Council Sets Salaries, **Contracts Fire Coverage**

The December 12 Council meeting was the last one over which Mayor Randy Casteel would preside, However, Vice-Mayor Rusty Wilson was in the mayor's seat as Casteel was out of town on urgent business. Wilson commended Casteel's work as mayor and also praised retiring Sally Gilchrist for her exemplary job as Planning and Zoning chair.

December's agenda was concerned with setting salaries and renewing contracts for the following year. Clerk Francine Glassmeyer had prepared more than a dozen resolutions for action. Salary schedules were set for police, maintenance workers, street commissioner, building official, secretary and clerk of court.

Tim Harth was appointed to the new category of aerobic consultant.

A contract was approved for weekday 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. coverage by the Milford Community Fire Department for \$7,000 per year. Fire Chief Phil Schneider pointed out that this contract affords the village additional protection for less that \$10 per home per year.

The final draft of the Personnel Policies and Procedures for employees of Terrace Park was presented by Dan Keefe and it passed its third reading. For the first time, the village has up-to-date guidelines for every aspect of village involvement with its employees. The 29 page document complies with the Ohio Revised Code, but is also tailored for Terrace Park.

Wilson commended Keefe's work on the manual. Copies may be viewed at the village office.

Council passed a resolution to approve an ammended subdivider's contract with E. Jack Brendamour. The village will construct a two foot high mound on CG & E's property to prevent water from the Winding Brook creek from flowing in to the Sleepy Hollow Subdivision. The village can draw up to \$6,000 from the escrow account. This is a step forward resolving the dispute with Brendamour over final release of the escrow funds

The Ohio Department of Transportation did some work on the drainage problem at the west end of the village on Wooster Pike. Their engineer felt that adding additional drainage pipe to the shoulder area might be helpful in curing this continuing situation. If it is successful, they will do more permanent repaving job.

Jennifer Comfort will be sworn in as Mayor of Terrace Park on New Years Day. John Finnigan will also be sworn in as a new councilman.

Tom Crosby Named Coach Of The Year

Mariemont High School Football Coach and Terrace Park resident Tom Crosby received the Bill Walsh Coach of the Year Award at the Bengals' game against the Chicago Bears Dec. 10 at Riverfront Stadium. National Football League Hall of Fame Coach Bill Walsh presented Crosby the award. The Coach of the Year award concludes the Bill Walsh Coach of the Week Program, which recognizes outstanding high school football coaching performances throughout the Greater Cincinnati area. Mariemont ended its season with a 13-1 record in 1995. The Warrior's ony defeat was a 34-31, double overtime loss to Lisbon David Anderson in the state championship on Dec. 1. Crosby has been the football coach at Mariemont since 1978. He has two state championship appearances to his credit, and a 146-64-1 carer record. Crosby's recognition as coach of the year includes \$1,000 for the Mriemont High School football program from NFL charities. Crosby is Assistant Principal at Mariemont HIgh School.

School Board Set Fee Guidelines For Facilities Use

At its November meeting the Mariemont Board of Education adopted guidelines for establishing fees for use of school facilities. School teams and groups, as well as resident teams or organized groups approved by the Terrace Park, Mariemont or Fairfax recreation commissions, will not be required to pay fees. Resident adults wanting to use school facilities for community education and recreation may be required to pay minimum fees. Non-resident teams and those with a partial number of residents may be charged for use of

school faciliites. The hourly rent for Terrace Park Elementary School includes: \$20 for the gym, \$20 for the cafeteria and \$10 for other rooms. The Board of Education is, by law, charged with the responsibility for the care and use of the property of the school district. The fields, including those in Terrace Park, are available for use first by school teams, then young recreation teams, then older recreation teams and then by outside teams with or without resident members. According to Terrace Park Recreation Committee President Bill Drackett, the number of children plaving on recreation teams is continuing to increase at a rapid rate. He explained Stanton field and the small diamond near the school have long been used by recreation teams as the high school has been a long time user of the baseball diamonds at Drackett Field. He concluded the Recreation Committee has not been approached by anyone to request Doug Burgess continues as treause of the fields in Terrace Park.

Barbara Howland's most important duty as official chair of the 1995 Tree Lighting was to give a hearty welcome to Santa Claus, who was driven to the Village Green Dec. 3 in a Terrace Park fire truck. Grace Holmes, who organized the lighting ceremony for the last eight years, revived the tradition begun years ago when the tree was strung and lit by members of the volunteer fire department.

Rec. Committee **Officers Retire**

Fred Albrecht, Sandy Koehler and Dave Moyer ended years of service to the children of Terrace Park with their resignations this month from the Terrace Park Recreation Committee.

Albrecht served close to five years on the committee, the last two as its president. Both Koehler and Moyer served more than seven years, most recently as secretary and vice president, respectively. Moyer ran the basketball program for years and with the aid of his wife Marcia, ran the most successful recycling program in the village in the form of the Labor Day Garage Sale. Koehler first came on to the recreation committee to lead the softball program.




Mariemont's Warriors


TP Garden Club Invites Village To Feb. Meeting by Ruth Rauth
