

## Council discusses budget, feasibility study on sewers in Terrace Park

June 17 Council summary:

Mayor: The next council meeting will be held on June 26th to enable the council to vote on next year's budget. There will be a budget public meeting on June 26th at 7:00 prior to the scheduled council meeting at 7:30. Copies of the budget are available for review at the council office. Mayor Tepe then gave an up-date on the formation of a varied skill set committee to study the feasibility of placing sewers in the Village. The Village needs to be in a position to provide researched information to residents if it becomes necessary. This committee's meetings will be posted and considered as public meetings (not public hearings) where residents may attend and observe. Up-dates will be provided on a periodic basis with no timeline given for any conclusions

**EMS:** As of the beginning of June, the EMS has responded

to 24 emergencies for a total of 70 incidents. Training in May and June included in-house power cot training and units in drowning and water related emergencies. Mr. Maggard thanked the recruitment committee of Lori Higginbotham, Regina Sharp and Jamie Flerlage for organizing the successful event at the Terrace Park pool open house in June. Appreciation was also extended to residents and others who helped fund the power cot that has proven its worth on recent runs. A thanks was also given for the improvements to the station alarm room making daytime or overnight duty stays more comfortable.

Police/Streets: A public meeting will be held with Duke Energy on June 27th at 7:00 pm to discuss upgrading overhead power lines or placing these power lines underground. However, this will only affect a portion of the Village, and there will be NO cost to homeowners. Street black ceiling will resume shortly and will be completed within a six-week period.

Finance: Mr. LeMay thanked all who participated in the formation of the new budget and also for their efforts in keeping costs down. The new budget is consistent with last year's budget with consideration of the same level of resident volunteerism. There is a projected 1% revenue increase. The new budget is in the village office for review and will be considered at the June 26th council meeting.

Public Safety: A joint meeting of the Finance and Public Safety committees was held to discuss and plan for the replacement of the older fire truck since advance planning is very necessary. There will be a follow-up meeting in the near future.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

## **Terrace Park Historical Society** An evening at the Birch

On Wednesday evening, June 14th, the Terrace Park Historical Society gathered at The Birch, the new restaurant in Terrace Park. While sampling good food and drink, the members listened to an informative talk given by owner Brett Tritsch about the history of the property. Did you know that the original building was constructed in 1832 and was used as a school until 1873? In 1876, The Kuntz family bought it and converted it into their home. They lived there until 1962.

Family lore says that when the school was being converted to a home, an unopened quart of Fleischman's Gin was found hidden behind the stone stairs wrapped in a Cincinnati Enquirer newspaper dated 1865. The newspaper announced the surrender of Robert E. Lee to Ulysses S. Grant at the Appomattox Court House on April 9, 1865. That bottle has been passed from father to son. J. Lowell Kuntz Jr. who is now the current owner, showed the unopened bottle to the group.

In 1943, the family built a small motel on the property. Caroline Wachter Kuntz ran the tourist cottages. It was known as a nice place to spend the night for \$4! The property changed hands a few more times. In 1955, Francis and Ethel Wolfe bought the property, and ran the Motor Court. In 1967, Howard and Vera Andrews bought the property. The Andrews lived in the schoolhouse until 1979. They built what is now the current entrance and opened The Yankee Dollar. The Andrews ran the store until they retired in 1979.

Bob and Mary Tritsch bought the building and the business. They ran the Yankee Dollar until they retired. The Tritschs leased the property to Vicky Leopold who opened Fiberge, an upscale yarn shop where she taught several fiber arts classes. When Fiberge closed, the space was leased to Shaun Martin who ran Springwater Sweets and Flowers. Shaun sold the flower business to Bette Thomas who changed the name to Village Flo-

ral of Terrace Park. When Village Floral closed its doors, Aaron and Brett Tritsch began to conceptualize their idea to put a restaurant in the space. Today, Aaron and Brett own the beautiful restaurant called The Birch.

### A look back in time

#### Editor's note:

In the last issue of VV, we printed an article by Polly Bassett about her reflections on living on the river in the spring of 1985-- a lovely, nostalgic look at nature. Here is a continuation of those reflections written in the summer of 1985:

In early morning the river looks pewter, sometimes slightly green or brown but mostly a gray/ blue-reflecting lights and darks rather than colors.

In the late afternoon, a soft and beautiful time, the water catches greens, blues and browns, as vivid as the trees, sky and rocks it reflects. In summer, normally the water's lowest point, the shores are muddy with many light colored rocks showing and the river's channel clearly visible.

Trains echo loudly across the water as they come down Round Bottom Road where the East Fork joins the main branch of the Little Miami River. Our first impression is that they are coming straight through the open windows of our

goldfinch sways on a yellow day lily outside the window. Chickadees bob through the trees and blue jays scold the neighborhood cats. Noisy crows frequent the taller trees. This summer I hear and see an occasional Baltimore oriole.

The kingfishers are especially busy now as they swoop and rattle their way across the water while fishing. At dusk, flights of night hawks skim silently back and forth at treetop heights hunting for insects. Several varieties of swallows spend time above the water swirling back and forth.

Blue-winged teals, mallards, wood ducks and even a white domestic duck, (accompanied by a handsome mallard drake and later three downy babies) catch our attention as they meander among the weeds and willows in the shallow water while feeding. An occasional heron appears to fish, and smaller birds bathe in the shallow pools.

Hawks sail lazily overhead. Usually their shadows upon the water are what first catch one's attention. Hard to see while flying, the red-tailed hawk is the only one I've been able to identify positively other than a little kestrel who spent one winter afternoon posing just outside the family room windows.

A few bullfrogs chug a rum after dark, adding to the chorus of insects around us.

The hills beyond the golf course are hazy with summer's humidity. Almost every afternoon a gentle breeze rises from the water and stirs the trees at the top of the bank while across the street all may be perfectly still.

Shortly after moving, we are treated to the breathtaking sight of a double rainbow stretching end to end parallel to the river. Outlined along one section by dark stormy clouds and on another by sunlit treetops, it is like an omen of surprises to come. Another day we run outside to watch four colorful hot air balloons sailing up river with the blue sky behind them.

Multitudes of birds raise young in the brush and bushes below us. It is a bustle of noise and activity as we watch through field glasses. Attracted by water, privacy and thick foliage, both water and land varieties are present.





## **Police Report**
