## Streets to be Redone

Some village street work is to be done over again in spring because of what Street Commissioner Bob Bacon said was an unsatisfactory job. The work will be at the contractor's expense.

Bacon said the problem arose from an early cold spell which prevented the surfacing material from setting properly as night temperatures dropped into the low 40s. The contractor, he said, "took a chance and lost."

Some temporary work has been done in front of the post office and is to be done in front of the school. Other areas on Michigan, Douglas and Cornell are to be swept of loose material to determine what needs to be done in spring.

Bacon said that "a good job" was done on New Street.

## Christmas Season Opens on Village Green December 9

Terrace Park will open the community Christmas season with the lighting of the tree on the village green at 6:30 p.m. on Sunday, December 9, it's been announced by Santa's local representative, Grace Holmes. It was Mrs. Holmes who sparked the move to have the tree lighted again after a lapse of several years.

Santa himself is expected to turn on the lights after a Fire Department escort to the green.

That night, too, will see another celebration of the Luminaria in which residents line their walks and driveways with candles. The project is promoted by Kindervelt as part of its support of Children's Hospital Medical Center.

And getting around to see the displays will be more fun than ever. Hay rides through the village which have been a feature of the evening in the past are this year being underwritten by the Eppa Rixey Insurance Agency, so that the rides will be free. The rides will begin after the tree-lighting, and continue until about 9 p.m.

## Recycling Center to be Open December 1

Terrace Park's long debated recycling center will open officially on December 1.

Actually, said Councilman John Prues, the bin is to be installed November 26, but it is on the following Saturday that representatives of the Terrace Park Recycling Awareness Committee will be on hand from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. then and the next day to assist the recycling public.

Prues acted quickly after village council, at its November meeting, gave final reading to a resolution calling for a year's trial of such a system, at a cost not to exceed \$3,000.

The three-compartmented bin will be placed in the drive leading from Given Road to the Terrace

Park shopping center, immediately behind the Sohio Service Station.

Bins will be provided and handled by the Rumpke waste disposal firm which has the village garbage collection contract. The village will be charged \$100 for each bin collected and replaced, and is to share in the return on recycled materials.

Prues said that Richard Dickman, the new owner of the shopping center, had been most cooperative in helping the village to establish the center. The village, however, assumed responsibility for any damage to the driveway that may occur.

While the Center will be staffed on its opening weekend, the bin actually will be available for use at any time.

## What to Recycle

Here's what to recycle and what needs to be done with it, as outlined by the Terrace Park Recycling Awareness Committee:

**Aluminum** cans, foil, frozen food containers and pie plates and bimetal cans. Rinse and flatten.

**Glass** containers. Remove and discard lids. Rinse thoroughly, labels can stay on. All colors (clear, green, brown) acceptable.

**Plastic** containers, almost any with a screwtop lid. (Recyclable materials are marked on the base of each with a triangle enclosing the number 1 or 2.) Remove and discard lids, rinse thoroughly. Containers include plastic milk bottles, pop bottles, shampoo, detergent and cleaning fluid bottles, jelly, peanut butter jars, etc. Milk jugs can be flattened to save space.

## Village Valuation Takes Big Jump

Terrace Park's total property valuation has jumped by a third since the last appraisal three years ago, according to the county auditor's office.

The current valuation, based on the recent reappraisal, is \$39,189,040. The value of all properties in the village in 1987, the date of the previous reappraisal, was \$29,348,520.

A high-value building boom continues in the village meantime. Building Inspector Tim Harth reported to village council at its November meeting that he had issued 11 permits in the past month, one for a new house, for an estimated total construction cost of \$316,386.

The new valuation will be a major factor in village council's

consideration of next year's budget, and will as well affect the 1-mill tree assessment which council voted recently. Councilman John Wenstrup, chairman of the finance committee, noted that the assessment is expected to generate about \$40,000 in its first year, but likely may be cut in half when next it comes up for year-to-year renewal.

Saying he had been questioned concerning the need for additional money in view of the approximately \$500,000 the village has in certificates of deposit, Wenstrup pointed out that the sum represents only a six-month reserve against a current budget of \$900,295. The current budget was increased by \$30,000 at council's November meeting, in part because of increased costs in the planned new maintenance building.

Meantime, the Village Treasurer Margot Grund reported receipt of \$31,500 in partial payment of inheritance taxes from the state.

At its meeting, council reached a final decision to push ahead with the new building, spending \$58,800 for basic construction of the 60-by-40 foot structure this year and completing it under next year's budget. Tim Harth has donated four used but usable gas heaters for the building.

In other actions:

\* Life Squad Chief Connie Wilson reported 12 runs in the past month.

\* Fire Chief Pierce Matthews reported one fire run, and announced all members of the fire and police departments would be taking a state course in emergency handling of hazardous materials.

\* Council authorized purchase of a replacement administrative/police car for \$6,393.

\* James M. Evans was appointed as an auxiliary police officer.

\* Councilman Randy Casteel reported an estimate of \$1,500 for painting the exterior of the Community House.

\* Council rejected requests for partial payment for unauthorized work on village street trees, and called for word of responsibility for trees to be given applicants for building permits.

## Fatality First Here in 2 Years

Terrace Park suffered its first traffic-related fatality in two years on November 12 when a fleeing mental patient's car crashed into a power pole on Wooster Pike across from Marion Lane.

The wreck caused a four hour blackout of power and cable TV service.

But whether the victim, identified as Steve Bosse, 34, of Madisonville, died in the crash or as the result of bullet wounds will not be known until after an autopsy. A Fairfax police officer fired twice at Bosse as the man crashed his car through a police roadblock in Mariemont, barely missing two officers at the scene.

Mayor Jack Schmidt praised all of Terrace Park's emergency services for "a super job" in a rush-hour critical situation. He noted especially police wisdom in clearing the Wooster and Elm intersection as the pursuit neared the village, rather than attempting a roadblock at a busy spot. Police Chief Bacon complimented Sgt. Mick Wright for his handling of the situation, and said, "All the right pieces fell in place at the right time."

The October, 1988 crash occurred in the same general area.

## Skeptical about 'Quake Forecast, Village Readies—Just in Case

Skeptical but taking no chances, Fire Chief Pierce Matthews has issued a list of precautions concerning a possible earthquake in this area.

A controversial seismologist has predicted that a major earthquake will occur along the New Madrid Fault, centered in Tennessee, on December 3. This area is on the fringe of the possibly affected region.

Matthews said that Terrace Park Elementary, Mariemont High

School, and St. Thomas Nursery School are taking precautions with earthquake drills and teacher and student education. He noted that booklets covering what to do in this or other emergencies are available at the village office.

While also skeptical, village council at its November meeting called for word on the cost of insurance on the Community Building. Building Inspector Tim Harth said

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
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## Sixth Graders Recycle


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

that because of its age and method of construction, the building is particularly vulnerable.

Councilman John Wenstrup, who is secretary of the Cincinnati Association of Life Underwriters, said that earthquake insurance is "selling like hotcakes." He estimated average home insurance at \$50 - \$80.

The fire chief's tips:

If you're indoors, stay there, taking cover under heavy furniture or against inside walls or doorways. Stay away from windows or outside doors.

If you're outdoors, stay there, but stay clear of buildings or utility wires.

If you're in a car, stop and stay in the car.

Indoors, don't use candles or matches. Douse all fires.

Afterwards, if indoors, check utilities. If you smell gas, open windows, shut off the gas, leave the building. If electric supply is affected, pull the main switch.

Check chimneys for cracks or other damage.

Stay out of damaged buildings. Don't go sightseeing.
