

Judy Schmitz Heads Jr. High

Judy Schmitz has been appointed principal of Mariemont Junior High School, which will open its doors at the Dale Park school for the first time Aug. 26. Mrs. Schmitz has been actively involve in the planning of the junior high program for the coming school year.

She has been the environmental science teacher at Mariemont HIGH School for 14 years and has taught at Mt. Notre Dame in Reading and at Princeton ton High School. Mrs. Schmitz received her bachelor's degree in biology education, her master's degree in education and her elementary administrator certificate from Xavier University.

Cousins is returning to his alma mater, McNicholas High School in Mt. Washington to serve as principal.

Council's 1997 Budget Is 8% LESS Than 1996

Council's 1997 budget of \$987,057 is 7.9% less than the 1996 budget of \$1,071,018. The village will continue to operate at a deficit of \$89,013 which is approximately half of last year' deficit of \$186,418.

A significant source of savings is \$48,600 in capital outlays as last year's budget included a new police cruiser and street maintenance and repair equipment. Another \$24,900 is saved in Fire and EMS Contract Services which is \$8,800 in '97, down from \$33,700 in '96.

Finance Chairman Tim Brown had presented the proposed 1997 budget at the May meeting, but passage needed to be formalized for presentation to the county. Council held its regular meeting on June 11, but reconvened on June 13 for a special meeting to vote on the budget and accept a bid for the summer's street work.

At the June 11 session two new auxiliary police officers were sworn in and will serve the village on a volunteer basis. They are: Dwayne Ernst, who is a graduate of the Clermont County Sheriff's Academy and Cassandra Ware, who has an associate degree in criminal justice. The village will provide sponsorship so that she can attend a police academy.

Rain and water continue to concern many residents who seek answers and help from the council.

Ricki Schmidt inquired about the village stance on the "lake effect" caused by water run-off from streets into backyards from Marian La., where she lives, a well as on Redbird La. Councilman Dan Startsman replied that the village has never agreed on a uniform was to handle these seasonal problems. He also commented that the village cannot undertake dry-well installations as they did in the past, because they are not allowed under OEPA rules without a permit from that body.

Jack Brown of Elm Ct. and Rob Martin of Elm La. both appeared with questions regarding water problems in the lower Elm area. Councilman Dan Keefe reported that the village is awaiting the completion of a study being done by Savage-Walker engineers.

Mayor Jennifer Comfort will attend a program later this month to receive the \$144,000 in Issue II funds, which will be applied to culvert and water control work in the lower Elm area.

In his monthly report Police Chief Bob Bacon expressed concern about the current "juvenile activity", which includes drinking, drugs and vandalism. Locale of much of the trouble is around the Dairy Mart and long the bike path. Bacon said that use of the bike patrol is helpful.

Recently five youngsters under 15 were arrested for drug abuse. Not all were from the village.

There is a suspicion that some kids are being dropped off in Terrace Park in the evenings from villages where there is a curfew. He said that he personally opposes the curfew idea. (T.P. Council has not discussed this option.) He stressed that "there will be low tolerance throughout the village for questionable activity this summer."

The chief reiterated his policy that the "keg law" will be strictly enforced

Bacon announced that beginning in mid-June, there will be a more diligent program of writing citations for speeding, failure to stop at signs, etc.

A resolution was presented by Councilman John Finnigan to install a timer for the lights at the basketball hoop at the Log Cabin. Council unanimously agreed. There have been complaints from nearby residents about late night play.

At the June 13 special meeting, Startsman presented the bids received for street work. These were somewhat higher than had been anticipated, but Council agreed that all the work should be done, so revised the 1996 budget accordingly. Of the three bids received, the lowest was from Schumacker-Dugan at \$38,500. When engineering costs were added, the total was about \$7,000 over budget.

Finance Chair Tim Brown suggested council meet before the July meeting to discuss the need for a fall tax levy. The special meeting is set for Tues., June 25 at 7:30 p.m.

School Board Adopts **Extra-Curricular Code**

The Mariemont Board of Education at its June 18 meeting adopted new policies for the extracurricular code and valedictorian selection. Action on the report from the committee reviewing the district's substance abuse policy was delayed until the July 16 meeting.

The new extra-curricular code requires a two week suspension in extra-curricular activities after a violation of the alcohol/drugs tobacco regulations. The extracurricular code requires students representing Mariemont High School to abstain from the use or possession of alcoholic beverages as defined in the Student Handbook. The code also advises students that tobacco use and possession are not The new code permitted. mandates an appearance before an appeals board by the offending student and their parents before readmission to extra-curricular activity is permitted. A second offense would result in expulsion from ALL extracurricular activities for the remainder of the school year. Mariemont High School graduates were recently in the news after the Liquor Control Division of the Ohio Department of Public Safety raided a graduation party June 9 and 10 in Sardinia. Many of the 16 arrested for underaged possession of alcohol were recent Mariemont High graduates. Close to 200 students apparently drove to Sardinia after the Sunday night graduation ceremony to attend the party sponsored by Ray Fink and his son Ryan, 18, who had just graduated from Mariemont.

Mayor Addresses Canine Complaints

With the warmer weather, the number of dog complaints is increasing. While you may think your Fido would never hurt a fly, much less a child your neighbors may not be quite as convinced. I have received several reports from residents who have been threatened by aggressive dogs that confidently ran out of their yards, presumable through their invisible fences. Other residents are tired of the dog waste that is lettering the neighborhood, particularly at the street where people step in and out of their cars.

Since new residents may not be aware of the laws pertaining to animals in Terrace Park, here is a reminder:

-No animal is permitted to run a large;

-If not in your own yard, all animals should be kept under your control, i.e. on a leash.

-No animal waste shall be left in public places or neighbors' yards;

-No one shall keep an animal that habitually barks or howls so as to disturb the peace.

-No one shall keep a dog that exhibits a vicious disposition.

Violations of the above are considered minor misdemeanors and punishable as such.

Let's keep Terrace Park safe and clean for everybody. Thank you for your cooperation!



Village council practiced unsound policy when it authorized or allowed a clerical invocation at the Memorial Day gathering on the public green which was markedly sectarian, and therefore notably insensitive to those holding other opinions on religious matters.

At previous public events there had been some improvement when invited clergy offered general theistic ideas. That style had drawn away from earlier invocations, making explicit reference to one religion The clerical performance May 27 was two steps backward.

Council members have the responsibility of ensuring that in the future any messages projected at government sponsored events on the tax-supported green are humanistic and non-judgmental about beliefs, disbeliefs and inbetween positions on theological subjects. The most efficient way to meet such a standard would be to discontinue clerical invocations out of respect for up-to-date pluralist democracy. Yours sincerely,

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


