## The Invitation

Though Camilla Warrick left Terrace Park five years ago when cancer claimed her life, a bit of her has returned. Of course, her family, Paul, Owen, and Noah Gibby, still dwell on Home Street. Last fall Camilla's novel, The Invitation, was published bringing a new memory of Camilla and a fine first novel to life.

During her years of confronting breast cancer, Camilla focused on living. She lived to love her family, to treasure her many friends and she lived to complete The Invitation. The Invitation is a tale of growth and healing that bounces from the college life of Susanna Figg and the lacrosse fields of Cornell University to Susanna's later life as wife and mother of three daughters as she faces a recurrence of breast cancer.

Camilla said that the book was not an autobiography but her experiences as a super lacrosse player (Small wonder that Noah sparked the Mariemont High School lacrosse team that won the state championship this year!) and a woman facing cancer give authenticity to her novel. The story begins as a unique young woman enters

Cornell and attempts to find her way in what feels to her to be a foreign culture. A couple of good friends, the fulfillment of playing lacrosse together with some interesting academic choices begin to lead Susanna through the maze of entering college.

A mysterious individual is often seen on the fringe of the lacrosse field. The person, known as "the Indian," is surrounded by speculation. Susanna became acquainted with "the Indian" but their friendship is marred by gossip and rumors. As the dual stories of Susanna's life in the '70s and the '90s evolve in alternating chapters, the mystery of Susanna's college life, a malicious "accident," and missing months from her life create a cloud of secrecy in her past. Cleverly woven, it's difficult to figure the outcome that Susanna and her daughter, Marie, discover on a return trip to Cornell. [] treasure the memory of Camilla telling me that Susanna's youngest daughter, Ellie, is named for our granddaughter.]

Mt. Adams, Serpent Mound, the Playhouse in the Park are a few of the reminders of Camilla's Cincy life reflected in Susanna's activities. A frenzy of painting rooms of the family home bright, exotic colors when Susanna's cancer recurs is reminiscent of Camilla purchasing beautiful, vibrant colored fabrics to sew clothes for herself and to make rice-filled warming scarves to comfort other patients as she dealt with her cancer.

Intrinsic in The Invitation's message is Camilla's sense of the value and integrity of all people, her search for truth and her desire for healing. The Invitation published by iUniverse is available from Amazon.com for \$17.95. You'll probably find yourself sharing this special book with friends and buying extra copies as gifts. It's good to have a small bit of Camilla back again!


## St. Thomas youth assist through Mountain TOP

## **Terrace Park Historical Society** Tracking our past and present for the future

This month I'm very pleased to have one of the "Manly girls" write an article for us about GROWING UP IN TERRACE PARK:

1950 - We lived with our Aunt and Uncle at 407 Miami Avenue. 1951-1972 - Mother owned our home at 97 Miami Avenue. Current address - 225 Cambridge Avenue

Before Michigan Avenue existed, at what is now the intersection with Miami Avenue, there stood a large vegetable garden, which went as far back as the turn in the current Michigan Avenue. It was mostly our property, but it was tended to by Mr. and Mrs. Neu. They built the house by hand at 91 Miami Avenue, which is now the Miami front of the Drackett property. It provided us with corn, tomatoes, beans, and peppers during the summer. The field and woods went all the way back to the Little Miami River where we often sat at the river's edge and listened to the Jesuit Novitiate Choir sing. They were located across the river at what is currently the Sem Villa property. There were several hollow trees where all the neighborhood children played "settlers and Indians." We hid inside the hollow trees and were afraid to come out due to the imaginary Indians. We also gathered wild blackberries to eat or to take home to put on our cereal. We were outside every evening playing hopscotch, jumping rope, roller skating, playing badminton, playing hide and seek, or tag. When it was too cold on winter evenings, we played board games on the floor or read a book. On Saturday mornings, we performed our house chores in between listening to "The Cisco Kid and Pancho" or "The Lone Ranger and Tonto" on the radio. We purchased our first TV when I was 8 years old and our viewing time was very restricted to about an hour a day.

Sunday mornings we went to church across the street and afterwards our relatives who lived in Terrace Park came over for coffee. There were four family units and seven girl cousins. Mother (Peggy Manly), my sisters Judy (Blakeney) and Margie (now Meg Petersen), and our Grandfather (Herbert Johnson) lived at 97 Miami Avenue. Aunt Dee and Uncle Stu Cutler and our cousins Debbie (Henn) and Sukie lived at 407 Miami Avenue, later at 104 Fieldstone and still later at 404 Stanton Ave. Aunt Millie and Uncle Bob Gilmore and our cousins Margie (Eggleston) and Linda (Ricketts) lived at 710 Myrtle. Aunt Millie currently lives at 807 Lexington Avenue. Great Aunt Marjorie

and Great Uncle Bob lived at 811 Lexington Ave. for a year before moving to 209 Stanton Avenue.

