News from the Terrace Park Tree Committee


With our lawns coming back to life after a long winter, the Terrace Park Tree Committee would like to pass along some information on the proper way to mulch around trees.

According to the Pennsylvania tree organization, PA Trees (PATrees.org):

"Mulching trees can be one of the most beneficial things a homeowner can do for the health of a tree. Mulch can reduce water

loss from the soil, minimize weed competition and compaction, and improve soil structure, fertility and health. If applied properly, mulch can give landscapes a handsome, well-groomed appearance.

"Problems occur when mulch is applied too thick and piled high on trunks and stems. Sometimes improper mulching looks like mountainous mulch volcanoes at the base of trees. When this is done, it creates a moist environment in which opportunistic decay fungi attack the trunk and roots, causing root rots, crown dieback, a decline in health, and tree failures. Over-mulching also prevents gas exchange, suffocating roots and stems; can lead to rodent chewing and stem girdling; nutrient deficiencies; and often causes roots to grow up into thick mulch, only to dry out in hot summers, or form girdling roots that encircle and kill trees.'

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



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

Destination? Imagination!

After a long hiatus, the Terrace Park PTO enthusiastically re-introduced Destination Imagination as an extra-curricular opportunity for the TPES students. Destination Imagination's purpose is to inspire and equip students to become the next generation of leaders and innovators. Each year, Destination Imagination (DI) presents seven new Challenges to the teams--including Technical, Scientific, Fine Arts, Improvisational, Structural, and Service Learning focuses. There is a separate, non-competitive category for younger teams called Rising Stars.

This year, the TPES community seized the DI opportunity by forming 11 teams with 74 kids spanning grades K-6. Our TPES DI community participated in the Regional Tournament at Nagel Middle School on March 8th. The Terrace Park teams were supported by 21 Team Manager parent volunteers, 11 community volunteers, including neighbors Carol Conlon (Kenneway grandmother), Judy Dixon (Parker grandmother), Chandi Findley, Paul Gibby, Matt Moore, Erin and Holly Purcell, Angie Scroggin (parent coworker), and Audrey Venderbush; TPES faculty, Linda Lee, Jennifer Niezgoda, and Tom Zaya; and countless parental support!

Beginning in December, the teams had just three months to complete a main Challenge they selected for the competition. During this exciting time, each team gained important skills such as creative thinking and collaborative problem solving. In addition to working on a main Challenge, each team practiced solving

10-minute Instant Challenges. Learning to quickly assess, brainstorm, and execute a viable solution is another important skill set the students practiced.

This year's TPES teams presented solutions to trained DI Appraisers in five of seven Challenges: Fine Arts, Improvisational, Rising Stars, Structural and Technical. Of 96 total teams competing at the Regional Tournament, three of the firstyear Terrace Park teams brought home trophies. The 5th grade 'White Envelopes' team won 2nd place in the elementary Structural Challenge. In addition, two 3rd grade teams each won 3rd place in their elementary-level challenges: 'Big Bad Bulldogs' in Fine Arts and 'Fluffy Puppies' in Improvisational.

The Mariemont High School Athletic Department is now accepting nominations for the Doc Kusel Athletic Hall of Fame. Former Mariemont High School athletes, coaches and school administrators are considered for induction, as well as individuals with a long record of service to the athletic department. Former student athletes that are considered for nomination must have a minimum of five years elapse from their graduation from high school.

The Doc Kusel Athletic Hall of Fame is named after long-time athletic director and coach of Mariemont High School. Started in 1971, the names of the annual Hall of Fame class are displayed on the Kusel Stadium concourse, and the inductees' pictures and accomplishments are displayed in the high school's Hall of Fame Walkway.

Once an individual is nominated for consideration, his or her name will remain on the ballot for subsequent years. The selection committee is comprised of former athletes, former and current coaches, and other representatives from the community.

