

Talk But No Action Yet On Sewage Mandate

No formal action was taken after Terrace Park Council met in executive session Feb. 8 to discuss compliance with Ohio's 2025 sewage treatment deadline that affects about 600 village homes with drywells.

Village officials have been addressing the state mandate for nearly five years and in mid-2021 retained Frost Brown Todd Attorneys, specialists in this particular issue, to interpret Ohio's sewage system law, its implications and recommendations for Terrace Park.

Jeff LeMay, council member for finance, made a motion following completion of the February meeting agenda, to enter the private, off-the-record session to discuss "imminent litigation with legal counsel" to move the issue forward. Mayor Tom Tepe explained that if the discussion required formal action, he would reconvene the meeting; otherwise, council would adjourn after the session.

Since no action was taken, the public meeting was one of council's shortest on record at under 15 minutes. However, a lot of business was conducted.

Five resolutions were approved and as a result:

• Insurance coverage required by the Ohio Government Risk Management Plan will be renewed at a cost not to exceed \$27,410.

• The Hamilton County auditor will be asked to release village tax dollars six months prior to the deadline, a provision provided by law;

• The village budget will be revised to fund Terrace Park's portion of a county and state matching grant to repair Elm Avenue, and an engineering study for potential water line extension on Elm Avenue.

• JK Meurer, a Lovelandbased paving company, will be retained for the Elm Avenue repair and resurfacing project.

• Council members Lauren Ingebritson and LeMay will serve one-year terms on the Volunteer Firefighters' Dependents Fund Board to represent local interests in the event of death or disability in the line of duty.

A first reading was given an ordinance that amends the zoning code for fences in a rear yard on a corner lot, uniform openness for fences facing a front yard and guidelines for parking trailers in a rear yard.

In monthly reports:

• Mayor Tepe praised Administrator Jerry Hayhow and members of the maintenance crew for their outstanding response to a storm that brought ice, sleet and snow to village streets. They treated streets with 34 tons of salt and each driver logged 15.5 hours of overtime work.

• Solicitor Jeff Forbes said the Ohio House and Senate have approved a bill that will, if signed by the governor, allow local governments to conduct remote or virtual meetings through the end of June.

• Emergency Medical Services Chief John Maggard reported all four recent recruits have passed their tests and graduated. He expects them to complete driver training and other details prior to council's next meeting, March 8, when they are scheduled to be sworn into service.

Woman Routs Bandits who Beat Husband

From The Cincinnati Post on Monday, March 26, 1934

A band of robbers terrorized a suburban home Sunday but fled empty-handed after beating one of their victims into unconsciousness and threatening his wife.

The holdup was attempted at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Miller, Wooster-pike Terrace Park, about 4 a.m. Sunday when the Millers were roused from their sleep by a knock at the door.

Through the closed door a man told Mr. Miller that he was seeking information about a fam-

ily that had moved out of the neighborhood.

As he opened the door three men push themselves inside and two of them leveled revolvers at him. Mrs. Miller ran to the kitchen and obtained a pistol. The unarmed man followed her.

As Mrs. Miller started to return with the weapon the man detailed to guard her warned her that his companions would kill her husband if she fired.

Meanwhile, the other men, after making a demand for money, had started beating Mr. Miller on the head with the butts of their pistols. He fell to the floor. They cursed him and threaten the lives of both. Mrs. Miller said.

When she told them that she had called the police while in the rear of the house the three men apparently became frightened and fled to their car, in which a fourth man was waiting. Mrs. Miller obtained the license number.

Dr. J.C. Spence, Milford, was called to treat Mr. Miller. Several stitches were required to close cuts on his head. His condition is not believed to be serious.

"They were strangers, but I can identify them if they are ever caught," Mrs. Miller said.




