## Water Bills Going Up To Keep System Flowing

Terrace Park's aging water system got a new lease on life Oct. 10 when Village Council approved an assessment for maintenance of lines and hydrants. The rate will be based upon usage and billed by the Village of Indian Hill, which supplies Terrace Park water and bills customers quarterly. Water bills for typical households will increase about \$10 per month and in five years generate an estimated \$170,000 for the water system fund.

Noting that the village has funds to maintain streets, sidewalks and forestation, Administrator Jerry Hayhow said the new assessment is an important step toward reconstruction and repair of an infrastructure that's nearly 100 years old. The measure will become effective in November.

In council action, Montgomery resident Kristin Spatz was approved as a new Emergency Medical Services (EMS) volunteer technician. She is enrolled in a paramedic recruitment program and plans to study for that at the Terrace Park fire station while making herself available for rescue runs. Council also approved a resolution to move funds in the 2023 appropriations budget to a maintenance category, and a resolution accepting Hamilton County's certification of village taxation

 An easement awarding the village additional oversight of the pedestrian path that connects Wrenwood and Denison lanes is being sent by the Ohio Department of Transportation to the Ohio Attorney General for approval. The measure, which will be in place for 50 years, is in response to residents' concern about the path's maintenance, safety and inadequacy to accommodate golf carts and

double-wide strollers.

• Leaf pickup is beginning along the village's 16 miles of roadway, which creates a 32mile service route. The maintenance crew does not deviate from the established route but their progress may be hastened or hindered depending upon the volume of leaves requiring pickup. During leaf pickup season, brush pickup is suspended. Brush should be taken to the recycling center and not placed in leaf piles because it can dam-

age village equipment and injure workmen. "Please do not put leaves in the street; it's dangerous if children play in them and a motorist doesn't see them," Hayhow said. "Also, do not park in raked leaves; they could catch your car on fire."

• The village has identified a highly qualified candidate to succeed arborist Mark Castator, who retired last month as
