Terrace Park's Emergency Services Building was created as a result of the levy passed by Terrace Park residents in 2005, and will house equipment, including the new fire truck, and communications for the village's emergency services volunteers.

"We will now have the ability to provide additional educational training for our volunteers and the community, and we can hopefully become a certified training facility for EMS (Emergency Medical Services)," said Sue Keffer, a volunteer emergency medical technician for Terrace Park. "We will be able to enhance our fire drills and certainly work together as volunteers in a

Terrace Park will open the more enjoyable environment. Currently we all do our EMS and Fire work from our homes, and this facility provides us the ability to be more efficient, and effective in our service to the community.'

Ground broke for the Emergency Services Building in June 2006. While the Village tax levy paid for the new building, the Terrace Park Volunteer Emergency Services Association, the nonprofit fundraising arm of the Village's volunteer services, is budgeting approximately \$45 thousand supporter-donated dollars to purchase furniture, appliances, audio-visual, and other state-of-theart equipment and furnishings for the building.

The Emergency Services Station is close to completion, and we hope that all residents and guests will attend the upcom-

Terrace Park's Volunteer Emergency Services is an all-volunteer corps of firefighters and emergency medical technicians. Each member of the volunteer corps gives his or her time to train for certification and service the community on fire and medical emergencies in the Village. The Volunteer Emergency Services group saves the Village residents approximately \$500 thousand per year in tax dollars. Although volunteers work around their personal and professional schedules to service the community, Terrace Park averages more people on a typical run than most communities with paid volunteer services the size of Terrace Park. My name is Rosemarie Brown from Elm Court. In coordination with the Terrace Park Police Department, and a host of volunteers, we are planning to develop and implement a new "Next Step" program, to align with our "Special Needs" cards.

By now, each resident should have received a 3 x 5 card, asking for information, to be used in case of an emergency or possible evacuation. For those who returned the cards, the information proved critical during our last winter storm. While the storm crippled the village for two days, the Terrace Park Police, Fire, EMS and many village volunteers were readily dispatched to those needing help. These residents were moved to a warmer and safer environment and provided for during these difficult days.

The aftermath of that storm brought many things to light. First, how efficiently these departments, village government officials and residents worked together. Second, we realized that while many residents have "special needs" some residents may simply need more frequent attention and support. In addition, this support can be there throughout the year, not just during an emergency situation. If we deliver groceries to a neighbor because they can't drive, or we check on an aging friend who lives alone, we are reaching out and giving back to this wonderful community.

To develop this initiative, we'll work cooperatively with the Terrace Park Police, to identify those individuals who could benefit from this program. We are also asking for residents to step forward, and become a volunteer in this effort.

Scholarship memorializes teacher

A scholarship fund has been students in memory of a longtime Mariemont High School teacher.

The Don F. Mahan Excellence in English Scholarship will benefit a graduating MHS senior who has demonstrated a passion for and proficiency in the English language. Mahan, who taught at Mariemont for more than 25 years, began teaching chemistry there during the 1950s, but spent most of his career in the English department. Mahan, who also co-authored a widely used textbook on English grammar, died on Feb. 21 in Bella Vista, Ark., at the age of 82.

Whitney Smith of Indianapolis, Ind., and Rand Richard of Fairfax, who were students of Mahan's during the 1970s, established the Mahan Memorial Fund with the support and assistance of Mariemont City Schools, which will administer the fund.

"Mr. Mahan had a way of inspirestablished for promising English ing students to achieve beyond their level of performance, whatever that happened to be," said Smith, who lived in Terrace Park as a small boy, but grew up in Mariemont. "Not everyone was a fan, but he encouraged many of us to explore American and English literature and discover our own voices in composition."

