Prevent Thefts By Locking-Up

Police Chief Jerry Hayhow has three words for residents concerned about recent thefts in the village: "Lock your door." His advice was in response to Jeff Kropp and Chris Minges from Red Bird Lane, who attended Village Council's Oct. 12 meeting to proactively address the topic.

Kropp's truck was stolen from his driveway Sept. 19 and recovered shortly thereafter. "Is there anything we, as residents, can do to notify others?" he asked.

Chief Hayhow said that in each recently reported case, cars were left unlocked. As for warning others, residents have two established forms of public notification:

• TPlistserve is an email service unassociated with village administration that is not intended for reporting crimes or emergencies; and

• CodeRED, a system that allows government agencies to deliver advisories to residents who have registered to receive urgent email, phone and text messages. To receive the free service, go online to www.terracepark.org and click on the CodeRED link to complete a registration form.

Kropp and Minges also ex-

pressed concern home construction traffic is damaging Red Bird Lane. Hayhow said he talked with the contractor when construction began and will touch base upon conclusion to ensure the pavement is repaired, if necessary.

In council action, the following measures were approved:

• An amendment proposed by Judith Lehman, rules and law chair, that will prohibit overflow parking on Miami Avenue from nearby business patrons;

• An agreement presented by Pax Lindell, public works chair, that accepts municipal road funds from Hamilton County for improvements to Elm Avenue from Park Avenue to Wooster Pike; and

• A resolution proposed by Jeff LeMay, finance chair, that affirms the taxes levied by Terrace Park and amounts collected by Hamilton County on behalf of the village are in alignment.

In his monthly village administrator's report, Hayhow said he has renewed an agreement with Energy Alliance, which has saved the village more than \$3,700 on its Duke Energy bill since 2020. He also noted that leaf pickup has begun and asked residents to help protect expensive maintenance equipment by keeping rocks, sticks and branches out of their leaf piles. Residents are also asked to refrain from piling leaves on gravel parking pads.

In other monthly reports, building and grounds chair Regina Sharp and Lindell said their committees are considering how best to spend the second installment of federal COVID-related American Rescue Plan Act funds; and LeMay said talks are ongoing with county and state officials regarding Terrace Park's inquiry into the State of Ohio's septic system policy that affects about 600 local properties with drywells.

As background, Terrace Park is asking for clarification from the state on which of its septic system ordinances takes precedence: The one that allows drywells and permits residents to repair them, or the ordinance that bans drywells and gives Hamilton County Board of Health purview and control. A determination is sought in advance of the state's 2025 deadline for compliance with septic system rules passed in 2015.

"I don't expect this will be a quick fix or resolution," LeMay said. "There will be twists and turns and ups and downs. We'll just need to push through."

In September of 1897, eightr-old Virginia O'Han old. resident of New York City, wrote a letter to The New York Sun that questioned the existence of Santa Claus. The job of answering that query fell on Francis Pharcellus Church, an editor at the paper who was not happy to get the assignment. Church had served as a correspondent in the American STREET. Civil War and had seen such horror and brutality between men that it hardened him into a bitter cvnic who had no patience for childish things. Yet somehow, despite that, Church's eloquent response addressed a much larger question and unwittingly became the most re-printed editorial in United States history. Here is Miss O'Hanlon's letter and Mr. Church's response as they appeared in the September 21, 1897 edition of The Sun.

Is There a Santa Claus?

DEAR EDITOR: I am 8 years

old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus.

Papa says, 'If you see it in THE SUN it's so.'

Please tell me the truth; is there a Santa Claus?

VIRGINIA O'HANLON. 115 WEST NINETY-FIFTH TRFFT

VIRGINIA, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the bound-


November 5th. Looks like someone got confused.


