

October Village Council Minutes

The October, 2017 meeting of the Village of Terrace Park Council was called to order by Mayor Tepe. He then recognized the presence of some Mariemont High School students who were attending the meeting for a government class assignment.

Mayor: Mayor Tepe began his report by reminding residents of the Chilipalooza to take place on October 14th on the Village Green. Mayor Tepe then thanked the Village workers for the quick clean up of recent damaged trees and power lines.

Fiscal Officer: It was noted that the contract for the current financial auditors has been extended. The company being used is the same as in the past, just a name change.

Clerk of Council: All Village information is available on the Terrace Park web site, and all meetings are posted on the community bulletin board. Mayor Tepe thanked the clerk for organizing the recent New Resident Open House. Mrs. Sullivan reminded residents who did not attend the open house that informational packets are available at the Village office.

EMS: As of this meeting, the EMS squad has responded to 116 emergency dispatches for the year. Training in September and October included units in patient assessment and cardiology. The new 2017-18 recruit class of five is on schedule. Mr. Maggard announced that this year's individual classes are available to any resident to attend with no obligation

to join the training class. The full syllabus of topics is available for review. If interested in a particular topic, let him know via email or phone. Classes are held in the Terrace Park Emergency Services training room on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 6-10:00 pm. Mr. Maggard also encouraged residents to attend the Fire/ EMS fundraiser, Chilipalooza. on October 14th and to mark their calendars for the November 12th pancake supper at St. Thomas church. Mr. Maggard thanked St. Thomas for once again hosting this event.

Police Chief/Village Administrator: Chief Hayhow stated that he had attended a Southwest Ohio Urban Forestry conference where the Village's arborist, Mark Castator, was a speaker. He also attended a regional training on ethics.

Fire hydrant testing and leaf pickup will continue until completed. Chief Hayhow gave a firm reminder to residents to put nothing but leaves in the pickup piles since other objects damage the machine. Also, leaf piles should not be placed in the street.

Planning and Zoning: An update on House Bill #523 concerning the regulation of medical marijuana was discussed in a recent committee meeting. This committee will bring more information and a motion to the council in the future.

Buildings and Grounds: A resolution was presented to Council imposing a moratorium for 180 days on the granting of consent or

the issuance of permits relating to the installation of any micro wireless facility in the public right of way within the Village of Terrace Park, Ohio. Prior to voting on this resolution, council was given further information by Mr. Forbes. In summary, the state of Ohio passed a bill saying local municipalities can no longer regulate cell boosters within their boundaries. A joint lawsuit has been filed stating that this bill is unconstitutional. These 180 days will allow for results on the lawsuit and time to obtain more information. This issue centers on the wide spread use of call phones and the lack of service power by current cell towers. The resolution was passed.

Finance: Two resolutions were presented and passed that allowed for adjustments to the current Village's budget. Both were not amount changes but alterations to line items in the budget.

Rules and Law: This committee, chaired by Judith Lehman, met two times to discuss strengthing the ordinance concerning roaming animals. The committee determined that the current ordinance is sufficient. Enforcement of this ordinance greatly depends upon residents who should contact the police department for assistance and enforcement. Use of the TP list is helpful for residents but does not inform local police of the situation.

With no further standing committee reports, continued business or new business the meeting was adjourned.
