Arborist Castator Retires with Admirable Legacy& Council's Gratitude

Terrace Park is seeking an urban forester to succeed local resident and certified arborist Mark Castator, who has held the part-time position the past 10 years. His retirement was announced at Village Council's Sept. 14 meeting by Mayor Tom Tepe, who praised Castator for his accomplishments and thanked him for his service.

"He gave us great tree planting, had great forethought and education and brought some important issues to light," Tepe said.

Most notably, Castator was responsible for keeping the village-owned forest of more than 3,000 trees healthy and adding 60 new species and cultivars to the registry, which more than qualifies Terrace Park for

arboretum certification by nationally accepted standards.

Over the years, he has worked with the local garden club to source trees for their annual Arbor Day tree giveaway; has regularly spoken at the elementary school on Earth Day; established a nursery to lower the cost of tree acquisition; and has worked with the State of Ohio on its Tree City program, which has honored Terrace Park for 38 consecutive years, making it the third most-honored municipality in Greater Cincinnati.

"He's been a good partner and educator," said Regina Sharp, councilmember who has oversight for buildings and grounds. She noted that in years past, 30 percent of village trees needed replacement due to blight or other issues, but under Castator's management that number has been reduced to 10 percent. Vigilant tree maintenance has also meant fewer broken trees on power lines following storms.

Tepe invited residents who may be interested in the position or can recommend someone for the job to contact Village Administrator Jerry Hayhow or Councilmember Sharp.

As part of his mayor's report, Tepe proclaimed Sept. 30 Virginia Cook Marquett Day in recognition of her 100th birthday. He also thanked residents for leading and supporting the Labor Day festivities and 5K Bulldog Run, which raised funds for the Terrace Park Rec-

Remembering a Teacher and a Friend

Terrace Park resident Nathan Turner, MHS Class of 2022, set out to leave a memorial for one of his favorite teachers from Terrace Park Elementary, Jane Concannon. Nathan was new to Terrace Park in 2009 and had Mrs. Concannon as his halfday Kindergarten teacher. He remembers her as a kind soul who always made everyone feel welcome and special. He loved her way of including everyone and calling everyone her friend. Nathan remembers one of her favorite books, Mrs. Spitzer's Garden, and how he got to take Chester the Monkey (puppet), home to show off to his family and write about their adventures. Many parents referred to her style of teaching as "Mary Poppins-like". Jane Concannon was well loved by all.

In March 2019, Jane Concannon passed away from ALS. She definitely left a void in our community and Nathan decided he wanted to create a memorial to her. He started to raise money and collect plastic bottle caps and lids to to be turned into a bench for the Kindergarten playground. He raised \$400 and collected 400 lbs of lids to get the recycled park bench. The help of friends and neighbors made the task of collecting enough plastic caps a lot easier. This bench is a "friend bench", a place where a child can sit to signal to others that they need someone to play with. The bench totally captures the spirit of our sweet Jane Con-

Terrace Park Council asks for Support to Renew an Existing Tax Levy on November 7th

Terrace Park voters will be asked to renew an existing 2.5-mill operating levy on November 7th, 2023. This is a renewal of an existing operating levy and will not increase or decrease your current taxes.

If approved, the levy will generate \$320,000 annually for the village to be used for Police, Fire, EMS, streets, sidewalks, maintenance and village administration. It represents approximately 13% of overall Terrace Park operating funds.

If renewed, the levy will continue to cost homeowners \$250 per \$100,000 of Hamilton County assessed property value for 5 years (note: an assessed property value is 35% of the Hamilton County determined market value).

Terrace Park village opera-

tions represent the smallest portion (15%) of your annual real estate tax bill with Mariemont public schools representing 65% of the same and the 12 Hamilton County levies accounting for the remaining 20%.

Unlike Mariemont, Madeira, Williams Meadow, Wyoming and Indian Hill, Terrace Park does not have an income tax (Wyoming has an income tax for schools as well). Terrace Park has no fees for garbage collection.

Your village committees, departments and council continue to operate in a fiscally responsible manner. Examples include a significant reduction in cost for leaf/brush leaf removal, a refinancing of our bond is-

- · A resolution to admit David Fine, Matt Ziegler and Drew Walter into volunteer Emergency Medical Service was approved;
- Rumpke was granted a five-year contract extension for trash removal and recycling pickup;
- The Ohio Department of Transportation received a revised consent agreement for its 2024 repaying of Wooster Pike through Terrace Park that permits reinstatement of reflective markers by the village;
- The second reading of an ordinance to create a water line reconstruction, repair and maintenance fund supported by residents' water bill assessments was approved; and
- The annual forestry fund assssment to defray the cost of planting, maintaining, trimming and removing trees within the village right-of-way in 2024 was approved.

Information gleaned from monthly reports and meeting comments:

- The village maintenance crew will begin leaf pickup in mid-October. In the meantime, residents may dispose of their leaves at the Environmental Services Center across from the Village Green. Leaves may not be placed on village streets.
- The Village Green cannons have been refurbished thanks to Mike Gehrig's dona-





WHEREAS, longevity of life is a blessing for an individual and for a community which benefits from the knowledge, creativity, and experiences this individual brings to all; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Terrace Park recognizes with respect and admiration the contribution of senior citizens to our community; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Marquett was born in Cincinnati, OH on September 30, 1923, and was raised in Terrace Park, OH and lived there for the majority of her life. She grew up skating on the pond and playing in the Little Miami River. She attended Western College in Oxford, now a part of Miami University.

WHEREAS, Ms. Marquett is a woman of great faith who loves her church family at Withamsville Church of Christ. She was actively involved with the senior group planning trips, visiting other congregations and hosting them to a luncheon.

WHEREAS, Ms. Marquett moved to 800 Indian Hill Road in 1954 and returned full time as a teacher at Milford High School, where she continued to work for 31 years.

WHEREAS, Ms. Marquett was involved in the Terrace Park AARP and Clermont County Retired Teachers groups. She helped write a history of CCRT that is in the Promont Library and assisted in the research of one-room schoolhouses in Clermont County which are documented in a large album with the Milford Historical Society. 




