The federal government's \$5.36 billion Covid recovery bill has trickled down to Terrace Park for capital improvements that have been "on the back burner for a long time," according to Administrator Jerry Hayhow. Two ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) grants totaling \$240,000 have enabled the purchase of replacement flooring and an aluminum railing for the community building, which along with the administration building, also received new exterior paint. In addition, the Log Cabin received gutters, repairs to exterior siding and upgrades to the basketball court; the entrance to the environmental services center was resurfaced; and five fire hydrants were pur-

At Village Council's Nov. 15 meeting, Hayhow said remaining ARPA funds must be spent or appropriated by Dec. 31, 2024 on projects that meet specific guidelines. The size of that windfall won't be known until payment for the current projects is completed.

In Council action:

-Natural Solutions Urban Forestry LLC was retained for consulting services following

tor, a local resident and certified arborist who managed the tree program as a village employee. Jerry Frankenhoff, principal consultant for the company, is a board-certified master arborist with 45 years of experience.

Councilmember Regina Sharp described Frankenhoff "very knowledgeable, personable and familiar with our database system." From a cost standpoint, she expects the consultant's fee versus employee payout to be similar when the need to no longer provide benefits is factored.

-Hayhow was appointed administrator and police chief for four more years and received applause from council for his service and willingness to con-

-Will Schoose was approved as a new volunteer emergency medical technician and was sworn into service by Mayor Tepe.

-Village participation in Hamilton County's multi-hazard mitigation plan was renewed for five more years. Council member Pax Lindell said county support strengthens the village's natural disaster plan.

In their monthly reports: -Tepe thanked residents for re-electing him mayor for four

more years and praised village employees for their consistent

on-the-job support.
- Councilmember Jeff Le-May thanked voters for their trust in village officials, evidenced by the overwhelming passage of the 2.5-mill operating levy renewal. The approval rating was 83 percent, up 3 percent from the last levy election.

-John Gatch, emergency medical services assistant chief, reported a 21 percent increase in attendance at the annual pancake supper fundraiser and thanked St. Thomas Episcopal Church for again enabling the event to be held on its premises.

-Fire Chief Steve Dronsfield said a new class with eight recruits has begun and training will be completed early next year. He also reminded residents to check their fireplaces for hazardous obstructions before us-






Coach Noonan Wins Prestigious MLS Award

Our neighborhood is home to rising coaching star Pat Noonan, who was recently presented with the 2023 Sigi Schmid MLS Coach of the Year Award. This prestigious honor recognizes Pat's leadership as head coach of the FC Cincinnati club this past season.

In just his second season with the team, Pat led FC Cincinnati to commanding new heights including their first ever Supporters' Shield for having the best regular season record. The team earned 69 total points and notched 20 wins - tying the fourth highest single season points in MLS history. This is a complete turnaround from three consecutive last place finishes before Pat took over as head coach in December 2021.

As I write this article, the Mariemont High School fall play is just a week away. The Layover is the most recent in a number of fall and spring plays that showcase the talent of Mariemont School District students. Participation in the play, as well as district chorus, band, orchestra, and visual arts programs goes well beyond a fun display of local skill.

As an art history educator at the college level, I begin classes by citing research regarding the benefits of studying and participating in the arts. Scholars from many disciplines agree that students with arts backgrounds develop critical thinking skills, empathy, creativity, and perhaps most surprisingly, heightened test performance and subject comprehension. For example, visual and performing arts experiences in elementary, junior high, and high school can equate to increased public speaking ability, compassion for differing perspectives, heightened ability to read and interpret the written word, and enhanced abstract thinking skills leading to strong problem-solving ability.

problem-solving ability.

Musical education is equally impactful on district students. The study of rhythm and timing is proven to help students understand essential concepts related to the study of objects and ideas in space and time, which translates to increased test scores in math. In addition to improving educational outcomes, study of music along with other types of arts increases self-esteem and confidence. These benefits are not limited to students with a natural inclination to the arts. Studies are increasingly showing that subject areas.

ceed in arts-related fields. Just like our district athletes, our arts students are constantly practicing their crafts, taking risks in the public arena or on the stage, and experiencing successes and failures. Each experience builds the resiliency and creative prob-lem-solving skills needed to succeed in a complex, increasingly visually-oriented world. What may be a surprise is that these experiences also impact academic achievement. Every student, regardless of skill, benefits from arts programs, starting in kindergarten.

As a third-year volunteer for the Mariemont Arts Association and parent of two children in the Mariemont School District, I've come to believe that the strong administrative and community support of arts education is one of the things that sets us apart from other districts.

Many community members likely connect the Mariemont Arts Association with high school performances and plays. But the organization contributes to student achievement beyond the high school level in every corner of the district. MAA regularly funds visual arts classroom supplies, instrument tuning, props and costumes for junior high and high school plays, additional pit musicians and specialized instructional assistance. Graduating seniors have the opportunity to apply for yearly scholarships dedicated to honoring achievement in the arts and supporting continued participation at the college level.

Those of us at the Mariemont Arts Association hope that you will add your support to district achievement by supporting MAA as a patron. With your help, we can continue to help the arts, and by extension academics, thrive in Mariemont District Schools.







St. Thomas Nursery School Hosts Farm Market






