## **Village Council Welcomes New EMS Volunteers Dear Neighbors**, Dear Neighbors, at April Meeting

The April meeting of the Village of Terrace Park Town Council was called to order by Mayor Tepe. The first order of business was the swearing in of five newly trained EMS volunteers, three of which are Village residents. They are: Thomas Barbeau, Jen Dronsfield, Jeff Kramer, Shauna Kruse, and Jaci Romer. Mayor Tepe thanked and congratulated them for their service to the Village.

Mayor: A reminder was given to all residents with the coming of spring weather to be more aware and careful of children being in out in the Village. Be sure to stop at all stop signs and SLOW DOWN. Mayor Tepe also requested that all residents keep all public areas, especially the Green, clear of trash. Introduced was a new website service, available May 1, that will allow residents to participate in the following non-emergency, CONFI-DENTIAL, online Village website services.

1. Submit, confidential, special needs cards for a residence/ house to assist EMS, fire and police when responding.

2. Submit a form noting to Village responders that a house key is on file with the Village office.

3. Provide photos of any resident pets to assist if lost or missing

4. Record missing bicycles after they are licensed on the web site platform. June 2, 2018 will be the first opportunity to register bicycles with the module being managed as part of an Eagle Scout project.

The Mayor's report closed with the proclamation that April 27, 2018 will be Arbor Tree Day in the Village. Arborist, Mark Castator, announced that once again the Village has been awarded the Tree

Fiscal Officer: Auditors have spent several days reviewing the Village's financial records. The records qualified for a \$5,400 audit savings due to the quality and completeness of the records. The Mayor thanked all of those involved.

EMS: A new training class will begin in September. Mr. Maggard thanked all who worked hard to recruit the just graduated class, shown by the five new EMS volunteers.

Fire: Emphasis was given that with the coming of spring/summer storms, residents should avoid any down trees or electrical wires, call 911, since these can be deadly.

Planning/Zoning: A resolution was presented and passed to impose an additional moratorium for a period of 180 days on the granting of any permits allowing retail dispensaries, cultivators, or processors of medical marijuana within the Village. A meeting will be held in the future to continue to discuss and research this topic.

Building/Grounds: It was reported that the work on the log cabin is progressing with installation of lights and a new ceiling. The Boy Scouts will in the near future present a report to the Council.

Finance: A resolution was presented and passed declaring the necessity to proceed with a renewal tax levy in excess of the ten-mill limitation. Mr. LeMay stressed that it is a renewal NOT a new levy and will not increase any Village taxes.

Public Works: Street and sidewalk resurfacing and repairing will begin following a previously formatted and budgeted long-term plan. Over 100 sidewalks blocks are scheduled to be done with Elm being one since it is heavily used. If residents have knowledge of a sidewalk block in need of repair, please report this to the Village office. Three resolutions were presented and passed that provide the funding for these projects. The code red system will be used to give advanced notice to residents of areas being completed. A list of the projected streets to be repaired is available on the Village's website.

With no new or continued business, the April meeting was adjourned.

Planning/Zoning: A public hearing will be held concerning the licensing of marijuana prior to the July council meeting. The date and time will be advertised in the Village Office and on the web site. Finance: The updated 2019 Village budget will be ready for viewing and June and a public hearing in July with a vote of approval for the budget at the July council meeting. Public Safety: Mr. Gaskey requested residents attend the Pedalpalooza in the Village on June 2nd. Information for signing up will soon be available on the Village's web site.

The seasons and in turn the years really do go by quickly and it makes me think of Robert Frost's poem, "Nothing Gold Can Stay", which is printed in this issue. ## New Online Resources for **Residents**

The Village has implemented a software package from Frontline PSS. This software will allow us to create a database for things like Vacation Watches. At Risk Residents, Keys, Bikes and Pets. For more details and to begin utilizing this great new resource, read on below.

#### Vacation Watch:

Residents can now fill out a Vacation Watch report online. There is a link on our website that will take you to the Vacation Report. The report will then be accessible to the officers via the mobile terminal in the cruiser. When a home is checked the owner will automatically be notified by email! As always you can still fill out a paper form and drop it by the office if you prefer. Your information is only accessible by the office and officers.

#### **Condition Report:**

Through the same link you can report a condition such as a streetlight out, pothole or a damaged street sign, to name a few. Your report will generate an email that will be sent to the Village Administrator for the appropriate action. Your information is only accessible by the office and important medical information. Now we can include information for people who are insulin dependent, suffer from seizures, have critical allergies, have a history of stroke, or any other special circumstances.