Mariemont School District presents learning enrichment expert



At Terrace Park Elementary, Mrs. Hurley's and Mr. Zaya's 5th grade math classes had a special Pi celebration. It took place on March 14 - 3rd month, 14th day - since Pi is rounded to 3.14. They used the formula with PI for determining the circumference, diameter and radius of different-sized circular objects throughout the school: The tree section on the hallway wall. A metal ring on the floor. The top of a garbage can. They then moved on to more delicious measurements: Tollhouse cookies. Cinnamon pastries. Cakes. And, of course, cherry and Oreo pies.

Porter is newest member of Terrace Park Historical Society Board

Sue (Susan J.) Porter likes to say she is a Terrace Park resident by marriage. Her husband, Jim, grew up here, they met at Defiance College in Sue's native northwest Ohio, and the couple moved here in 1981 to raise their family. In 1994, the Porters built a home on land used in the early 1900s by Fred Kaiser for a commercial orchard and in the mid-1900s for the Orchard Hill Hotel. The couple has since built a cul-de-sac street on the property and the village has dedicated it Orchard Hill Lane.

Scripps Company, owner of WCPO-TV and The Post in Cincinnati, cable networks such as Home & Garden Television and Food Network, and newspapers and TV stations nationwide. She joined Scripps 30 years ago as a Post reporter after serving as editor of a group of weekly newspapers that



included the Milford Advertiser. Sue is a lay leader at Armstrong Chapel and immediate past president of the national Society of Professional Journalists Foundation.

The Porters have three daughters: Julie, who married Terrace Park resident Erick Koehler and now lives on Franklin Avenue with their four children, George, Sadie, Porter and Sam: Katie, who teaches English in the Czech Republic, and Carrie, a sophomore at Northwestern University.

Tracking our past and present for the future

Eating out in Terrace Park

First of all, thanks to Marie Stoecklin who built and moved to 816 Miami Avenue in 1941 and knew the Andrew sisters as neighbors, I need to make a correction to my last month's article. Although the Andrew sisters owned land where 810 Miami Avenue stands, their cottage was across the street at 823 Miami Avenue. They had a garage in the middle of the yard for their electric car and a lot more land in the back than there is now down to the river.

Last month I told you about some boarding houses and a few places to "eat out" in Terrace Park. After her husband's death, Mrs. McMullen at 607 Wooster Pike served wonderful "chicken dinners and homemade ice cream on weekends" to support herself. Childress Rodgers now owns the McMullen house. Her next door neighbors, Edith and Matt Cook, parents of Virginia Marquett (800 Indian Hill Road), told her the McMullen's not only owned this house but had "land across the street where they had a barn and pasture for their horses and cows." "People came from Cincinnati on the Swing Line Railroad, which ran through Red Bird Hollow to Terrace Park. So many people were coming that she added a front porch to the house for an extra dining room. Sometimes Mrs. Cook and [two of her luen sisters] waited tables for Mrs. McMullen. She was known for having the first fresh garden vegetables of the year and made her own bread, hot rolls, and was famous for her ice cream." Virginia Marquett, who is also an excellent cook, has given us Mrs. McMullen's recipe for potato rolls, which made good use of the left over mashed potatoe from the dinners. She remembers groups of ladies making reservations to come for lunch followed by playing cards, mainly bridge. Another place to get a chicken dinner on Sundays was the Hermann home at 742 Wooster Pike.

The Marigold Tea Room Res-

taurant was at 435 Elm Avenue, with its wrap-around porch on three sides and rocking chairs for the guests. Ruth Oberle (333 Harvard Avenue) and her sister-in-law Betty Everhart, whose aunts opened the tearoom, and Bob O'Hara, son of Bertha O'Hara told us The Marigold Tea Shoppe was opened about 1926/7 in an already existing building by Bertha O'Hara, a widow, and Gertrude Grunkemeyer, a maiden lady relative. It closed in 1942 due to the gasoline shortage. There was no printed menu. A large sign was by the driveway. It was noted for its fried chicken dinners (quoted in "Adventures in Good Eating", a nationally distributed book). It served groups: weddings, receptions and the Cincinnati Reds baseball team, some of whom lived in Terrace Park.