Before the overpass at Miami Avenue and Wooster Pike was built (it passes over the creek), the entrance to Wooster Pike was a one lane metal-framed bridge between the present "Ye Old Garden Shop" and the railroad trestle. The garden shop was then Rahn's Restaurant where we went to purchase candy bars. Sometimes we walked over to the drug store in Milford to spend a few hours reading their comic books (for free - we did not bend the corners) and sat up to the counter and ordered water, which came in a pointed paper cup in a stainless steel holder. We used two paper straws. After blowing off the wrappers, we flattened the straws and wove them into a spring.

Every other day the milkman, Ray Greer, brought our milk, which he brought in the back door and put in the refrigerator. If we were home when he arrived, we would ask for a ride and he would take us along as he delivered milk to the rest of Miami Avenue. Sometimes as a treat he would give us a quart of chocolate milk, which we would immediately drink. Once a week the laundryman would deliver our clean sheets and towels wrapped up in a brown paper package. He would pick up our dirty linens in a heavy cotton tie bag. He would also occasionally take us for a ride. Mr. Ironmonger would come once a year to take apart our oil burning furnace, clean it, and put it back together. There was a handyman named Sonny who would walk through Terrace Park looking for work. Mother hired him to cut down the field behind our house with a large two-handled scythe. He also helped us put together our wading pool one year. When Dr. Jim MacMillan (lived at 717 Franklin Avenue and earlier at 722 Park Avenue) had an office in Milford, if we needed medical attention, we didn't make an appointment, or wait for our Mother to take us, but we just walked over to Milford and sat in the waiting room until our name was called.

Mother worked in "Old Milford" on Main Street at the Cincinnati Gas and Electric Company. On Thursdays we would meet her after work and go to Krogers with her, which was across the street. Mother would give her shopping list to the clerk who would go around the store and pick everything out for us, bag it, and ring it up.

Before the homes at 221 and 225 Cambridge Avenue and 207 Terrace Place were built, Billie Wiebold had a track through those properties for his motorcycle. Carol Wiebold taught us baton lessons in their side yard at 213 Cambridge Ave.

We did not have room for a piano, but I really desired to learn to play it. So Mother asked Mr. Clarke, who lived next door and was the minister of St. Thomas, if I could practice on the church piano. I loved to practice, and often played for two hours a day. It wasn't long before Mr. Clarke "let" me use the good piano downstairs in the choir room. instead of the one next to his office! George, who was the sexton, hid a key for me so that the choir room would be kept locked. My sister Meg would often come with me to study. or read while I practiced.


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## Memories to last a lifetime

### New TPHS project depicts life in Terrace Park through students' eyes

As the 2007 graduates of Terrace Park Elementary leave their familiar surroundings for Mariemont Junior High School, they'll be taking with them memories that will last a lifetime - memories that through a new Terrace Park Historical Society program will be preserved even longer.

Working in cooperation with Principal Linda Lee and the sixth grade faculty, TPHS invited the 48 classmates to submit a paragraph about their favorite Terrace Park experience for the Memory Book, an archive that will grow each year with contributions from the school's graduating class.

beautifully written stories about life in Terrace Park that they can access in adulthood for such things as class reunions or personal trips down memory lane. Their insight will also offer researchers a better understanding of life in Terrace Park in the early 2000s. Excerpts are offered below:

### Fun with friends

Frequently cited memories were simply of fun with friends. Jacob Davis vividly recalled the first two times classmates invited him to play at their homes; Oliver Mauk mentioned a sleepover in the fourthgrade that was anything but restful. Other revelations: Alec Ahrens and five friends waged a memorable snowball fight from a "monstrous snow fort that was almost unbreakable;" Shawn Bristow played a game of dodge ball on a trampoline; Blake Smith and a friend shot arrows skyward and were relieved when they landed a foot away; Emily Jackson and her friend Julia had a memorable experience with a frozen pretzel and a microwave oven; and Julia Murphy enjoyed playing capture the flag.

Griffin Rolander's experience is probably best told in his own words: "Alex and I were at my house plugging all these random cords in and then the entire street lights went off and on when we turned on the Xbox. Our game didn't save though. I could never forget that."