#### **Pet Management:**

If you would like to register your pet, you can go to our website or stop by the office to fill out the pet registration form. We can also upload a photo for quick identification in the case that your pet gets loose or lost. REGIS-TRATION is VOLUNTARY and is strictly for identification assistance-this is not a substitute for microchipping or Hamilton County Dog Licenses. Your information is only accessible by the office and officers.

#### **Key Holder:**

Many residents have keys on file in the Village Office in case of medical or property emergencies. Our new key holder database will help police identify if a key is on file at the police station. Fill out this form and drop you key by the office if you like to be added. Your information is only accessible by the office and officers.

#### At Risk Residents:

For some years now, we have kept a list of "Special Needs" residents, mostly our elderly neighbors. With this new database, we can add any special circumstance that is important to a particular address, such as special medications, physical limitations, etc. If you would like to be added to this list, you can go to our website or stop by the office to fill out the confidential form. Police, Fire and EMS, only, will have access to this information as needed. This is particularly helpful to first responders when they know

Management:

The Boy Scouts will register and store information on your bicycle. They will have residents fill out the bike registration form, take a picture and issue a license (sticker). When a bike gets left or goes missing, an officer can query the bike license number and determine if it's lost or stolen and who the rightful owner is. The bike management system will be administered and maintained by the Terrace Park Scouts Program. The registration form is also available on our website and in the office.

622 Myrtle Avenue There are homes in Terrace Park that, in years gone by, belonged to Reds' players, steamboat captains, U.S. Senators, famous artists and even a circus, but 622 Myrtle Avenue is probably the only house in the village that used to be home to a cow.

That's right, this charming home set deep on a wide lawn in the middle of Myrtle Avenue was actually built as a barn for Suukee the cow, owned by Chauncy R. Stuntz, a chemistry teacher at Woodward High School who

## Memorial Day: 1961



This year's Memorial Day ceremony on Monday, May 28 marks the 57th observance of the sacred day by the Village of Terrace Park. This photo shows the first Memorial Day service on the Village Green, held Monday, May 29, 1961. Pictured is Mrs. Frank Everhart (left) presenting TP mayor John Jordan with a new flag for the pole on the Green. The flag was given in honor of Mrs. Everhart's late husband. For many years they lived beside the Green and he enjoyed seeing the colors flying every morning. As decades pass and times change, coming together as a village to honor those who have served remains an important Terrace Park tradition. built the large Victorian home at 625 Elm in 1868. He also built a summer house on Oxford Avenue which must have been somewhere on the river. On September 9, 1887 it burned to the ground and "his fine library was destroyed" (more on that in a later issue). Chauncey's barn was built directly behind the Elm Avenue main residence sometime around 1890 and held cows and horses before later serving as a carriage house. Stuntz initially owned seventeen acres around the main house but subdivided his property into building lots by 1892 in an effort to stop the City of Cincinnati from annexing the sparsely populated area. His plan worked and Terrace Park received its own incorporation in 1893.

By 1920, Chauncey's widow Eliza had died and the big house on Elm was rented to various families for many years. The carriage house was rented as well until it was sold in 1946 to Jerry and Harriet Morgan. Jerry worked at a Cincinnati zipper factory and remodeled the carriage house to convert it into a proper home for a family. Three large additions were made in the ensuing decades to bring the house to its current layout. Buzz and Betsy Ecker, who have called this address home for more than thirty years, say that there are still traces of the barn visible in the attic, and they are probably the only family in Terrace Park that knows there were cows born in their family room.

"I've been so lucky to have been surrounded by amazing teammates, coaches and family my entire swimming career, people who have pushed me to be a better swimmer and person, something that can not be more important in a season that last from August till March."



viceberry was named by people in the Ozarks area of the Midwest because it blooms early in springright around now. It marked the time when people could begin to hold Sunday Services again since the snow and cold would no longer stop them. These trees will grow to 25 feet but are considered a small, slow growing tree. The tree is very pretty with white flowers and light grey bark. It is also called the Shadbush on the eastern seaboard where the flowers mark the time when the Shad fish travel up the rivers to spawn. Another name for the tree is Juneberry because that is when it has berries which are favorites of Cedar Waxwings and Bluebirds as well as foxes and bears (though we don't have many in our area). The berries were used by the pioneers to make jams, jellies and pies. This tree has red leaves in fall as well and so is beautiful all four seasons.