Members of the Cincinnati Reds also ate at the Kuntz and later the Vilardo's Tavern, where wonderful Italian food was served. Evidently people came all the way from Indiana for their famous spaghetti and meatballs. Albert Vilardo, owner of Vilardo's Tavern along with his wife Mary, was a wonderful cook. One thing he really liked to make was a highly spiced and hot "pepper relish". This consisted of green peppers, chili peppers, banana peppers, zucchini, diced onions, garlic and diced tomatoes. The Vilardos never had

any employees helping them. It was totally a family run business.

Rahn's Barbecue was a popular eating-place owned by Myrtle and Wesley Rahn. In 1958 they sold it to Frank and Irene Grady who added more eating area and continued the barbecue tradition until the 1970s. This was the place children went to eat on Saturday nights if their parents were going out - and quite a treat it was. Wonderful homemade pies were also on their menu.

413 Terrace Place, where Wiebold's is now, is thought to have been an empty lot until Robert Corey bought it from Louis Bosch in 1947. He built an ice cream parlor there in the early 1950s, which he and his wife, Faye, ran until it was sold in 1953.

Whether or not we'll ever have another "restaurant" in Terrace Park remains to be seen. Certainly there were some excellent ones here in earlier times. Evidently some people would like one and others think one doesn't belong in Terrace Park. What do you think?

If anyone has older pictures of any of these or last month's places we'd be glad to have them or make copies.

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

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

Fall soccer is coming...BIG changes on the way!!!

Even though it is spring, it is time to start thinking about Fall Soccer. TPRC will hold fall soccer signups on Saturday, May 5 from 10 a.m. -12 pm at the Terrace Park Elementary cafeteria. If you can not make the sign-ups in person, you can register online at www.tprc.net under Soccer. Registrations received AF-TER June 30, 2007 will be charged a \$15 late fee and will NOT be guaranteed a spot on a team.

TPRC Soccer is open to children aged 4-14. Children aged 4-5 will be placed in the Instructional program, while ages 6-14 will be grouped onto teams according to their age. These teams will compete in the Cincinnati Hills SAY soccer league.

The instructional program will run for 6 weeks, starting after Labor Day. The kids meet every Saturday for 2 hours.

Regular soccer will start practices in mid-August, with games starting at the end of August. Most teams will practice 2 times per week at Drackett Field, with most games on Saturdays, although there may be a few Sunday games.

New this year:

- Full time trainer: Challenger British Soccer has partnered with Cincinnati Hills SAY. Part of the partnership will allow us to bring a full-time trainer to TPRC. The trainer will work with coaches of all age groups to improve the training our children receive. In addition, the trainer will work with the older kids on specific skills training.
- Smaller teams: This June, Cincinnati Hills SAY will be voting on new team sizes for each age group. National organizations have recently recommended that SAY reduce the current sizes. Below are

> Late sign-up waiting lists: IF you sign up your child AFTER June 30 and there is a spot available on a team, they will be placed, otherwise, the child will go on a waiting

list. I will wait until I have enough kids on the waiting list to form a full team. Last year we had TOO many parents forget/wait to sign up. Hence, we had team sizes that did not encourage playing time. In many cases, kids could only play for 1/2 a game due to the number of kids on a team. I hate to do this, but last year's problems have forced this issue to be addressed. I refuse to penalize the kids who sign up on time and burden the coaches with too many players.

New Fees: In order to help pay for the trainer, regular soccer fees will increase by \$10 per child to \$75. Instructional will now cost \$30 to help cover the costs of equipment, and uniforms for the little ones.

Terrace Park Soccer is run by mvself with assistance from Tiger Nelson (who is in charge of coaches) and Don Venderbush (who is in charge of fields/equipment). We are currently looking for more assistants for Instructional Soccer and Uniforms. As this is DEFINITELY my last year, I am looking for someone to step up and continue to move the program forward.
