welcome new neighbors to the community.

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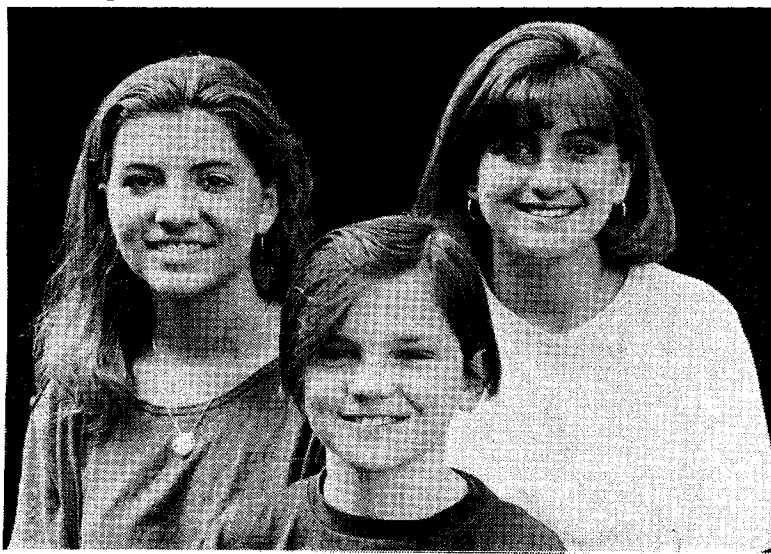
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Villagers Summer at Interlochen

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Nelson Leads Blood Donors

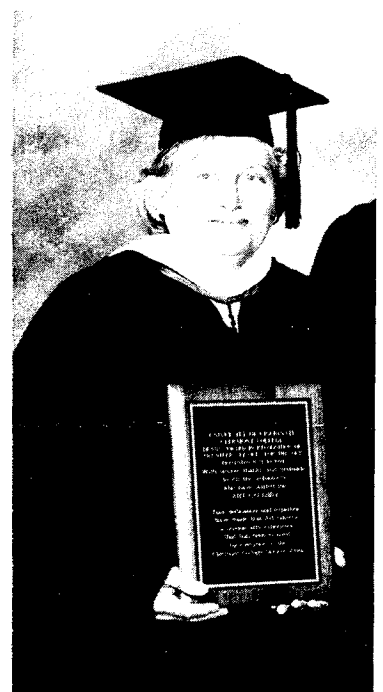

She and her husband Carl, live at 1 Oxford Ave., in what was once the clubhouse of the Terrace Park Country Club.

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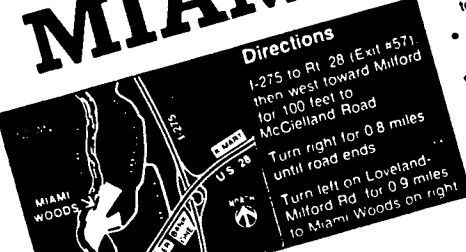
