The pesky Emerald Ash Borer

Urban Forester, Randy Haller, pending infestation of the "Emerald Ash Borer." Hamilton County and Warren County are under "Quarantine." A month ago the Ash Borer was discovered in Anderson Township. The pest has, thus far, infected 22 million trees in Canada, Michigan, and northern Ohio. Haller

showed the Ash Borer infestation in various stages. Randy told all that there are 3.8 billion ash trees in Ohio (1 in every 10 trees). Terrace Park's street tree configuration consists of 14.5 percent ash trees. He also remarked that some younger trees are treated, but nothing has been proven to stop the aggressive pest. In a proactive move, no ash trees have been planted in Terrace Park since 2003, when the Emerald Ash Borer was determined to be an impending menace. Haller's report caused council members to again discuss the reasonability of



Dear Terrace Park Residents,

This summer, a number of renovations will be taking place at Terrace Park Elementary. The Mariemont Board of Education has begun to implement a plan to make our entire school ADA accessible and to improve the air quality in the older part of the building. Beginning in June, contractors will be installing an elevator on the south side of the school (facing Stanton) that will enable students and community members to access the basement, first and second floors, as well as the gym and the newer wing. Additionally, the boys' bathroom will be remodeled and made accessible. Most of the work will be completed by the start of school in August, with the final installation of the elevator to occur early in the fall.

Several other TPE facilities projects will also be going on while the children are on vacation. The original part of the building will be updated to include new electrical wiring which can accommodate a modern heating, cooling and ventilation system in each of the older classrooms. In addition to making the classrooms more comfortable, the new ventilators will ensure the air quality is up to current standards. The final phase of the project will be completed in October, when the boiler for the building will be replaced.

The major facility investments that are happening this summer will allow Terrace Park Elementary students to learn and work in an environment that is safer, accessible to all and more equipped to support educational excellence now and into the future. 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

The Mariemont Junior High Stu-Purcell and Stacy Purcell finished dents are proudly coached by language arts instructor, Leslie Jordan.


Terrace Park Garden Club

Terrace Park Historical Society Tracking our past and present for the future

We've recently enjoyed another memorable and meaningful Terrace Park Memorial Day celebration. Evidently Terrace Park has participated in Memorial Day exercises since at least 1895. According to Council minutes of that year Council accepted an invitation from the commander of the Milford American Legion Post to attend Decoration Day Exercises at their Town Hall and at the cemetery.

In 1939 Terrace Park invited the surrounding communities of Indian Hill, Plainville, Newtown, Mariemont and Fairfax to join them in our own first annual Memorial Day festivities. There was a parade of civic, fraternal and military groups with Col. Ross acting as parade commander. Next was a speech by a WWI veteran. Another feature was the demonstration of mecha-

nized machine gun equipment followed by a military flag raising service and an athletic program at the Recreation Club. Those involved in operating the program included the Terrace Park School band, war veterans, Girl and Boy Scouts and pupils of the grade and high-school classes. The committee on arrangements was chaired by Elliot R. Burnham assisted by Loren Gatch, Granville Gooder, Harrison Clancey, Norman Fehl, George Wieland, Howard Hebble and Stanley Miller. During the planning stages it was embarrassingly discovered that the Village of Terrace Park didn't even own a flag. Fortunately Mrs. Lenora Smith Robinson, widow of John Robinson I of circus fame, remedied the Terrace Park Council through her brother Kessler Smith who lived at 906 Stanton Avenue. It was accepted by Mayor H. B Fenton. For Memorial Day 2007 something new was added after the main program. Our all-volunteer Fire Department put on a demonstration of how they handle getting a victim out of a car that has been involved in a head-on collision. Unfortunately their well-publicized grand opening of their new facility on Wooster Pike had to be postponed. It was to have **Baby-sitter** Need a baby-sitter? included both a "Barbecue in the Bay" and a ribbon cutting ceremony.

In the 1920s Terrace Park's fire fighting needs were met by the Milford Volunteer Fire Department. Harry Eveland also supplied some protection by taking fire extinguishers in one of his Lumber Company trucks to any place where he heard there was a fire. It wasn't until World War II days that Terrace Park's Fire Department got its start when the village was given an assignment of some civil defense fire fighting equipment from Cincinnati's City Manager. In 1941 a proposal was made to build a firehouse and jail since the village had been authorized to purchase a "gasoline automobile pumping engine and hose the situation by presenting a flag to truck". After December 7th 1941 those plans were put on hold Finally with the passage of Resolution 82 on April 14th 1944 Terrace Park's volunteer Fire Department was formalized. In 1948 a grand plan was put forward for a new Civic and Business Center on the Village Green. The reason for this was the need for expanded quarters for our Fire Department. The complex was to include village offices, a council chamber and other facilities including space for retail businesses. Of course that was never built and there have been many changes made to the space behind the Community House to try to accommodate more and larger fire trucks and equipment. Now our still all-volunteer Fire Department and Emergency Services have their own brand new building and we hope large enough guarters on land acquired by the village from the Rawnsley family. 



Peterson was tasked to control the final face off and the Warrior attack ran out the final seconds, securing the school's first State Championship in a team sport since the boy's basketball team brought home a trophy in 1953.

George and Assistant Coach Steve Peterson were quick to praise Warrior seniors Gibby, Finn, Chris Egasti, and Nick Croswell, but Coach Peterson leaves no doubt about what he considers as the deciding factor in the success of the squad this season. Said Peterson: "Besides our youth program that starts these kids in second or third grade, the fact remains that defense wins championships and this defen-Stirsman, who was voted the sive unit of Mike Brumm, Joe Mileham, and senior Mike Miller is as good as it gets." And, Peterson added with emphasis. "there absolutely is none better than senior goalie Lucas Bezerra, and this trophy today proves it." Bezerra played the championship match after having broken his thumb in practice only two days earlier. In addition to George and Peterson, the Warrior coaching staff is assisted by Joe Lever, R.J. Maute, and former ACC defensive player of the year, Graham Hardin. The team was honored at a community rally at the high school on June 4th, and capped the incredible season that evening with a party for the players and parents at the Koehler's home. Coach George spoke about the contributions of each player on the team during the season, and rising seniors Michael Brumm, Joey Mileham, Drake Peterson, and Sean Stirsman were announced as the team captains for next year.
