

Village Finances Sound; New Vehicles Approved

Tumultuous 2020 was financially stable for Village of Terrace Park finances. Councilmembers met Jan. 12 via Zoom and reviewed year-end reports that offered this good news on two key fronts:

- Budget – Fiscal year 2020 ended with a surplus of \$108,000, largely attributable to a \$93,000 dividend from the Ohio Bureau of Workers' Compensation; and

- Financial sustainability – The village has \$1.793 million in reserve to fund operations for 9.1 months. By law, the village must have a minimum of six months funding available or seek additional revenue sources.

Finance chair Jeff LeMay said the reports are a testament to the “thoughtful way money is spent and choices are made in our community” and praised Col. Gerald Hayhow, police chief and village administrator, and Katie Lyons, chief fiscal officer, for their leadership and due diligence. LeMay said financial security going forward depends upon passage in November of a 5.58-mill renewal levy, which is responsible for nearly one-third of village revenue.

LeMay also addressed village listserv discussion of the Hamilton County Auditor's property reappraisal that generally boosted valu-

ations about nine percent. He said the increased assessment is not surprising because countywide real estate valuations have been mostly flat for nearly 10 years and tax bill increases have reflected levies voters have approved.

In Council action, Col. Hayhow was given a green light to purchase a new police cruiser and a new dump truck for the village. At a cost of \$31,683, a 2021 Ford Explorer Police Interceptor will replace a 2016 unit with more than 336,000 service miles, and a \$28,153 expenditure for a 2021 Ford F-450 dump truck will replace a 2006 truck with more than 306,000 service miles. Manufacturer's guidelines use the odometer reading plus 33 miles for each hour the vehicle is idling to determine service hours.

Col. Hayhow said both vehicles will be purchased under state contract bid and funding is included in the 2020-21 budget.

In his monthly report, Mayor Tom Tepe made the following points:

- He has contacted Karen Ball, Hamilton County compliance coordinator and Metropolitan Sewer District liaison, about Terrace Park's interest in public sewer options. She has placed Terrace Park's request before county commissioners but has no indication when the

issue will be discussed. Mayor Tepe has asked her to contact Milford officials to ascertain their interest in offering sewage treatment to neighboring Terrace Park. “We want options to give to our residents so we can make informed decisions,” he said.

- The village maintenance department did an outstanding job with leaf and Christmas tree pick-up and is ready for snow removal.

- Acknowledging the unrest that's erupting nationwide, he expressed gratitude to councilmembers and residents for their civility.

John Maggard, emergency medical services chief, reported:

- The new class of EMS recruits has resumed training following a holiday recess;

- The first round of COVID-19 vaccine has been administered among the department's first responders and the booster vaccine will be given within the appropriate timeframe;

- CARES Act funding from the federal government has enabled the department to purchase a refurbished lead monitor for the ambulance; and

- A new cellular modem has been installed in the squad to improve interactivity between Terrace

Timothy lived at Covalt Station, the stockaded fort that once stood in Terrace Park, and Rachel lived at Gerard's Station, a similar fort located in Anderson Township. And the minister who performed the wedding? It was Elder John Smith who would build the Smith-Lindell house on Elm Avenue just a few years after.

Over 100 years later, circus owner John F. Robinson had St. Thomas church built on the site of the old fort for the wedding of one of his daughters, Pearl. But perhaps the most roman-

tic of all was the Orchard Hill Motor Court. For most of the twentieth century this was a set of tourist cabins located where Orchard Hill Lane is now off Wooster Pike. For years it was better known by another name—the flashing heart motel! That's right, our little Mayberry once had it's own seedy motel with a flashing neon heart tastefully beckoning the passing motorists. Whether they rented by the hour remains a matter of debate. With spring coming quickly it's not too early to be thinking about your summer garden lineup so be sure to check out the plant sale order form in this issue and get your orders in today. TP EMS Receive COVID Vaccine

In late December, Terrace Park EMS received some of the first doses nationwide of the new Moderna Covid-19 vaccine, as part of Ohio's “Phase 1A” priority group: medical first responders, healthcare professionals and congregate care facility residents/staff.

One challenge is that each 10-dose Moderna vaccine vial can be used for only six to twelve hours after opening. So we scheduled EMTs in groups of ten people who could commit to coming at the same time for both the first dose and the second dose, 28 days later.

