Mayor Tepe acknowledges new Christmas tree on Green; completed renovations at Scout Cabin

Mayor Tom Tepe opened the meeting by saying he is pleased with the new Christmas tree on the Village Green and the completed bathroom at the Boy Scout Log Cabin, a gift from Robert and Dorothy Haines.

Addressing Council were Kenneth Schneider and Mike Rosen from the Center for Addiction Treatment, a non-profit, located near the Museum Center. They informed Council that this Center began in 1970, helping people with alcohol and cocaine addictions. It is now also a heroin detox treatment center with resident and out patient mental patients. They asked Council to consider donating funds for their \$5.7 million facility expansion. They are visiting townships, villages and school districts requesting financial help to save lives and rebuild families affected by addictions.

Holly Purcell, Public Safety, presented Resolution 3-6, 2017, for the consent of Council to the appointment by the Mayor of Alexandrea Poeder to the Volunteer Emergency Medical Services Department of the Village of Terrace Park. The resolution passed and Mrs. Poeder was sworn in by the Mayor

John Maggard, EMS Chief, reported 29 emergency medical runs since 1/1/2017. The current

Community comes together to fight ALS

Feb. 11 2017, a Snow Moon bocce competition was held in Terrace Park. The idea was hatched by local resident Pax Lindell and held on his property. Pax got the idea after holding his Tenth Annual Harvest Moon event, held in September, where bocce is played by competing teams for two days and nights.

Pax's friend, Graham Harden, who was diagnosed with ALS in August of this year, and his team mate Jay Messnere won the tournament. To Pax, it was a sign of things to come. He decided to put some feelers out for a tournament to be played in February as a fundraiser to help the Harden family in their efforts to fight ALS. Within a few hours 50 people had expressed interest in participating.

Pax rented a big tent that would accommodate the crowd; ultimately 48 players and 150 people were in attendance. They also held an auction which contributed greatly to the success of the fundraiser. "We were able to raise \$77,000!" states Pax. "It literally

blew my mind to see the outpouring of support and generosity from the community."

The event was also covered by local sports reporter, Ken Broo, WCPO TV. He interviewed Graham who is a lacrosse coach at Mariemont High School. Graham has been busy helping to raise funds and awareness for fighting ALS. For a link to the interview go here:

The Sassafras tree (sassafras albidum) is native to Ohio and is famous for leaves that change shape. All parts of the plant are fragrant and are often used to make traditional root beer and sassafras root tea. The leaves are often used in Creole cooking to make filé powder and gumbo. The tree has a wonderful smell and beautiful multi-

colored fall leaves. Only a few trees will be planted each year and given special attention as they are very difficult to transplant. There are currently ten trees planted on Dennison, Marion, Redbird, Amherst, Stanton and Yale.

Looking back in time

Editor's note: this article is referencing parts of an article which appeared in the February 1974 edition of Village Views.

"Sometime before 1922, the Terrace Park Country Club was organized. Forty-one lots of the land bounded by Oxford, Miami, Sycamore and the river was used for a six -hole golf course, tennis courts and baseball diamond. Membership dues were \$15.00. In 1930, the group purchased the Woodford farm across the Little Miami. In

1937 they fixed the membership fee at \$80.00 per year; with ladies paying half that amount."

"A recreational group was still active on the old TP grounds and so a petition was given to Council proposing an ordinance for the Village to buy the former TP Country Club grounds and improve it for park and recreational purposes. Funds raised by increase in property taxes, along with a hopefully forthcoming \$90,000 in federal funding would

be used to provide a community building housing bowling, badminton, ping pong, shuffle board, a boating pavilion on the river and a 90 -foot swimming pool. There would also be a few holes for golf and tennis courts. "

The grand plan was ultimately quashed as being too expensive—the country had just come through a depression—and most likely would have been limited by World War 2 economics. But what a plan!

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

Valley View nature preserve a hidden treasure

Terrace Park is certainly fortunate in terms of the number of places we have access to when we need a quick escape...the bike trail, Kroger Fields, Grand Valley, Miami Grove, and Redbird Hollow to name a few familiar spots, not to mention the river itself (or 50 West at the end of a paddle!).

Yet, there is a relatively untouched area just a 5-wood away from Terrace Park Country Club.

Valley View (VV) is a 150acre nature preserve located in Milford. The area is open to the public at no charge and includes miles of hiking and mountain biking trails through fields, woods,

and along the East Fork of the Little Miami River. It is managed by the Valley View Foundation, a group of volunteers whose vision, fortunately, did not include the need for another subdivision in the area.

For those who would rather be kneeling and digging in the dirt than walking on it, VV has created a large community garden with a deer fence and automated irrigation system. The garden is just a short walk from the parking area, and VV always welcomes new gardeners (legal plants only, please). The garden is located on land that is very fertile and has

held water froze this winter, my son and I had the chance to skate outside and throw the puck around on natural ice. In spring, the plants and flowers blooming are amazing (unless you have allergies ... then maybe not so much). VV holds a Fall Festival in October with crafts, hay rides, snacks, a visit from raptors, and often a musical performance by a storytelling troupe, which is a great option for those with young children.


One of the more interesting aspects of VV is the hops farm. Our own world-renowned Terrace Park Brewing Company has benefited from the generosity of VV and brewed several batches with these local hops. You will also see a rare site when visiting the preserve: A very, very large hops-picking machine from eastern Europe.


