## MSD Says Highly Unlikely TP Will Join Sewer District

In his monthly report, Mayor Tepe said Karen Ball from the Metropolitan Sewer District believes it's highly unlikely Hamilton County will be extending sewer service to Terrace Park. He attributed the stance to "cost, return on investment and politics." As the deadline for statewide compliance with revised septic system rules looms, Ball said county officials will be talking with state and federal officials about flexibility and funding for alternative sewage systems.

As background, in 2015 Ohio updated its septic system rules and mandated statewide compliance by 2025. On Aug. 9, 2017, an ad hoc sewer feasibility committee led by Mayor Tepe held its first meeting to explore how the community's 600 homes with drywells can best be served. An archive of the committee's work and findings from the county's subsequent \$300,000 sewer feasibility study can be accessed on the village website, www.terracepark.org.

Going forward, Councilmember Jeff LeMay said the Finance Committee is considering the viability of a \$12,000 retainer for Frost Brown Todd Attorneys to interpret Ohio's sewage system law, its implications and recommendations for Terrace Park. The firm's Statement of Work will be addressed June 2.

Sworn into service by Mayor Tom Tepe and EMS Chief John Maggard were: Kristin Crowley, Chad Eckert, Chandi Findley and Mike Kaplan, who also is a Terrace Park Fire Department volunteer.

Fire Department volunteer. "Your gift of time isn't taken for granted," said Mayor Tepe, who recognized their membership in the inaugural class of locally-based training and thanked their families for supporting their commitment.

In Council action:

• The month of June was declared Pride Month in Terrace Park, following a resolution presented by Regina Sharp at the request of Cincinnati Pride. The organization, which promotes acceptance of all individuals, is asking municipalities throughout the region to raise awareness of the need for inclusion as part of its June campaign. Mayor Tepe thanked Councilmember Sharp for her leadership and praised residents for making Terrace Park a welcoming community.

• Following extensive research led by Lt. Tim Chin and the recommendation of Village Administrator/Chief of Police Jerry Hayhow, Council approved Medical Mutual as the health insurance provider for village employees. Rates will increase six percent and participants will be given incentives to reduce the cost of their premiums.

• Strawser Construction, Inc. was approved for resurfacing designated village streets at a cost not to exceed roughly \$46,000. The village website and door-hangers on properties in the work zone will advise residents of the need to detour. Those who have regis-

## Arbor Day in Terrace Park

Each year the Garden Club of Terrace Park gives away small trees to 1st graders to commemorate Arbor Day and to ensure that Terrace Park continues to be designated as a Tree City USA. In years past we have purchased trees through our arborist Mark Castator. The trees we picked were always trees that are smaller and compact so the residents might find a spot for them in their yards. A few years ago, Mark told us about John McAllister, owner of Little Miami Landscaping, who offered to donate the trees to us. John has provided trees for us three times now so if you are considering using a landscaper, please think of Little Miami Landscaping!

John grew up On Miami Avenue, where his parents still live, and grows a lot of trees which he uses in his business. Originally John planned to give us crabapples, but the rabbits chewed them up and we got serviceberries instead. Did you know that crabapples can be used to cross pollenate apple trees? An interesting fact about apples is that you need a differ-ent type of apple or a crabapple in order to have any apples on your trees- the bees have to cross pollinate them. However, this year the students received serviceberries which were 3 feet tall and had leaves and were placed in burlap sacks which John also bought for our students. The students seemed pleased with these trees and I even had one student ask to buy another. I couldn't do this because the trees were donated. Extra trees were offered to our teachers and other staff of the school.

Serviceberries are very cool trees. They have so many names because they have so many uses. They may have let the settlers,



especially those in the mountains, know when it was safe to return to church services. They bloom very early in the spring and have ball-like clusters of white flowers. Many people think they may also have let people know when the ground was soft enough to dig a grave and have a service to bury those that had died in winter. They are called Juneberries because from mid-May until June the berries ripen, at which time the birds have a feast. I have seen the cedar waxwings passing berries to one another on my neighbor Sallie Lyons' beautiful serviceberry. Keep your eye out for this exciting birdwatching experience. Some of you may be fishermen and know about shad which come up rivers in the eastern part of the United States. This tree is also called the shadbush. It blooms when they make their journeys. Some of the students asked me if they could eat the berries. Yes, you can - but the birds will try to beat you to it. They taste like blueberries mixed with apples and have a nutty crunch as well. I have yet to eat one myself since my goal is usually to see the birds. I almost forgot to mention that they have nice fall leaf color as well.

