# Two families spend spring break helping Katrina victims

For two families from Terrace Park and Mariemont and their friends this spring break was a work trip to help others instead of a time at the beach. Leaving on April 7 from the parking lot of Horizon Community Church (7800 Laurel Avenue in Madeira), these 12 people made up the third volunteer team to serve in Pearlington, Mississippi from the church. "Ironically, people think that the work is over and done with, but the need is so great that the army just built barracks in this town to house hundreds of volunteers that will need to continue coming," according to John Kirby from Horizon Church.

The first team the church sent in October of 2005 of 17 adults cleared driveways and yards to provide access for FEMA trailers in an area that experienced 12-foot wave surges. The team dragged a Bob Cat with a tree prong attachment that could haul huge logs out on the street after the team cut the logs and tree branches and piled them. Pearlington Mississippi is just 30 miles North East of New Orleans. The area is rural with many residents living near the poverty line before the eye of the storm rolled nearly directly over their town and the tidal surge washed through destroying homes.

The water only stayed for six hours, but ruined insulation and drywall that all needs to be torn out. Brick homes are the only ones that can be salvaged. Frame homes and





trailers cannot be saved. Most trailers and frame homes were lifted off foundations and moved 50 feet or more along with cars that are now worthless. The current team tore out insulation and drywall so that all that remained were studs. Once everything dries out, rebuilding will begin. The post office and fire station and churches are all gone.

Horizon Community Church meets Sundays at Cincinnati Country Day School at 10:30 a.m. and has offices in Madeira. The church has also helped transplant hurricane refugees in Cincinnati as well as helped to send 10 semi trucks of supplies to victims in the coastal region after Katrina.

### Health screenings available at Community Building

Building will be hosting a Life Line Screening for the community on **June** 10, 2006. Life Line Screening will perform four different health screenings using Doppler color flow ultrasound:

Carotid Artery/Stroke Screening that visualizes fatty plaque buildup and measures the velocity of blood flow to the brain. \$45 - nearly 75% of strokes could have been prevented through screenings.

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm Screening that detects an enlargement or weak area in the main blood vessel that carries blood from the heart to the rest of the body. \$45.

Screening which checks for peripheral arterial disease (PAD) that is a condition in which the arteries that carry blood to the arms or legs become narrowed or clogged, slowing or stopping the flow of blood.

Terrace Park Community PAD is closely linked to coronary artery disease and by identifying individuals with PAD; treatment can also help prevent heart attack and stroke. \$45.- This is the #1 cause of Diabetic amputation.

Osteoporosis Screening is performed with a quantitative ultrasound bone densitometer, using the heel as a measurement site. This test estimates future fracture risk by comparing the participant's bone density to reference values recommended by World Health Organization guidelines-\$35



### Hikers visit village on trek across America

of sights, sounds and smells on a 5,000-mile hike across America some good and some not so good. On this April night, the one that stands out in the minds of motherand-daughter hiking team Robin Grapa and Patty Laatsch, is the stink. It is the smell of bodies and clothes that don't get washed every day, the smell of backpacks that have been rained soaked and covered in snow, and the smell of sleeping bags that don't have time to be aired out when the trail is calling and there are miles to cover to reach an enormous goal.

Though they are "novice" hikers, these are tough, resourceful women. They've discovered on their trek to raise a million dollars for bone marrow disease research, that scented dryer sheets are the easiest way to combat the smell. You stick them in your pockets, in your back and roll them in your sleeping bag. As luck would have it, they've anded at the Terrace Park home of Jim and Jenni Pustinger, both Proctor & Gamble employees who have an ample supply of Bounce that they are happy to share.

Jim and Jenni and their teenage daughter Morgan are also sharng their love of Cincinnati food with Robin and Patty and the house is filling with the enticing smells of Skyine Chili dip and homemade woodfired pizzas. The warm showers, excellent food and good company are a welcome change for the pair of hikers who are three months into their nine-month trek from Delaware to San Francisco. Outside spring rain is just beginning to fall and Robin and Patty are glad to be out of the approaching thunderstorms.

they'll be ready to get back on the American Discovery Trail (ADT), the nation's only non-motorized recreational trail that goes coast-to-coast. In Ohio, the ADT follows the Buckeve trail, which goes through Milford and Terrace Park and includes the bike trail that has gotten so much recent attention in the village.

