
The mayor then called for continued or new business. With none the meeting was adjourned.



Growing up in Terrace Park: The `40s and `50s

(This article submitted by the TPHS archive team appeared in all NE Community Press Papers on Wednesday May 26, 1993 as part of a section entitled "Terrace Park - The First Hundred Years" and is reprinted with permission from Community Press (per Eric Spangler, editor).

Growing up in Terrace Park in the '40s and '50s was certainly different from today. The similarity is that kids loved it then, as Elm overpass by Denison Lane). they do now.

Imagine the Village with sengers off to deliver lumber and almost every other lot vacant and coal. The Terrace Park Lumber Ballet lessons were taught at the no Wrenwood or Robinwood, no Fieldstone, Windingbrook or Redbird, no Princeton or Franklin, no Michigan Drive or Wanoka Woods.

The grass was so high that it was great for hide and seek, especially around what was left of the old circus building. Often we were forbidden to play here because the hobos would jump off the trains and sleep there.

We loved watching the trains, which came frequently, and waving to the man on the caboose. It was particularly fun to watch from the top of the RR bridge (now the

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There were lots of fields and open spaces - no landscaped or edged yards - a few horses, some small farms and lots of vegetable gardens.

I was born in 1942 on Western Avenue, moved to Marietta in 1948 and to Valleyview in 1956. I witnessed lots of village growth during those years, but saw even more from the time I went to college (1960) until I returned in 1969.

One of the things I remember most during the early years was playing in the big fields which are now Wrenwood and Robinwood.

> We loved going to the market Kennedy Associates (now Building) for penny treats. Groceries were delivered to homes every day because most families only had one car, which the fathers took to work.

The homes were seldom locked and grocery boy would just come in and yell "groceries!" If no one answered, he'd put the perishables away.

chief was the crossing guard at the corner of Elm and Park. police station was upstairs in the Community House with interior windows that overlooked the main room.

Besides playing in fields, we loved tree houses, of which there were many. Some even had roofs and carpet. Gold fish ponds some were old sunken bathtubs were in many yards; but there but it was only "old" Milford. were not pools.

There was no Terrace Park Swim Club until the '50s, so the Log Cabin was the center of summer activity. Arts and crafts and games were available. evening, the teenagers took over the place with games and record hops. On Fridays, buses would take us to swim at Coney Island, Lake Cowan or the Phillips public pool in Walnut Hills.

In the fall, raking leaves was fun because you could jump out of trees into the huge piles before you burned them. The whole village smelled of burning leaves from mid-October to mid-Noember.

On a "slow" autumn day, it was fun to go to the river or to the "haunted houses", which were three deserted homes, two in the 900 block of Miami, riverside, and one at the base of the Miami Avenue hill by Edgewater.

All three were "walk-ins" from broken locks and the furniture, art, newspapers, coffee cups, etc. were all left as if the owners had just walked away.

We never took anything but just tiptoed around so as not to the disturb the ghosts that were in the attics and cellars.

In the winter, sled riding was a favorite on the "hills" where Wanoka Woods, Oxford Lane, and the side yard of the Pruiss home are now.

If you got a good running start, you could glide onto the frozen Little Miami River. The Fresh Air Farm, now Stepping