The Moderna vaccine was delivered to the TP Fire/EMS station on December 23, just a few days after the FDA's approval, and the first ten EMS members were vaccinated that same day. We vaccinated the first ten EMS members that same day. The second group was on Dec 26, and the last group was vaccinated Jan 2 to include the few people who had been out of town over the holidays. We'll repeat the process for second dose vaccinations, scheduled to be completed by the end of January. Thanks to TP residents and medical professionals Patty Beyersdorfer, John Gatch, and Jill McAdoo for administering shots deftly and quickly!

Per CDC guidelines, everyone was monitored 15-30 minutes after vaccinations, and drug bags were on hand with with epinephrine just in case of any allergic reaction. As expected, no one in TP EMS needed treatment. Worldwide, a

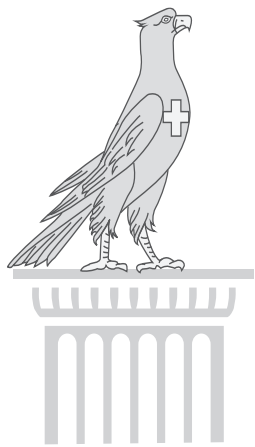
very small number of people have had an allergic reaction after receiving either the Moderna or Pfizer vaccine, and all were successfully treated. The vaccines are new, but are built on an RNA platform that has been developed, analyzed and tested for more than a decade.

TP EMS Chief John Maggard surveyed members after the first dose about any vaccination side effects they had experienced. The most common effect reported was mild soreness for a day or two at the site of the injection. One person said she briefly felt unusual resistance whenever she pulled her shoulders back - weird but temporary! A few EMS members said they had chills, aches or other flu-

like symptoms for a day or so.

To protect others, EMS members will continue to wear masks, on and off life squad runs, and physically distance where possible. People who have been vaccinated are protected from severe Covid-19 symptoms but might still be able to get infected and transmit Covid to others.

Chief Maggard says, “I encourage everyone to get vaccinated as soon as this is available to you! Consult with your doctor if you have any questions or concerns. And, wearing a mask and staying six feet apart is the best way for our community to keep each other safe until most people have been vaccinated and this virus is under control.”

Big Changes in Terrace Park Baseball

Hey batter batter batter swing.... Before long, that chant, and many other chants and cheers will be roaring from Drackett Field. 2021 is bringing in big changes to the Terrace Park Baseball Program. For the past many years, Terrace Park Baseball has been a part of the Cincinnati Knothole Program. This organization has enabled many of our children to learn baseball, make friends, and enjoy the camaraderie of the diamond. Knothole has been a wonderful entry to baseball for many of our children. However, Baseball participant numbers have been dropping in our community (and nationwide) and a change is needed. With that in mind, a decision was made, with consultation from coaches, parents, and our Terrace Park Recreation Commission, to move our program from Knothole to Little League.

We have created a Mariemont Little League Program that combines the entire school district into one program. So what does this mean for our kids? Well, the majority of our kids will still practice only in Terrace Park. Our teams will generally still be fielded entirely with Terrace Park kids. For some older children, there may be some overlap and joint practices at both Terrace Park and Mariemont fields. Our schedule and games will stay roughly the same, and we are playing most of our away games versus either Mariemont or Loveland, which will actually shorten our drive time. For our early baseball kids, the mini-tee and T-ball

programs will remain virtually the same.

What are the positives of this change? There are many. First, we will have the backing of a national organization, Little League Baseball. Little League rules are more favorable to developmental baseball; there are less walks, less stress on pitchers' arms, faster games, and more focus on baseball fundamentals. Second, we will select a "tournament team" of mostly 5th and 6th graders from the district at the end of the season. This team will compete for a chance to play on a National Stage/ESPN at the Little League World Series. These players will get the opportunity to play some of the best baseball players in Southwest Ohio, and potentially the world. Third, Little League offers many other opportunities for our athletes, and we expect to offer Fall Ball, Home Run Derbys, Wiffle Ball tournaments, and other fun events. In short, it will be a big change, but an exciting one.

Despite the changes in the League, our volunteer coaches and parents will still play the same integral part of our system. In fact, there will be very little changes on that front. Our volunteer parent coaches are still vital to our success. It is a hardy 8" to 10" plant which has glossy green leaves and compact flowers of red, pink, or white. It survives sun and heat with little care. It will be delivered in mid May when the ground is warmer. 2) – Angelonia - we added white to the color selection of last year. Please make your selection of healthy, beautiful plants on this form. Plants are listed in three groups (according to packaging) and plants within each group are in alphabetic order. First (A) 5-inch pots for \$4.25, then (B) flats with 18 plants in 4-inch pots for \$18 and finally (C) baskets and miscellaneous plants which are priced individually.