You're going to experience a lot blog keeping track of their progress on foot and in dollars raised. The site tells the story of Robin's near death at the age of 19 from aplastic anemia and her feeling that she needed to do something when she was told that she was in complete remission from the disease

> "I wanted to do something huge with my life," Robin explains. "I thought about what I liked to do, which was to be outside. I also wanted to raise money and awareness about this disease, and the two ideas collided into a hike across the country." Robin asked her mother to join her and Patty quit her job as a real estate agent to take on the challenge and celebrate her daughter's recovery.

> "It's a complete reversal of roles," Patty says of the hike. "I'm following her and it's hard for me to let her have control. But she's done a great job." The two hikers are trying to average 20 miles a day with 30-pound packs. Their biggest physical challenge continues to be getting their feet in good condition and in the right boot.

> The Pustingers can't help with foot pain, but in every other way they are making sure that Robin and Patty are comfortable. Back in February Jim read about the duo's quest in The Cincinnati Enquirer and checked out the web site. When he saw that their trek would take them through the village, he sent a message offering to help.

"When I saw the story in the paper I knew the trail would take them through here," Jim explains. "I thought about my experience with the (Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's) Team in Training program where we train for a marathon. Come morning, however, These guys are practically doing a marathon a day and we thought i was a very cool effort. This seemed like the least we could do." Robin and Patty are stopping to do fund raisers and media interviews along the way and are collecting donations on their web site, as well. They have offers of national media coverage when they reach their final destination sometime in October. After covering 5,000 miles and enduring snow, sleet, hail, sunburn, blisters, coyotes and more, the scent of salt air will be a welcome one. If they reach the Pacific shore in California, Robin and Patty will savor their amazing adventure and the sweet smell of success.

### Tracking our past and present for the future

Terrace Park was incorporated in 1893. We celebrated our Centennial in 1993 with a new engraved brick pavers walkway across the Village Green, a weekend long Memorial Day celebration including Circus International, the burial of a time capsule in front of the Community House and much, much more. Forty-eight men petitioned for the incorporation of our village in June 1892. John A. Moarn or Moran was one of those men. He lived at 214 Harvard with his wife, Mary, five daughters and one son. Their youngest daughter, Anna Marie was born later. John's and Mary's parents were born in Ireland and immigrated here when their children were born. John was a railroad station foreman and at least by 1900 he owned their home free of mortgage. Much of this information about the Moran family can be obtained by studying census records of Terrace Park. For this particular family we are lucky that descendants still live in the area so we can talk with them about the family as well.

Two of the Moran daughters, Julia Louise and Elizabeth or "Lizzie", married cousins, John F. (born 1872) and Richard Grace. John and Julia (married 1903) lived at 414 Miami (now 202 Harvard) while Lizzie and Richard moved out of Terrace Park. Richard was a plasterer and died early of lung disease. Then Lizzie came back to 214 Harvard to live with her mother after the death of John Moran. Janet Stollmaier, who lived at 202

Harvard in the 1970s and 1980s, reported recently that Dot Rixey told her two sisters lived in those two houses. Now we know who they were. Those two houses were probably built around the same time (late 1880s or early 1890s) and probably by the same builder. They were frame farmhouses. When 214 Harvard was for sale in 1960, before all the later changes, it had downstairs a living room, dining room, kitchen and bath. Upstairs there were 3 bedrooms. Between the two houses was farmland with arbors, chickens, cows and gardens. Dot Rixey also said she played in 202 Harvard as a child. John and Julia Moran Grace had four children, at least three of whom graduated from Terrace Park School: John "Lefty" in 1923, James Leonard in 1930, and Betty in 1935. John F. Grace, a painter and plasterer, died in 1940 and Julia moved away. Many of the

Moran family members are buried in the Roman Catholic Cemetery just past Sem Villa on Cleveland Avenue in Milford. By 1939 the Moran home at 214 Harvard belonged to Ray and Edith M. Stoddard, in laws of James Leonard Grace. Thus the home stayed in the family until it went to John and Betty McKee and then to their daughter and son-in-law, the Stewart Tarkington family.







#### In the meantime the church will begin making plans to build and develop the property with a facility and community resources that take advantage of the natural beauty of the river and vast green space.


