Interior designer Jean Kinmonth

A lifetime of making it right her work through referrals. "My family has always come

From the time she was 12 years old, Jean Kinmonth read House Beautiful magazine and could look at a room and decide if things weren't quite right. Jean initiated her first design project just a few years later when she noticed that her father's favorite chair had become worn and frayed. Since Jean's mother had passed away, she took it upon herself to go to J.C. Penney's and have a slipcover made. That humble teenage project grew into a love of design and eventually into the interior design business that Jean has nection to many clients who come owned for 25 years.

"I was always wanting things to look right," explained Jean. "I love for a room to look inviting and lived in. Your eye tells you if it's not right. The passion of it is being able to find a way to fix what's wrong.'

Though Jean loved design, she got her college degree in English because it was the practical thing to do at the time. She married and started a family and in 1963 found herself living in Indian Hill and going to church at St. Thomas in Terrace Park. Jean's husband John was transferred to Kansas City for five years in 1971, but the family moved back to their old neighborhood in 1976.

Jean began to work one day a week at the Yankee Dollar, originally owned by Vera and Howard Andrews. Vera recognized Jean's eye for design and when it came time to sell their shop, the Andrews' asked Jean if she was interested in the interior design piece of the business.

"I asked Vera if she thought I could do it," said Jean. "I told Vera I would do it if she thought I could. It was just done on a handshake. Then I opened a shop in Milford and started with Vera's client list. I was really learning on the job

first. I love to work and have done this for the love of design and the pleasure of working with people," Jean says. "The beauty of this is that I'm my own boss. I can challenge myself with work, but also be active at St. Thomas and help my family and do some traveling.'

Using her skills at "making it right," Jean was part of a team that designed the kitchen in the recent remodeling of St. Thomas church. She is also the facilities coordinator for the church and feels a close connection to Terrace Park through her business and church life.

Jean maintains a close connot only from the village, but also from Milford, Indian Hill and Mariemont. Her daughter is also connected to the business, having inherited an eye for design and color. Karolyn lives in Madeira and has worked in the business since the beginning. Jean and John (now retired from Proctor and Gamble) have four other children: Karen; John, Jr.; Frank; and Kathy. Though Jean is now a greatgrandmother, she continues to have a passion for her work.


Against tremendous odds, including a youth immersed in gangs, drugs and violence, Luis Rodriguez has emerged as a leading Chicano writer, with published books in memoir, short stories, children's literature and poetry. He is best Lunch 2005 are the following: Auknown for his memoir of gang life, Always Running: La Vida Loca, Gang Days in L.A., which won a Carl Sandburg Literary Award and was chosen as a New York Times Notable Book for 1993.

The New York Times Book Review stated about Always Running: "Rodriguez' account of his coming of age is vivid, raw...fierce, and fearless....Here's truth no television set, burning night and day, could ever begin to offer." Jonathon Kozol, author of Savage Inequalities, called Alwavs Running "an absolutely unique work: richly literary and poetic, yet urgent and politically explosive at the same time.... A permanent testament to human courage and transcendence." Luis Rodriguez' other books include Republic of East L.A. (short stories), Trochemoche (poetry), and It Doesn't Have To Be This Way: A Barrio Story (bilingual childrenys book). He has recently completed his first novel, Music of the Mill, which will be published in the spring of 2005 In addition to his writing, Luis Rodriguez is the founder of Tia Chucha Press, the publishing wing of the Guild Complex, a not-forprofit literary arts organization in Chicago, which publishes sociallyengaged poetry. In 1997, Luis' work with Youth Strugaling for Survival, a Chicago based not-forprofit community group working with gang youth, was featured on

The Seven Hills School is the Making Peace PBS TV series. Luis was recognized by the Illinois Teachers of English who awarded him the 2000 Illinois Author of the Year. And in 2001, Luis was honored as one of fifty individuals from around the world to be recognized as "Unsung Heroes of Compassion" in an award ceremony presided over by His Holiness the Dalai Lama.

> Rodriguez has spent more than 20 years as an inspirational speaker, conducting workshops in prisons, juvenile facilities, and migrant camps, as well as colleges and conferences. He currently resides in the San Fernando Valley section of Los Angeles, where his most recent venture is Tia Chucha Café Cultural, a bookstore, cafe, art gallery and performance space.





Winter art camp offered by local artist





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Terrace Park Sports Terrace Park girls STATE CHAMPS!

A group of Terrace Park fifth and sixth grade girls coached by Walt Bessey, Jay Gohman and Ford Taylor won the Strikers division in their league, placed first in their area tournament, and went on to win the 2004 Ohio Say Soccer State Tournament.

The girls had an outstanding season, posting an overall record of 16 - 0 - 2. The team only gave up eight goals during the 10-game regular season and recorded a total of 10 shut outs, with six of those coming during tournament play. While the team had an excellent defense, their offense was equally powerful. The coaching staff is especially proud of the fact that 12 of the 14 girls on the team scored at least one goal during the season, with some of those girls scoring the first goals of their soccer "careers."

To win the state tournament, the girls played five games over two weekends in late November against increasingly strong competition. In the semifinal match against Georgetown, the game was tied 2-2 at the end of regulation. A goal during the five-minute overtime sealed that victory.

The state final was even more from White Oak, the girls found when the ninth girl from the Terrace
