



TP Budget Tops A Million Dollars

At its June 13 meeting Terrace Park Council approved a budget for 1996 of slightly over \$1,000,000. This is an increase of 6% over 1995. Finance Chair Tim Brown presented the proposed budget at the 7:15 p.m. Public Hearing. There were no questions from citizens. The new budget includes a 4% salary increase for all employees.

Anticipated receipts are \$157,000 less than proposed spending and this deficit will be underwritten with money from the village's fund balance. Brown explained that it has been traditional for Terrace Park to maintain a conservative reserve. However, after surveying similar communities, he found that most consider \$500,000 a prudent backlog. The net deficit will reduce the surplus, which is currently at \$795,000, to \$638,000.

During the time allotted for citizen comment Greg Malone of Elm Court appeared to express their concern about the flooding of their basements during three recent heavy storms. There was no discussion of the problem, but Sally Gilchrist advised the group that the village has retained Savage-Walke to study the situation. The firm will report to interested parties on Wednesday, June 28 at the Community House at 7:30 p.m.

Mayor Randy Casteel read a letter from George Tapke of Red Bird Lane, which contained a thorough recap of water problems in the Red Bird-Indian Hill Road area and requested Council to attempt to solve the problem which has plagued the area for many years.

Jack Schmidt of Marian Lane also addressed Council before the formal meeting. He asked them to consider the implications resulting from two village street trees which were removed several weeks ago by a property owner on Princeton Avenue. Schmidt expressed concern that failure of Council to respond could send a message of tacit approval for future removal or destruction of street trees on village property.

The Princeton Avenue tree removal was the subject of lengthy discussion during the Building and Grounds Chair Julie Rugh's report. She said that Randy Haller, village arborist, figured the value of the two large trees (using the accepted formulas for species, size and condition) at about \$4,000.

Council members appeared to agree that these trees should be replaced at the expense of the property owner with two generous-sized nursery trees.

Varying opinions were expressed about underwriting the care of Terrace Park's urban forest. Mrs. Rugh recommended that the .6 mil assessment for trees be imposed for 1996. Councilman Dan Keefe questioned the wisdom of this and suggested that since so many trees

Safety Programs For TP Children Set For July 26

SAFE (Safe Awareness For Everyone) will present a safety program for children and their parents on Wednesday, July 26 at the Community House. "Stranger Danger" geared toward children five years and older will begin at 6:30 p.m. Lt. Jerry Hayhow will help children understand how to identify a stranger, common enticement ploys and what children should do if approached by a stranger.

A program on "Drugs and Making Right Decisions", geared to 9-13 year olds, will begin at 7:15 p.m. It will include identification of confiscated drug samples, the effects of drugs on the body and how to deal with making decisions within a peer pressure situation.

SAFE would like to clarify the parameters for the use of the telephone calling system. Whenever an incident occurs, Police Chief Bob Bacon will notify the Safe Group and discuss the details of the incident and determine if the system will be activated. The tree will be used when there is an imminent danger and/or when there is sufficient descriptive information that can be relayed to others.

Janet Hill-Smith said SAFE wants parents to realize stranger danger is a possibility in any community at any time. She noted our best preventive measures are:

1. Empowering our children through teaching them what they can do to protect themselves.

2. Being watchful of our children and alert to strangers and suspicious behaviors.


Dolan Nominated For Faculty Award




