Council asks for Tax Levy Support

Terrace Park voters will be asked to renew an existing 5.58mill operating levy on November 2nd, 2021. This is a renewal of an existing operating levy and will not increase or decrease your current

If approved, the levy will generate \$670,000 annually for the village to be used for Police, Fire, EMS, streets, sidewalks, maintenance and village administration. It represents almost 29% of the overall Terrace Park general operating fund.

If renewed, the levy will continue to cost homeowners \$558 per \$100,000 of Hamilton County assessed property value for 5 years (note: an assessed property value is 35% of the Hamilton County determined market value).

TP Village taxes represent 15% of your annual real estate tax bill. Mariemont public schools represent 65% of the same with 12 Hamilton County issues accounting for the remaining 20%. Unlike other like villages (Mariemont, Madeira, Wyoming, etc.), Terrace

Park has no personal income tax or fees for garbage, etc.

Terrace Park Fire, Police, EMS, Buildings and Grounds, our committees and departments and council continue to operate in a fiscally responsible manner. We anticipate achieving our 2021 operating budget targets while meeting our basic operational requirements. We continue to maintain a prudent level of cash consistent with a small and efficient government. A budget cap is in place on village employee salaries and benefits sufficient to attract, retain and reward our important village employees while ensuring we provide good service to our residents.

It is for these reasons that council asks for your support and a Yes" vote on November 2nd.

Law & Order: SVU Summer Views Update

During an exchange with the Officer, the driver had complained that one of the occupants had taken his \$100. After the trash was picked up, personal belongings placed back into the car, and the tire was finally changed, (and everyone was super excited to be on their way home and possibly take a siesta) nobody could find the keys to the car. The Officer then transported the subjects from this mess

During the morning of 5/6, Lindsey Schmidt(!) was pulled over for speeding in our lovely neighborhood of Terrace Park. Yours Truly usually doesn't mention names in the Police Report but...

On the evening of 6/12, Subject #1 arrived at the Station and advised an Officer that she has been hearing voices coming from the air conditioning units and other various electronic devices. Subject #1 also advised that there are known terrorists in the areas of Indian Hill, Terrace Park, Milford, and Union Township. The Officer assisted the subject and advised her to also contact Union Township Police.

Council Talks Sewers, Power Lines and Lacrosse

Terrace Park Village Council officially began its inquiry into the State of Ohio's septic system policy with correspondence to the Hamilton County solicitor and a courtesy note to the county health commis-

Representing the village, Frost Brown Todd Attorneys asked which Ohio ordinance takes precedence: The one that allows drywells and permits residents to repair them, or the ordinance that bans dry wells and gives Hamilton County Board of Health purview and control. The correspondence also asked for a set of principles and rules so residents know what constitutes change to an existing septic system.

As background, in 2015 Ohio updated its septic system rules and mandated statewide compliance by 2025. On Aug. 9, 2017, an ad hoc sewer feasibility committee led by Mayor Tom Tepe held its first meeting to explore how the community's 600 homes with drywells can best be served. An archive of the committee's work, findings from the county's subsequent \$300,000 sewer feasibility study and recent comment from Karen Ball of the Metropolitan Sewer District stating extension of county sewer service to Terrace Park is "highly unlikely" can be accessed on the village website, www.terra-

No acknowledgment of the Frost Brown Todd correspondence was received by council's Aug. 10 meeting; however, there was good news on other fronts:

- Both the Mariemont High School women's and men's lacrosse teams were honored with mayoral proclamations for winning Ohio Division II championships June 5; and
- Federal and county grants to the village totaling roughly \$300,000 were announced.

A near-capacity crowd of lacrosse players, their coaches, parents and fans attended the meeting to hear the mayor's proclamations and learn that Aug. 11 would be Mariemont Women's Lacrosse State Champions Day in Terrace Park, and Aug. 12 would be Mariemont Men's Lacrosse State Champions Day in the community.

Coach Kevin Ferry, who accepted the proclamation on behalf of the women's team, noted this was the second state lacrosse title for the women and the fifth state lacrosse title for the men. He said there is a winning culture woven into the fabric of our community..

Coach Michael Long, who spoke on behalf of the men's team, said that only one other Ohio school has seen both its men and women's teams win state titles in the same season. He thanked the community for its support and the mayor for the recognition.

As for the grants, the federal

COVID-related American Res-

cue Plan Act funds arrive in two installments of \$120,000 each and recipients must certify allocation for eligible purchases. Council passed a resolution at the Aug. 10 meeting to add the first installment to the $\bar{2}021$ appropriations budget; the second installment is expected in about 12 months. The funds must be spent by 2026. The county's matching grant for a total of about \$52,000 was awarded for repair and resurfacing of Elm Avenue from Wooster Pike to Park Avenue. Included in the project will be catch basin reconstruction to remove the dip in the road. The work will be

In other announcements: • Duke Energy will be

burying electric lines throughout Terrace Park to eliminate the need to trim trees from power lines and reduce the need to restore power following storms. Work has been completed on private streets such as Kris Circle, Melissa Court and Winding Brook. A master plan for the rest of the community is in the