Nominations should be sent to Athletic Director Tom Nerl at tnerl@mariemontschools.org or to his attention at Mariemont High School, 1 Warrior Way, Cincinnati, Ohio 45227. The nomination packet should include the Individual's name, year of graduation, current contact information, high school athletic and academic achievements, years of participation in athletics and the level of the sport played (varsity, junior varsity, freshmen), as well as verification of any and all league, all-city, all-district or all-state recognition. Verification can include copies or scans of yearbook articles, cdertificates, press releases or articles.

Deadline for submission for 2014 nominees is May 1, 2014, although nominations are accepted throughout the year. The Class of 2014 Induction Ceremony will take place before the varsity home opening football game against Batavia on Friday, September 5, 2014 at 6:30pm at Kusel Stadium.

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

During his report, Mayor Gohman mentioned receiving a fundraising book for Little Miami Conservancy. He stated that this organization was previously Little Miami Ink and he stated "this is the organization that took a 30 pieces of silver bribe to change their position for Martin Marietta" in the mining case. He asked residents to not be fooled into supporting this organization.

Please call the Village office if any alterations/additions are planned for home improvements.

Bob Malloy, Solicitor, reported that the Village's Martin Marietta brief is due to Judge Ruehlman May first.

John Maggard, Life Squad Chief, recently attended the informative Highway Patrol, EMS and tow driver Safety Seminar. By the end of March, Chief Maggard reports that there will be three graduates joining the EMS team. Gregg Siegfried was recently certified as an in house training officer. PLEASE VOLUNTEER to serve on the Fire and EMS squads.

Luke Frey, Fire Chief urged TP residents to step up and join the fire department. The roster needs to grow. This is an outstanding group of volunteers. In July, there will be school safety training at TP Elementary. Chief Frey is working to have secondary locking devices in the event of an active shooter in the schools.

Police Chief, Gerald Hayhow, will be a speaker in Columbus, Ohio, for the Midwest Alcohol Policy Summit April 2. Eight states will send representatives to discuss sound alcohol policies. The DEA is looking for old prescription drugs for proper disposal. Chief Hayhow reported the weather has been the challenge with pothole repairs.

Councilman Jeff LeMay, Finance, presented and Council approved three resolutions. The first resolution requested the county auditor to make an effort for advance tax payments. The second resolution adjusted the budget by \$33K for 14 TP employees to receive a five percent salary increase. TP is fortunate to have tenured employees that average 14 years of excellent service. The third resolution will fix the salaries and ratings of Village employees effective March 16, 2014.

Judith Lehman, Buildings and Grounds, thanked the Tree Committee, Holly Purcell and Mark Castator for helping to achieve the Tree City USA Award.



Police Report

After stopping a vehicle for a registration violation, police detected a strong odor of marijuana. When asked by police, the driver produced a marijuana roach. During a subsequent search of the vehicle, rolling papers and three more marijuana roaches were found. The driver received a verbal warning for his expired operator's license and was cited for Expired License Plates, Drug Abuse, and Drug Paraphernalia.

Police gained entry into a running vehicle at the request of the driver at which point, police detected the odor of marijuana coming from inside the vehicle. Upon request, the driver handed police four marijuana roaches and a purple pipe containing marijuana residue. Police also saw a silver metal grinder on the center console of the vehicle. Upon searching the vehicle, police located a handgun on the rear floor board of the vehicle, which the driver said he had forgotten was in the car. Police cited the driver for Drug Abuse, Drug Paraphernalia, and Improper Transport of a Firearm.

The driver admitted having one beer about three hours previously. After preparing a citation, police noticed that the driver appeared to be falling asleep. The driver failed to pass a field sobriety test and was arrested for driving a vehicle under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. Upon searching the subject and his vehicle, police found a baggie of marijuana and two grinders. The driver was given a breathalyzer test, but did not exceed the legal limit. The driver was cited for Impaired Alertness, Excessive Speed, Drug Abuse, and Drug Paraphernalia

Police also responded to disabled vehicles, a vehicle lockout, a traffic jam, a solicitor complaint, a hit skip accident, an alarm drop, a growling dog, and numerous properties found open.