We hope many of our first graders and their families are able to keep the trees alive and that in years to come we will see these trees growing here. Mark Castator, John Mc Allister and I will be looking for them hoping these native beauties with so many uses grow in your yards.

Yes, I am gone now, but not forgotten. What a blessing you all have been to me over the years. Please know you are not forgotten either.





in England, he got a letter from his wife, Earline Carpenter, saying that she was having a baby. Wilfred did not want Earline to have a baby just in case he did not come home. Wilfred was not able to make it home in time to see the baby being born. The first time he saw the baby was when he was 2 ½ years old. Meeting baby Ronald reminded him how much he had to sacrifice to give his son and others a good life.

Wilfred had so many stories to tell about his time overseas. While in England sitting on a bench, a lady came over to talk to him and they talked for a while. Once she left someone came over and said, "Do you know who you were just talking to?" Wilfred didn't even know that he had just been talking to the Queen of England! Not many people can say that!

While fighting in France he was a forward observer, which means troops follow him and he checks what is in front of them. While he was leading the way, the snow-covered ground allowed the troops to follow his footprints. As the snow began to melt, the troops noticed that Wilfred had missed land mines by just a quarter of an inch. He was so lucky the other men would later say.

Sadly, Wilfred died on January 2, 2010, 7 days after his 88th birthday and 9 months after he traveled with his daughter, my grandma, to Washington, D.C. with the Honor Flight to view the World War II Memorial. He worked so hard and earned 18 medals from his battling! He is a hero and is so brave. We will always remember him!

Memorial Day used to mean to me that the pool was opening, and it was the start of summer. I always loved the parade and getting lots of candy. Now, I really know what it means to honor those soldiers that fought for us and didn't make it home. Those soldiers who fought sacrificed their lives so we could have a good one. That is what true heroes do. On Memorial Day we spend time with family and enjoy our freedom that we have because of all of those soldiers who battled for us. This is a day dedicated to remembrance.



# TPPAR (Virtually) Brings Allen Woods of MORTAR to **Terrace** Park

On Tuesday, March 30, Terrace Park Parents Against Racism (TPPAR) hosted Allen Woods, executive director of MORTAR, for a conversation about the shared challenges that minority founders face when launching a new business. Over a dozen Terrace Park residents joined the virtual session.

Woods, an Indianapolis native, co-founded OTR-based MORTAR in 2014 to enable historically marginalized entrepreneurs to access the resources needed to start and run successful businesses. Starting a business is hard, Woods explained, but there are unique challenges minority entrepreneurs face. For example, access to capital and affordable business training is needed for groups who have historically have not had access to either. MORTAR's signature program is a 15-week entrepreneur academy that helps startups and young companies learn the ins and outs of owning a business.

Woods was joined by Erika Gray, a graduate of MORTAR's entrepreneur academy and founder of District 78 - a company selling boutique candles, clothing, and plants on 2908 Short Vine. (You can shop her

store at https://bydistrict78. com/.) Gray described the importance of MORTAR in her success as a small business owner in Cincinnati. Gray is just one of the hundreds of graduates who are fueling innovative business growth in Cincinnati and other cities across the US. MORTAR also offers affordable retail space for pop-up shops and a \$10,000 grand prize each year to one graduate of their program. Terrace Park resident and friend of Woods, Chad

Reynolds, introduced the pro-gram and says, "Allen and MORTAR are not only shining a light on where inequalities lie, but actively building solutions for individuals, communities, and policy-makers. We're excited about how residents of Terrace Park could help support these initiatives."

This program was the second in TPPAR's Speaker Series. The first featured critically acclaimed young adult author Sharon Draper. Program open to all Terrace Park residents. Please stay tuned for the next speaker evening which will be this summer.