Charlie Krafft wrote a testimonial that bears repeating: "When I first came to Terrace Park, I made friends in the first week. And now I have a ton of friends and I love it here. And that just goes to show that in Terrace Park you get accepted as a friend really quick."

#### Life in Terrace Park

Collin Barton echoed the comments of nearly a dozen classmates when he wrote, "My favorite memory of Terrace Park is just every day being here with my family and friends. Every memory in Terrace Park will Mariemont and Fairfax. Davaughn of Terrace Park." Chris Comisar also be great; it is the best place on earth. Terrace Park makes memories that eat all our food," went swimming in help you work through life. I will always remember all the nice people and all the wonderful things Terrace Park did for me." Olivia Cooke added, "Walking down the street and pretty much every car and person says 'hi' to you." Julia Saxton cited "all the friendly people," and added, "Everyone wants to meet you and it's a great experience." Cameron England wrote, "My favorite Terrace Park memory is when I moved here and ... there were no bullies." Tradition matters, too. For Grace Lehman it's the annual Easter egg hunt; for Allison Frey it's the annual Labor Day parade and festival; for Kate Olson and Rachel Nelson is the holiday tree lighting on The Green - complete with carriage rides and pictures with Santa; and for Polly Brittingham it's trickor-treating on Halloween. "I love

getting together with my friends and going around to everyone's house to get lots of candy, then going home and counting it all, and then comparing with my sisters to see who got the most," Polly said.

For Isabel Lewis, it's the "happy faces" she sees in Terrace Park. "Everyone in Terrace Park is thoughtful," Isabel wrote, "and will always lend a helping hand, whether it is toward the environment, or toward friends and neighbors."

Jeffrey Guggenheim said, "Terrace Park has just the greatest bunch of people you'll ever meet. It's almost like a HUGH family. Whether it's Boo Fest, Memorial The students responded with Day Parade, the pool, UDF, and much more, it's every little detail that makes Terrace Park, Terrace Park." Tate DeCamp would include The Green to Jeffrey's list as a favorite Terrace Park place for football or just hanging out.

> Paige Barrett recalled riding her bicycle down the big hill that leads to the swimming pool, past beautiful flowers and trees, and spending leisurely days in and out of the water with friends. Mara Coyan especially enjoyed walking with her parents and dog, Maggie, at the Nature Preserve along the Little Miami River. "We'd get to our special spot at the river and start swimming," Mara wrote. "We'd wade at first, and when we got to the top of the current we'd swim."

### Sports of all sorts

Ian Hillenbrand recalled "a walk-off homerun when I was playing my dad in baseball;" Colin Baker cited the fifth- and sixth-grade boys football game on The Green; Kyle Grau enjoyed football almost every day after school on The Green; and Quincy Taylor liked playing soccer in the mud, especially the time she and friend Mara had to walk home to wash off before they were permitted in her mother's car.

Chris Simons still sees the basketball scoreboard with just 0.9 seconds on it and a score of 32-31. "We were losing. They in-bounded the ball. I stole it. I put a shot up. It was good! I scored the winning basket."

Nick Walter savored his lacrosse experience. "This year I got to meet new kids and our record was 11-1. It was so fun having only lost one game." Lacrosse has been important to Robby Troller, too. "My favorite Terrace Park moment was the first day I started lacrosse because I found I was really into it and was an aggressive defensive player."

### Districtwide outings

A popular topic was the annual sixth grade class trip to Camp Kern with other sixth-graders from Hobbs recalled students "had to water that was "cold like winter," and it rained except for Friday "when we had to leave." Despite and nice. It feels magnificent."

For students like Emmett Saulnier, the faculty at Terrace Park Elementary School made lasting impressions. Emmett recalled the mustache and horns "Mr. F." drew on "Mrs. M." and her clever comeback. Meghan Williams had a Mr. F and Mrs. M memory, too. She wrote, "Mr. F. said, 'I have a problem,' and Mrs. M. said, 'We know you do.' " Nick Malone offered, "My favorite memory of Terrace Park is when Kate shot Mr. Maness' brand new tie with a pack of mustard."

Henry Neal had trouble naming just one memory and finally concluded with a memory made possible for serving as a school crossing guard. ".. we guarded so we got free Reds tickets, went to the game and started the wave that went around the stadium eight times."

Cody Miller recalled a detention for talking during announcements that became a "fun, but interesting experience." Asher Koreman remembered riding his bicycle to school for the first time. "It was so much fun," he said, "plus barely any schools let kids ride their bikes to school.'




