Life Squad Chief John Maggard, a nationally recognized illustrator, presented Matthews with a rendering of the emergency services building complete with fire truck and ambulance. Maggard joked that he had been holding on to the picture for a while. "I did it for Pierce for when he retired...but he kept coming back."

Maggard's point was proven when Matthews later said that this won't be the last time we'll see the uniform on him. "I'll be out here one day a week while I'm breaking in the new person." 



At the entrance to the Terrace Park Historical Society's headquarters is a bench with a gold-plated tribute to Susan Heil Abernethy Frank. The bench commemorates the "Thanks for the Memories" award TPHS recently bestowed on its former president; the inscription summarizes why she's received the organization's highest honor and says, in part, "in recognition of her dedicated leadership and service to the growth and continued welfare of the Society. . . Thank you for the memories and your friendship."

Steve Early, TPHS board member, presented the award to Susan at the

organization's annual meeting and tried to list all of her contributions to the organization in just 10 minutes. It was impossible.

"Her love for Terrace Park goes back to her childhood and the years she spent raising her own family here," Steve said. A daughter of Bud and Edna Heil, Susan lived in homes on Western, Marietta and Valley View before earning a degree from the University of Cincinnati. She later lived in homes on Yale, Michigan and Miami, raising a son, Scott Abernethy, and a daughter, Molly Abernethy (continued on page 2)

Smyth. She married John Frank in 1997 and moved to the historic district in Newport, Ky., a year later.

But she left a huge piece of her heart in Terrace Park and has found dozens of ways over the years to support and celebrate the community, beginning in 1990 with creation of a video scrapbook, "Terrace Park, With Love." It garnered attention from Cincinnati's daily newspapers and as word spread sales increased. More than 500 copies were sold locally and throughout the United States. Her research for that project made her an authority on local history and lore, which made her a valued resource for TPHS. Before long, she was asked to become the organization's president.

Susan served TPHS as president from 2004-07 and has continued as a board member Among her accomplishments:

• Conducted a major campaign that increased membership from about 50 to over 300 units or 600 people, with 25 percent being former Terrace Park residents;

• Created and promoted a Lifetime Membership program that has brought 42 \$1,000 gifts to the organization;

• Created a program to highlight the history of Miami Grove Nature Preserve that was attended by 120 people and resulted in the renaming of what formerly was known as Terrace Park's Wilderness Preserve;

• Expanded the board from eight to 15 members:





Mariemont Schools students showcase new Ohio art initiative

On January 7, an opening exhibition line, a DVD of art images and a website of student artwork from Mariemont and Terrace Park elementary schools formally kicked-off an art education initiative designed to reach classrooms across the state of Ohio. For Mariemont City Schools elementary art teacher, Shelley Komrska, Know It By Art: Ohio (KIBA) reflects over three years of concentrated research and development.

Supported by a dedicated project Life Foundation. team, including art teachers and administrators from Mariemont City Schools, KIBA (formerly the Art History of Ohio Project) will provide complete art lessons for grades K-8 showcasing Ohio's best examples of art, architecture and artifacts, and infuses the state's history, geography and culture into each student's creative experience.

The program includes a reference book with 50 lessons, a poster and timewhere teachers can access resources and examples and can share ideas.

The initiative is in its final design approval and funding stages. The program has received funding from private foundations and individuals including The Ohio Arts Council, ArtsWave (formerly the Fine Arts Fund), the Mariemont School Foundation and the Ohio National

The Mariemont/Terrace Park student art exhibit showcases artwork inspired from the lessons included in KIBA. The exhibit can be viewed at the Woman's Art Club Cultural Center (6980 Cambridge Ave, Mariemont) through January 26. Eighty-four students from the two elementaries have their works showcased. Komrska along with Melissa Rupe and Kelley Meyers are the schools' art teachers and organizers of the show.




