### Council is warned water saturation problem worsening

The dwindling saturation area in Terrace Park was brought to the attention of Council at both January's and February's meeting.

For the second time in two months, Council was alerted to the situation, this month by Building Inspector William Fiedler, and last month by Village Engineer George Kipp. Both referred to the increased size of new houses recently built in the neighborhood, reducing the area where water can drain. They also noted that, following the big rain in December, it took longer for water to drain, a day and a half in some spots, than it had ever taken


Mayor Startsman directed Mr. Fiedler, Mr. Kipp and Dan Keefe, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Committee, to meet and discuss the situation. When asked later about the issue, Mr. Keefe predicted that a study of water run-off in the Village would most likely result in a recommendation for storm sewers.

"Residents are resistant to the idea of storm sewers because of the cost," said Keefe. "The initial hookup could cost up to \$5,000 per household.'

Because Terrace Park is built upon a thick layer of gravel, the Vil-

lage has been able to remain one of the few communities capable of relying entirely upon septic systems. But, as described by Mr. Fiedler, big, new houses are "pressing on our

When asked if there are other alternatives to storm sewers in Terrace Park, Keefe replied, "Either storm sewers, or establish an architectural commission which would determine the conditions for [building or] adding on to a house." Mr. Keefe added that the Planning and Zoning Committee also intends to address the zoning code for setbacks, currently determined by "an archaic formula."



### Little Miami Bike Trail discussions continue

An update on development of The Little Miami Bike Trail was provided by Julie Rugh at Council's February meeting. Mrs. Rugh recently met with two state officials from departments dealing with recreation and land management.

The state has made it known in the past that, while they have the right to develop the trail through Terrace Park, they would prefer to work cooperatively with the Village. Council has been discussing how Terrace Park might best respond to this offer in light of Hamilton County's plans to develop a trail that would connect Avoca Park (just south of here) with the Lunken Field bike trail. Mrs. Rugh pointed out that when this project is completed, the bike trail would be continuous from Lunken Field to Xenia, OH with the exception of the small section through Terrace Park.

"I don't feel that not paving the trail through Terrace Park would stop people from using it as it is, or just riding through the Village," said

Council has endorsed Mrs. Rugh's proposal to continue conversations with state officials, who intend to update their mas-

ter facilities (i.e., restrooms and parking lots) plan soon. "We want to make sure that they provide ample restroom and parking facilities outside of Terrace Park," said Mrs. Rugh. She will also request the provision of fencing and landscaping that would serve as a barrier between the trail and the property of residents, and limiting trail entrances and exits within Terrace Park.

Other Council business included the following:

- Building official William Fielder submitted an annual report indicating that in 1999, 89 building permits were issued for projects with the combined value of \$3,663,850
- Council agreed to allow "Run For Your Life", a Hoxworth Blood Center sponsored race, to include Terrace Park streets as part of its course. The race will take place on April 29
- Council passed a resolution to re-employ Robert Malloy as legal counsel
- Jack Brown reported receiving positive feedback regarding snow removal services from the maintenance department

#### Letters to the Editor

Dear Residents of Terrace Park:

The Mariemont City School District is seeking passage of a 2.23 mill bond issue on March 7 which will generate \$8,016,000 for a comprehensive building and renovation program.

A committee appointed by the board of education in 1998, assessed the school district facilities. Committee members visited other schools, consulted experts, interviewed administrators, teachers, parents and students before presenting their recommendations to the board of education.

Tom Crosby, principal of the high school and chair of the committee, stated that the committee believes the recommended renovations and improvements will positively impact the education of our students, protect the assets of our school district, and improve safety and security.

Projects impacting the areas of academics, arts, Americans with Disabilities Act Requirements (ADA), athletics, energy conservation, growth, infrastructure, safety, security and technology are to be funded through this initiative. The bond issue will benefit each school and every student in the district.

The bond issue will enable us to install phone and intercom systems in every classroom, improving safety and security throughout the district. Needed classroom space in the junior high will be reclaimed by relocating the Board of Education offices. Roofs and boilers will be replaced. Handicapped accessibility will be improved with the installation of elevators and lifts.

Included in the improvements for Terrace Park Elementary will be increased electrical service, an updated fire alarm system and a new boiler. The lower level restroom facilities will be reconfigured to allow for use during school and community functions. The ceiling throughout the "new" wing will be removed, as it does contain some asbestos.

Due to the scope of the projects, the board determined that a bond issue was the appropriate funding instrument. Renewing the 1995 Permanent Improvement Levy would not have provided enough dollars to fund these improvements. (This levy expired in 1999). The Mariemont Board of Education members and I believe that this bond issue will enhance and strengthen our educational programs. It will help us maintain the high level of quality residents expect while providing an exceptional value for tax dollars.

A major portion of the funds will be used to make improvements to the high school. Outdated science labs will be enlarged and upgraded to provide students with a state-of-the-art learning center. The high school addition accommodates classroom space, a technology center, meeting room, storage and a visual art classroom. Wherever possible, additional walls, doors and windows will be added to provide a more traditional classroom setting. The heating and air conditioning system will be replaced and sanitary sewer lines added for future use.

Our high school was constructed prior to the expansion of girls' athletics. Currently, more than 50 boys' and girls' teams require practice facilities. The multipurpose facility will house an auxiliary gym, additional locker and shower rooms, a training area, coaches' offices and refurbished restrooms.

The proposed work would begin shortly after the bond issue passes and should be completed in approximately three years. The construction management team will determine the building and renovation schedule. Priority will be given to critical infrastructure needs, and safety and security improvements. We plan to accomplish this work with as little disruption of our educational programs as possible.

The board and I believe that this plan attains our goals while being fiscally responsible. Our students continue to excel in academics, arts and athletics. We are pleased that Mariemont is one of 14 districts of 611 in Ohio which has been named an "Effective" school district. This plan will benefit our educational program now and in the future.

We would like to express our thanks to the many volunteers who are working to publicize the bond issue. Campaign leaders in Terrace Park are Erin Rosson and Joddy Perry.

We appreciate the support that you have always given our schools, and we ask for your continued investment in excellence. Thank you.