Finally, Terrace Park has a unique and important connection to VV. After 164 years of stewardship, the Gatch family transferred ownership of Arrowhead Farm to VV. Arrowhead Farm is located at 780 Garfield Avenue in Milford (at the Milford Pottery sign), and you can access the trails from there (although I recommend first-time visitors enter the preserve from behind Milford's Pattison Elementary School across from Terrace Park Country Club). Included in the Gatch's gift were three historic barns, a 205-year old stone farmhouse and Cathy's Gatch's Milford Pottery, all situated on 190 acres of permanently protected green space. The barns contain original hand-hewn timbers that still have the bark on them. No matter how hard you look, you will not find these at Lowe's. I look at these timbers every time I am at the preserve, and it amazes me to think about how these barns were built (without Michaelson Homes around!).

I hope you will get out and explore this wonderful preserve just a few minutes from Terrace Park. Feel free to contact me if you would like some trail suggestions at whayes@fbtlaw.com or 702-4226. 

If you have been by Drackett Field lately you may have seen the Terrace Park Bulldog lacrosse team. This year's squad consists of 60 players in grades 2-6. While many of the boys are from TP, we are a community-wide program and boys from Mariemont and Fairfax are encouraged to participate. We field four teams: Freshman, Junior Varsity, Varsity B, and Varsity A.

This is the 22nd year of Bulldog lacrosse in the village. As many residents know, the Bulldogs are the feeder program for the Mariemont Warriors. That team has become the most successful sports program in the history of the high school and has proven that our small district can compete with and beat much larger high schools, including local giants like St. Xavier, Moeller, and Elder. Three city championships at the junior varsity level and three state championships at the varsity level over the past ten years illustrate that.

The strength of the Bulldog program is the guidance provided by a dedicated group of volunteer coaches and the outstanding support of the players' parents year after year. The coaches believe in the principle "teach now win later" and foster a culture where the focus is player development, respect for each other and opponents, working hard, and having fun. We believe in positive reinforcement and strive to have each player develop a positive self-image, and hopefully in some, a love for the game equal to our own.

Team practices are held at Drackett Field on Wednesdays and Thursdays from 5:15-6:30. Additional practices on Fridays for the older boys may also be scheduled. Games last about an hour and are



Mariemont High School National Honor Society accepts awards on behalf of Graham's GForce team in Walk to Defeat ALS

Donna Neumann, teacher at the school and National Honor Society advisor, has served as the team captain in previous years and works to support and encourage student participation in the Walk to Defeat ALS.

"Donna has had a walk team for many years but this year was different because of the connection with Coach Harden. This year's team blew the stats from previous

years out of the water because of everyone's love and devotion to this man and his family," said Seymour. "Not only did Graham's GForce team have the highest number participants, this is the most people on a team we have ever seen."

The September walk surpassed the walk's donation goal by 18%, raising \$355,000. There was also the highest number of participants since 2001, with 3,052 people participating in the walk. The money raised goes to further the association and chapter's mission to provide compassionate care for people living with ALS, advocate on their behalf and find treatments and a cure for ALS. Local services provided include case management for patients, monthly support groups and equipment loan, and all services are provided free of charge.

The National Honor Society at Mariemont High School has formed a walk team for several years, but this year they formed a team to honor the women's lacrosse team coach, Graham Harden, who was diagnosed with ALS in August 2016. Coach Harden led the University of North Carolina to the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Championship in 1991. He was a defenseman and co-MVP of the University of North Carolina lacrosse team that put together a perfect season on the way to the NCAA Championship in 1991. Known as "The Battleship" by his teammates for being a defensive fortress on the field, Harden would end his collegiate career as a first-team All-America selection, National Defensive Player of the Year, ACC Player of the (continued on page 8)


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

Garden Club invites Director of CNC for talk on children in nature

On Tuesday, March 7, the TP Garden Club gathered in the evening to hear about children in nature from Bill Hopple, Executive Director of the 500 acre Cincinnati Nature Center (CNC) in Milford. The centerpiece was made of natural animal and plant remains (deer skulls, shells, fossils) used to educate the public at the CNC. The food included appetizers and desserts with wine and beer provided. Vivian Krueger, Amy Fitzgibbons, and Susan Rodgers hosted this month.

Bill talked about the many ways the Center (which began in 1967) is involved in helping children return to the natural setting of the outdoors in order to develop in

intellectual, physical and social areas. He highlighted a book entitled Last Child in the Woods by Richard Louv. This book talks about why children spend so little time outdoors and why they should be encouraged to return to discovering their environments.

The CNC has so many opportunities for all of us to enjoy being outside. For the youngest children, there is a preschool which is 3 hours long. Two of the three hours are spent outside each day. For the school age and younger children, there are camps and the wonderful Marge and Charles Schott Nature PlayScape. Here there are field, forest, stream and wetland areas. A new "mud zone" is being added. The CNC staff brings in sticks and natural objects the children tend to take with them so the pretending and learning is increased in this child area. For the rest of us there are the beautifully maintained trails through woods, ravines, fields and pond areas. The Edge Trail is recommended for all who wish to walk a younger child. It hugs the lake and so fish, geese and turtles are part of the scene.

The other interesting elements of the talk concerned the history of the CNC and its new Center for Conservation which is on adjacent property and in a country house (Groesbeck Lodge) formerly owned by Glendenning & Grace Groesbeck and once known as the Wildwood Retreat Center. Long Branch Farm, about 535 acres and located in Goshen, is another CNC location where the people of Cincinnati and center members can enjoy a working farm. It is about 25 minutes from Terrace Park. The program was inspiring and informative this month and helped encourage our gardening and outdoor activities which many of us will be doing more and more as the weather warms up.

The TP Garden Club usually meets each Tuesday of every month, usually at noon. Next month will be devoted to teaching arranging of flowers for our upcoming flower show in June. We hope to see some of you at future meetings and at the Terrace Park Flower Show.

Mayor Tepe acknowledges new Christmas tree on Green; completed renovations at **Scout Cabin**

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


