• Completely new furniture, including new dining tables, chairs, and chaise lounges


• Renovated bathroom and changing facilities

If you think pedaling up Elm Avenue after a hot day at the swim club is difficult – it might have been worse. In early 1956 when the Swim Club was first being organized, there was an attempt to purchase property at the very end of Miami Avenue, down the steep hill where it becomes Edgewater. But the property near the tunnel became available and the 75' by 35' aluminum pool and 20' by 20' wading pool were constructed for \$25,000.

Village Council Finalizes Septic Agreement with Hamilton County Board of Health

The Mayor and Terrace Park Council finalized an agreement on 4/11/2022 with the Hamilton County Board of Health (HCBH) to amend requirements related to replacement of traditional dry well septic systems. This agreement allows residents to continue operating these systems until 12/31/2045 and changes the requirements for system replacement associated with material or meaningful home improvements.

There are two issues addressed with this agreement: 1) The State of Ohio banned traditional drywell septic systems and gave enforcement responsibility of the same to HCBH effective 5/11/2015. This 2015 deadline was then extended to 12/31/2025 (+10 years) to allow Terrace Park and other localities to evaluate alternatives (i.e. sewers). This

Team Warriors for a Cure was named Runner Up in the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's 2022 Student of the Year fundraising competition. The team raised just over \$100,000, earning them the Top Campaign Fundraiser Impact Award. Team leaders Patrick Crowley, Graham Kempiners, Sadie Kohlman and Ryder Osgood pitched and received several local sponsorships during the campaign, including sponsorships from the Oliver Family Foundation, United Dairy Farmers, ENT & Allergy Specialists, the Cyclones Foundation and Snow Commerce. The team sent out over 1800 letters and held successful events, including a bake sale and a community open mic night. Terrace Park Elementary sixth graders generously contributed by organizing a fund drive at TPE. septic/sewer conundrum! Thanks to the hard work of our village council and TP resident and attorney Bill Hayes, the issue is off our plates until 2045 so go ahead and resume those plans for the

new agreement extends the deadline until 12/31/2045 (+ 20 years from 2025) without giving up the right for further negotiation or if needed, litigation. 2) The current HCBH requirement forces residents with traditional drywells to replace them with newer and costly (i.e. \$30K +) aerobic/ mechanical systems when making any "material" or "meaningful" change to their home (think building permit issuance). This new agreement unifies septic system upgrade requirements consistent with rules in place for the newer systems. These requirements are available on the HCBH website and are captured in Section 3 "Material Improvement" in our agreement.

A sewer alternative was ruled out due significant Metropolitan Sewer District capital cost (with no payout), the investment re-

Terrace Park Council Provides Updates on Village Trees

We provided the following update on the village tree maintenance program at the April Village Council meeting:

We are moving non emergency tree removal to the following schedule: tree cutting in August, stump grinding in September, and new planting in October. This enables us to shorten time between cutting and stump grinding and trees have a better chance of survival being planted in the fall. We can still get better pricing during this time period.

As for an update on the current status of the scheduled tree maintenance, we have 2800+ village trees, all are cataloged in a master spreadsheet by health and species. Each year we have trees that have to come down due to health issues with a danger to person or place. 50+ years ago the village planted over 900 maples trees that have an estimated life span of 50 years. The village increased the tree budget a few years back knowing we were going to have to cut down and replant more than average trees per year due to these maples. In addition, we had been taking down the Ash trees due to the Emerald Ash Borer infesta-

40-50 trees towards this goal of replacing these trees. This is outside of any other trees that may have to be trimmed or come

down and how much it may cost to take down a tree based on size and location. As of right now we have about 119 trees classified as Poor(104), Critical(15) about half of which are the maples. Of the Maples we have about 640 in total left but many are still in Fair or Good condition so do not need to come down this year. Our annual budget for the tree program is \$92,000 (which we get in two payments in May and September).

Remembering a Special Lady

For those who grew up in Terrace Park, you may have had her as your 2nd grade teacher and fondly called her Mrs Harrier. To others she was a loving mom, doting grandma, animal lover, neighbor and friend.

Patricia Jane, who has always gone by Jane, was originally from Indianapolis, Indiana. Her Mother, Ruth Freeny was an accomplished pianist and had studied at the Indianapolis College Conservatory of Music. Jane's father, William Freeny, had graduated from St John's College in Annapolis, Maryland and then received his Law degree from the University of Maryland Law school and had become a successful attorney.

When Jane was only 2 yrs old, her father was killed in a hunting accident. Her mother and grandmother chose to uproot and move to Phoenix for a new start, warmer weather and for her mother to continue pursuing her piano teaching career. Jane grew up in Phoenix, Arizona and attended Phoenix High School before going to College at University of Southern California where she majored in English Literature and graduated with honors. She met her future husband Stanley Harrier, in college and shortly after Graduation, they were married and started a life together in Southern California. Jane became a school teacher and Stanley was an engineer.

Stanley's career in research and development of aircraft engines for General Electric brought his family to Cincinnati in the mid 1960's. Stan and Jane, along with their 3 children Tim, Sue and Mary, Jane's mother Ruth, one dog and a parakeet, all made the trek across the country in two cars and many days later settled in Terrace Park on Park Avenue.

Jane resumed her career as a teacher and joined Mariemont City Schools, working mostly at the Terrace Park Elementary School and finishing at the Mariemont Elementary School. She loved her work and taught for Mariemont Schools for 19 years. Eight of those years were devoted to teaching children with special needs. Her concern for this area led her to pursue a Masters Degree in Education and Special Education.

Jane taught a total of 26 years and retired in 1985. She and Stanley enjoyed retirement with much travel to Europe, Hawaii and the Caribbean. Jane was an active member to a number of professional organizations as well as a member of St Thomas Epis-

copal Church, Woman's Club, and Garden Club. Jane loved the arts and regularly attended the symphony, opera, Theatre, olunteering at the Art Museum and would attend the Lecture Series at the Mercantile Library in Downtown Cincinnati .

After the death of her husband in 2000, a few years later, she was introduced to Hazen P Master, a retired manager for the Continental Can Company. She married Hazen and moved to Indian Hill. An article was written in the Cincinnati Enquirer about the newly married couple and how they had both been previously married for fifty years and then found happiness again at the ages of 75. After five happy years together, Hazen died and Jane moved back to her beloved Terrace Park to be close to her children, grandchildren and friends.

Jane loved her family and was devoted to them all and especially enjoyed seeing all her grandchildren and great grandchildren. She cared and loved so many animals throughout the years and most recently her Calico cat Paisley. She welcomed people into her home always with such warmth and hospitality. She was a woman of great intelligence and beauty. She had unfailing cheerfulness, amazingly great sense of humor and a contagious positive attitude about life. She always felt so blessed and mentioned it often, to have found the treasure of living and raising her family in Terrace Park.She will be deeply missed by so many.

She is survived by two daughters; Sue Harrier Dolan (Phil Dolan), Mary Harrier Arkeilpane, Tim Harrier (Sabine Flessa Harrier), step daughter Cici Master Grant (Peter Grant), six grandchildren; Paige Dolan, Liz, Kyle and Alex Arkeilpane, Sarah and Katie Harrier and six great-grandchildren; Lucy and Leo Arkeilpane Luna, Holland and Lennon Swift, and Iggy Davey.

A memorial service celebrating Jane's life will be held at St. Thomas Espiscopal Church in Terrace Park on Saturday June 4th at 4pm.
