In the days before the Civil War there wasn't much in modern day Terrace Park but just next door, between Terrace Park and Milford, around the area of Pioneer Fence, was a busy little community called Montauk, with hotels, saloons, homes and shops. An 1840's brick Baptist church building is about all that's left today but when the Little Miami was used for commercial transport, Montauk was thriving. According to legend, in one of the old taverns along the river there, the innkeeper would climb a tree next to the building and look into the window of a new guest. If he thought they had anything worth taking, he'd creep into their room and murder them in the night, burying them on the banks of the Little Miami River where their ghostly corpse lights still float along the water.

Another legend comes from up the road in Miamiville, just above Camp Denison. During the Civil War, Confederate John Hunt Morgan led a band of marauders on raids through this area. While trying to burn the railroad bridge opposite the Indian Hill Winter Club, they killed a railroad worker on the tracks. His ghost is said to still appear on dark nights, swinging his lantern on the bike trail, warning

passersby of the fog.

The oldest legend though, dates all the way back to the 1790s, when Covalt Station was the only building in Terrace Park, a guarded log fort where the inhabitants were regularly killed by Shawnee and Miami Indians who claimed these lands as winter hunting grounds. One day James Newell, the school teacher at Columbia, Cincinnati's oldest settlement near present day Lunken Airport, was making his way toward present day Terrace Park to use the grist mill on the Little Miami when he was shot

and killed by Indians somewhere in the creek below the modern day Mariemont Pool. Afterward people began to see what they claimed was his glowing apparition stalking along the path. Perhaps the most credible sighting came in the 1830s from prominent citizens John and Tabitha Armstrong, who lived in the old white brick house on Wooster Pike that is now 50 West. According to the Armstrongs, they were making their way along the old trail through that creek at night when they both claimed to see Newell's ghost, still carrying the grain on his back, and making his way toward Terrace Park in the moonlight. For decades this spooky area was known on old maps as Newell's Hollow.

But the most unusual supernatural Terrace Park tale isn't about a haunted location at all, in fact, it came from the sky...On Monday morning, July 7, 1947, the Cincinnati Enquirer ran a bold headline that proclaimed "Flying Saucers Over Cincinnati". In the accompanying article, a Terrace Park housewife at 908 Elm Avenue claims to have been coming down the stairs around 6pm when she looked out a window on the landing facing west over the nature preserve. There in the sky she saw two discs moving rapidly through the sky. It was the sun gleaming on their shiny, reflective surface that caught her eye. Army aircraft investigated but the unidentified flying objects could not be located and radar at Lunken airport detected nothing. It was as if they had simply vanished over Terrace Park... or perhaps landed!

Like any historic, old village worth its salt, Terrace Park has tales and legends both romantic and tragic, heroic and terrifying, accurate and exaggerated. It's part of our local color and the fabric of our village. Better keep your eyes and ears open this Halloween for mysterious lights along the river, heavy footsteps on the stairs, and little green men in the nature preserve!

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Garden Club Offers Autumn Advice

Tuesday, October 1st Meeting - "Trees and Shrubs: Caring for and Pruning"

The Terrace Park Garden Club (TPGC)'s October 1st meeting in the Community Center will include a presentation by Chris McKeown from Denny McKeown's Bloomin' Garden Centre and Landscape in Blue Ash.

Plants and flowers may get all the attention, but don't forget about trees and shrubs - they need care too. Chris will share insights on how to care for and prune trees and shrubs. The presentation is open to the community from 1:00 -2:00 PM and snacks will be served.

Tips on "How to Put Your Garden to Bed for Winter"

TPGC member and horticulture expert, Barb Bird gave an informational talk at our last meeting on how to clean up your perennial garden in the Fall to prepare for Winter.

What to Clean Up/Do:

- · Cut back overly aggressive perennials that will give you too many small plants
- Remove leaves with powdery mildew or other foliage dis-
- Trim only long rose canes that could get damaged in the wind
- Apply a light mulch layer (and keep it away from the plant's crown) after plants have gone dormant – let a few freezes occur
- For hardier plants, mulch the crown with pine straw or straw to help protect them from freezethaw action
- Water during dry spells once a month when temps are over 40 degrees and as early in the day as

What to Leave Alone:

- Dried foliage and leaves in your bed contain insects that help your plants grow
- Dead stems help mark the plant to avoid accidentally digging it up, or stepping on it
- Some plants may still drop seeds to generate new plants
- Some plants prefer Spring pruning, such as: aster, black-eyed susan, daisy, foxglove, hosta, joe pye weed, lavender, munstead, mugwort, and sage to name a few
 - Early blooming shrubs

have already set their buds for next Spring, and if you prune them now, you risk losing their flowers

 Seed heads and stalks provide food for insects and butterflies, and shelter for birds

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

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

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
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Kiwanis Art Show Raises Scholarship Funds

ships to help support nearly 90 students from the Mariemont School District; many of whom receive support beyond their freshmen year of college.


