Mayor Tells Council No Septic/ Sewer Changes on Calendar

The May 2019 meeting of the Village of Terrace Park Council was called to order by Mayor Tepe. The first order of business was the swearing in of four of the five recently certified EMS Village volunteers. Mayor Tepe mentioned how fortunate the Village is to have continued volunteer support. The following were sworn by the Mayor: John Gatch, Ben Stevens, Erica Moore, and Jennifer Wade. At a later meeting, Cavan Scheetz will be sworn into service.

Mayor: Mr. Tepe recently spoke to the Hamilton County Health Commissioner concerning an update on the installation of sewers in the Village. This will be a very long process. The District is now completing a survey and no decision is pending in the near future. With warmer weather, the Mayor asked resident to be more aware of children out and to slow down. He then announced the retirement of Hester Sullivan, Clerk of Council, and thanked her for her hard work and service.

Police Chief/Village Adminis-

trator: Chief Hayhow also thanked Hester for her assistance. He noted that an address change has been approved for 95 Miami, now addressed as 95 Michigan. He stated also that 55 golf carts have been registered and complimented residents for their support.

Planning/Zoning: A meeting was held on April 23 regarding the health and maintenance of the many trees in the Village.

Finance: Mr. LeMay noted that work has already begun on the 2020 annual budget and a public hearing will be held in the future.

Public Works: A thanks was given by Mr. Lindell to all of those who have been volunteering for training to support services to the Village. Regina Sharp was also thanked for her recruiting efforts. The Mayor asked what changes have taken place that has resulted in having more new volunteers. A discussion followed.

With no continued or new business, the Mayor adjourned the meeting.

An open letter to our community,

Last year, when we lost our Jack, our inclination was to do nothing. We didn't want to mourn quietly or hold a small memorial. A volatile numbness set in - a scream that rumbled endlessly cutting out all thought - and nothing was all we could bear. But as soon as we were able to begin reaching out to our community of family and friends consisting of neighbors, coworkers, fellow volunteers, school and gym buddies, and so many more, we were swept up in your loving arms.

Our kitchen table become a meeting ground and all we had to do was nod, "yes," shake our head, "no," or drink gallons of tea and laugh at life. Our community did what they do best. They loved.

A sea of people supported us not only in making Jack's memorial happen, but by attending, participating and allowing us the opportunity to ask you for what we needed -- a sense of normalcy, a look in the eye at Kroger, a hug, a laugh, whatever you thought could comfort us we would accept. This horror was new to us and somehow, we recognized that as we muddled through you were right there beside us, unsure of the next step.

Little could we comprehend the door we had opened.

You gave us so much. Hugs in the street, a "hello" at Kroger, invitations to nights out, an extra seat at the historically men's Friday poker, meals, care packages, therapy sessions at the gym, toilet paper, photos, bleach, a necklace, handmade crafts, a ring for Pete, a windchime, books, cards, donations and so much more. We cannot list it all.

As we moved forward and gave ourselves permissions - to laugh, to hug, to smile - we were called brave. The truth though, is that you are brave: saying something when you don't know what to say, reaching out when you feel like you may be grabbing a fragile piece of glass, laughing with us instead of screaming. We know that it must have taken amazing courage to knock on our door for impromptu visits filled with hugs. You have gifted us with your stories and conversations about Jack, about your families, about love, about loss and about mental health.

These gifts you have given us gifts that took your energy, time and love -- are without a doubt the reason we are capable of getting up in the morning,

So, thank you. Thank you for letting us hold up our head and laugh. Thank you for rescuing us from the undertow of grief, lifting us up, and placing us back on shore.

We have one final request. Let us all be the change when it comes to mental health. Not just starting the conversation but finding cures and finding ways to bring about change to our mental health system.

If you or someone you love is struggling, please reach out and keep reaching out until someone listens. Be honest. Be direct. Be brave. Because if you are, someone will catch you. We, your community, will catch you.







Lacrosse Program- A Brotherhood

The sport of lacrosse is now ingrained in the fabric of our community. As the Cincinnati Enquirer's Scott Springer recently wrote in his May 1st article, "The nine miles on Wooster Pike between Terrace Park and Mariemont may be the most fertile local ground in Ohio high school lacrosse. Mariemont High School, which has all of 197 boys based on the most recent calculations used by the Ohio High School Athletic Association, is the top Division II team in the state of Ohio."

Lacrosse is the fastest growing youth sport in the country. The Terrace Park Bulldogs were founded in 1995 by Steve Peterson and that first team consisted of eight boys from the village. The Bulldogs grew to become the feeder for the successful Mariemont Warrior middle and high school programs and that initial group of eight formed the foundation for what was to come. The next year 37 boys signed up for the youth team. This year there are 61 boys on the Bulldogs; 27 on the junior high squad; and 49 playing on the two high school teams.

The secret sauce to the incredible success and participation/retention rates in our boys lacrosse program is the emphasis placed on the concept of brotherhood by the coaches at each level of the program. Several activities are specifically designed to build and foster that. Perhaps the most identifiable is the lacrosse nickname that each boy receives when he joins the program and carries throughout his lacrosse career (and into adulthood in many cases). For the last 15 years, the high school alumni game is played Thanksgiving weekend here in the village. Participants range in age from freshmen in high school to graduates from the earliest varsity teams. While the game is always entertaining, the camaraderie displayed among the players before, during, and after the game is noteworthy and what keeps bringing guys back to play year after year.

Bulldog Youth Night takes place at Kusel Stadium on an an-

nual basis and the younger players take the field and strut their stuff during halftime of the junior varsity and varsity games. Hearing their nicknames over the loudspeaker as Coach P calls the action is a thrill for the boys and always brings laughs from the crowd. A very popular event each year is when the high school players come to Drackett Field to spend a practice day with the Bulldogs, talking and joking with the boys, and conducting drills with them in their respective skill groups.

This year high school coach Michael Long initiated the first new player clinics for youngsters in kindergarten, first, and second grade. What we have seen is that while our boys play together as a group for years and years and experience a significant success on the field, they also develop meaningful relationships with their peers that last long after their playing days end. Some of the older ones also provide program continuity and give back to the game, as there are four

Terrace Park Fishing Report

May was great for fishing around Terrace Park. The Little Miami River is alive with fish and the Grand Valley bass have woken up from their winter slumber. Grand Valley produced large numbers of largemouth bass that were aggressively feeding after the long winter. Fish were caught along the banks on a variety of presentations. Some larger bass were caught working artificial worms out deeper.

The GV fishing tourney on April 27th was well attended once again with 28 boats competing. All of the boats caught fish and the winner had a total of over 7 pounds. This is a great event with door prizes, raffles and lunch provided. Consider joining next year for a fun time!

The summer months should

still produce quality largemouth bites at GV with peak feeding times earlier and later in the day as the temperatures rise. The hot temperatures will create a topwater bite in lowlight hours and deeper presentations during the day.

The Little Miami River produces fish all year round and the summer months are some of the best times to catch fish. Early June should continue to produce White and Hybrid Bass in the LMR while the Smallmouth will continue to bite as the water temps stay cool. Using some small spinners through the riffles should produce results.






