Mayor Tom Tepe opened the meeting by remembering Lee Cole. Lee was a TP Councilman, a historian and a "Good Man". The Mayor sends thoughts and prayers to Lee's family. The Mayor recognized the TP Fire Department for their excellent work at the recent fire on Myrtle Ave. The fire was a great loss to the family and Tom offered further help to the family when needed.

John Maggard, EMS Chief, reported the seven recruits are training on schedule and doing great.

Steve Dronsfield, Fire Chief, thanked Gerry Hayhow, the TP Fire Department and the Fire Departments from Milford, Mariemont, Anderson, and Madeira-Indian Hill for helping with the Myrtle fire.

Gerald Hayhow, Village Administrator, asked that TP homeowners to have their chimneys cleaned and inspected annually.

Ten golf carts have been inspected and have their Ohio license plates. There is no charge for the inspection. Please check the Village website for more information.

Regina Sharp, Planning and Zoning, advised there is a meeting at the Community House March 19 at 7:15PM to review changes in the zoning code.

Lauren Ingebritson, Building and Grounds, will need additional funds for tree care. There was a meeting on January 30th to address the 3500 trees on Village Property and the 700 Maple trees planted in the 1950s that need attention. There is a winter lower price from tree companies that she wants to use.

Jeff LeMay, Finance, presented four resolutions for authorizing insurance coverage under the Ohio Government Risk management plan, for requesting the County Auditor to make tax advances during 2019, for empowering the Chief Fiscal Officer to revise the 2019 Appropriation budget, and to authorize the purchase of a Kubota ZD1211-60 Zero Turn Mower at a price of \$11,148.

Pax Lindell, Public Works, presented a resolution for an agreement with Jamison Construction Solutions, Inc, for the Winding Brook Lane creek restoration project at a cost not to exceed \$23,160 and declared an emergency.

The Miami Grove... What's to Be Done With It? (Editor's Note: The following his 60's would skate from the Mil-

re-print is a wonderful letter to the Village Views written by local attorney Flach Douglas in 1969. It offers a vivid glimpse into the Terrace Park of days gone by. Flach was a lifelong resident of the village and passed away in 2016. The Burnham brothers mentioned in the letter lived on Lexington Avenue and were 11 and 12 when they fell off a raft into the Little Miami River on August 18, 1942. Neither boy could swim. Although the option of turning over control of Miami Grove to an outside agency was apparently discussed, that plan was abandoned and the land remains in control of the village as The Miami Grove Nature Preserve.)

When the prehistoric Indians first decided to construct mounds in Terrace Park they backed up their defenses with the Little Miami River. The Covalts probably had the same idea when they built their station. When the subdividers of Gravelotte were offering the people of Cincinnati the ideal location for their summer homes they promoted the beauties of the Little Miami River.

Surprisingly, the influx of the corporate executives after the war was not motivated by the river, but anyone growing up in Terrace Park during the depression and the war was deeply aware of its existence.

Next, nobody had any money during the depression, so much of our amusement was centered around the river. My most vivid memory is the death of Bo and Paul Burnham. I was with them when they drowned and have never exculpated my own sense of complicity in their deaths. Stevey Critchell and I went swimming in the river in February. Hudson Berry, the father of the Ohio Valley Anti-Pollution Compact, in

ford Bridge to the point and back. I lost a canoe in the river just a couple of years ago. Parents who come to this town in maturity will not appreciate this river the way their children do.

The kids know what I mean

The kids know what I mean. They know about the shallows along Miami Avenue where Hans Gehrig used to set out his Ivory Soap trout lines. They have seen Carl Hettrick fish the river. They have seen the old men of Milford fish off the point. They have been swimming, rock hunting, frogging, fishing and funning even when you did not even know it. This is the place they can escape from you parents to fight the Indians of a century ago.

But the "Grove" was always a problem. Earl Runyon ran the roughest bar in southwest Ohio down there. The Miami Grove landlord was so unpopular that one Halloween some of you now-leading-citizens threw rotten eggs and tomatoes all over his house. Harry Minnick, the Police Chief, was not about to interfere. But through the efforts of Carl Lindell, Hans Gehrig and some others, the village finally acquired the

Folks, it is ours! Now what are we going to do with it? Well, we sure don't want to make it a park. We have several alternatives which do make a tremendous amount of sense. First, the matter must be removed from political influence vagaries. There are two organizations ideally equipped to administer and preserve the Miami Grove area. One is Little Miami Inc.; the other is the Cincinnati Nature Center.

Next month these organizations will be reviewed, and we will attempt to show why this beautiful part of Terrace Park should be conveyed in trust.



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Garden Club Learns About Terrariums

In January, the Terrace Park Garden Club (TPGC) hosted presenter Mychael Rumping from A.J. Rahn Greenhouses at its monthly meeting. Mychael demonstrated, in less than 30 minutes, how to create a beautiful terrarium to brighten up any indoor space. It also makes a great project to do with your kids during the cold, indoor months.

Mychael's easy steps and tips include the following:

- Glass Select a large glass container (helps plants access sunlight, and you can see everything)
- Base First, add a half-inch level amount of river pebble or horticultural charcoal (for water reservoir and to aerate soil)
- Soil Then add dry, all-purpose potting soil (stays wet longer) not to exceed 1/3 of the container's height
- Plants Select plants that have similar care requirements, such as moist soil and amount of light, and vary the growth height, texture and color. Apply the design rule of 3's.

Use Tropical plants – they like being within moist soil and a humid container:

- Baby Tears (lowest height) roots grow out, don't need an entire patch and can break some off from the root system
- Club Foot Fern (middle height)
- Creeping Ficus (tallest height)
- Plants should sit about ½ way up the container
- Use a spray bottle to mist the roots before you plant them
- Don't plant them too deeply, or go all the way down to the base layer
- Add a pinch of soil to keep plants upright as needed
- Don't cram the plants together leave open space

• Trim the plants regularly as

- Cover Soil Cover the top of the soil with a thin layer of pea gravel or sand to prevent fungus
- gnats from laying eggs
 Stones and Moss Finally, add these last as accents
 - Spray with water bottle until
