A letter from Council

Dear Terrace Park,

Many of us have read Cincinnati Enquirer articles describing steep revenue declines in neighboring communities. These are a result of changes in Ohio law. The state disburses a Local Government Fund (LGF) to municipalities including Terrace Park. As part of a broad effort to reduce state spending, the LGF will decline by ½ between 2011 and 2013. Losing 50% of the LGF will cost Terrace Park about \$28,400/year. Over the past three years, Terrace Park has received an average of \$128,841 in inheritance taxes. Ohio enacted legislation that will eliminate the inheritance tax after December 31, 2012. In addition to losing these two sources of revenue, declining real estate values will also negatively impact village tax revenue.

As a general rule, changes in real estate value do not impact either the aggregate taxes paid or the revenue collected by Terrace Park. There is an exception on a small portion of taxes referred to as “inside” millage. Unlike normal or “outside” millage which collects constant tax dollars by equalizing changes in property values with offsetting changes in tax rates, inside millage holds the tax rate constant and collects more or less revenue as real estate values increase or decline.

We estimate revenue lost to lower overall real estate values on inside millage at \$29,000 in 2012.

The total projected revenue loss of \$186,241 is 10% of our 2012, \$1,877,167 expense budget. Driven by large inheritance taxes, 2011 actual revenue was \$2,075,516. Forecasted revenue of \$1,748,000 in 2014 would represent a decline of \$327,516 or 15.8% from our 2011 high-water mark. As difficult as this is, many other communities that rely even more on LGF and inheritance taxes face much larger budget shortfalls. On February 18, the Cincinnati Enquirer article “Brace for shortage to worsen” used Amberley Village as an example where filling a budget gap required a new 10 mill levy. This levy, which passed on March 6, 2012, brings the village portion of an Amberley resident tax bill to \$518/year for each \$100,000 of market value. Terrace Park residents pay about \$380/year (for the village portion of their real estate tax bill) per \$100,000 of home value. To put this in further perspective, Amberley’s new 10 mill levy roughly equals the entire current levy in Terrace Park. And, unlike most communities in Hamilton County, Terrace Park has no earning or income tax. We enjoy relatively low village taxes *(continued on page 3)*

April Village Council meeting

The April meeting of the Terrace Park Village Town Council was called to order by the Mayor Jay Gohman. The first order of business was the swearing in of Michael Bronson and Ray Bernardini as new volunteer fire department members. Family members were present to congratulate the new volunteers.

Councilman Stefan Olson and Mayor Gohman both emphasized the importance of having Life Squad and Fire Department volunteers to the Village since it reduces the Village budget by a considerable amount as well as providing valuable support in a time of emergency. The mayor also thanked families of the volunteers for their support. Anyone interested in training should contact Life Squad Chief John Maggard or Fire Department Chief Luke Frey.

The mayor then called for residents to address the Council. Two residents, who both live on Myrtle, provided additional information to the Council concerning the establishment of guidelines for short-term rentals in the Village zoning code.

Later in the meeting, Councilman Tom Tepe noted that an informative Planning and Zoning Committee meeting was held with good dialogue. He is contacting similar Villages across the state to find assistance in determining a regulation for short-term rentals. Homeowner’s property rights must be considered as well as the Village’s ability to legally defend any zoning regulation. It is a work in progress.

Chief Financial Officer

The first half of the 2012 real estate taxes have been received. An audit of the Village will be outsourced to a private firm and will include years 2010 and 2011.

Solicitor

Bob Malloy noted that the Martin/Marietta briefs are due this week and replies to the briefs will be in May with no oral argument date yet set.

Life Squad

A joint fundraiser will be held on Saturday, April 14th at the Emergency Services Building offering document-shredding service. Thanks to George Heffner and Chasen Drackett for donation of the truck.

Two residents have already committed to the September training class and more are still needed.

Fire Chief

A Facebook page entitled “Terrace Park Volunteer Emergency Services” has been set-up to allow residents to keep up with the Fire and Life Squad activities and news. More hydrant repairs will take place this month with some of the older hydrants replaced.

Police Chief

On April 28th a prescription drug take back program will be held from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. Last year had a great turnout for this service to Village residents.

Street Commissioner

Chief Jerry Hayhow discussed the on going problem of standing water and resulting damage to Village roads. Efforts are being made to assist homeowners in keeping water from road right of ways thus reducing the cost of road repairs. This program is already being applied to Yale. Chief Hayhow will assist all residents in altering off street parking areas. Building and Grounds

Stump grinding is progressing as well as planting of new trees.

Rules and Laws

The Village is to be congratulated on its recycling efforts since the rate is one of the highest in the state. The Village will receive over \$5,000 for its recycling efforts. Keep up the good work.

Public Works

A resolution was approved to provide funds to repair or replace sidewalks on Elm, Miami, Stanton and Marietta streets.

Public Safety

Councilman Olson congratulated the newest members of the Village Volunteer Fire Department.

TP Treasures will be showcased by TPHS

If you haven’t already marked your calendar for the Terrace Park Historical Society’s next community program, do it now! You won’t want to miss the next installment of Terrace Park Treasures, our annual showcase of local sites and institutions that’s a real crowd-pleaser.

This year’s program features the Gazebo on the Village Green, Drackett Field and the original Terrace Park Country Club.

Bill Graf, 722 Park Avenue, will share the history of the gazebo named for his friend Richard

Elliott Ward, an architect who died in 1988 at age 39. The memorial in Dick’s honor was built in 1989 for \$25,000 with donations from family, friends and business as-

sociates. It has become a centerpiece for community events and a village icon.

Mike Getz, who lived in Terrace Park 23 years before moving to Milford nine years ago, will recall the communitywide effort that raised \$100,000 to purchase the farmland known today as Drackett Field, and the many individuals who worked to turn it into a recreational destination.

For the past 25 years, Jeanette Pruiss has made her home at 1 Oxford Avenue in the original Terrace Park Country Club, circa 1915. She’ll share the story of its evolution and photos of her home when it a clubhouse with one large ballroom, the tennis courts that were constructed after the country club moved to the other side of the Little Miami River, and the baseball diamond that was once on the property.

because we rely on volunteers for Fire, EMS and a wide range of organizations like the Village Views, Garden Club, Historical Society, Recreation Committee, Scouts, PTO, Woman's Club and others that deliver valuable services while keeping our community engaged, connected and strong. Council invests in our Fire and EMS volunteers with proper training, equipment and facilities to ensure quality and safety. Replacing our Fire and EMS volunteers with paid professionals would cost Terrace Park \$1M/year. The greatest contribution residents can make to the financial well being and community spirit of Terrace Park is to volunteer. We need to manage our budget closely and monitor any

shortfalls where expenses exceed revenue but Terrace Park is not in a financial crisis. The village maintains a cash surplus equal to about 1 year's operating expense. The past few years' budgets included investments in Wooster Pike curbs and medians that were discretionary. Controlling future discretionary spending while constantly looking for cost savings gives us time to plan for revenue changes as part of our normal budget process. Your Mayor, Council and Chief Financial Officer are committed to keeping our finances and community strong. Terrace Park named Tree City USA
