
Baldur Tangvald was named a 2010 National Merit Semi-Finalist from Cincinnati Country Day School.

Dear Terrace Park Neighbor

EMT (Emergency Medical Village Council asks all Terrace Park levy of 2.8 mills this November 2nd. While this is technically an additional levy, it is designed to replace revenue the village lost in 2010 when we mistakenly allowed expiration of our 3.5 This levy will carry an approximate mill operating levy. Voting "FOR" this levy will restore the Terrace Park portion of your real estate taxes to their 2009 levels. This levy will appear on the ballot as issue 29:

29 PROPOSED TAX LEVY (ADDI-TIONAL) VILLAGE OF TERRACE

A majority affirmative vote is necessary for passage.

An additional tax for the benefit of the Village of Terrace Park, County of Hamilton, Ohio, for the purpose of CURRENT OPERATING EXPENS-ES at a rate not exceeding two and eight-tenths (2.8) mills for each one dollar of valuation, which amounts to twenty-eight cents (\$0.28) for each one hundred dollars of valuation, for five (5) years, commencing in 2010,

FOR THE TAX LEVY AGAINST THE TAX LEVY

The ballot states the actual millage voters to approve an "additional" tax (\$.28) per \$100 of assessed valuation which is different than market value and can be confusing. This operating levy is a significant source of village funds, accounting for about 15% of our annual receipts. 

Gallagher reminisced about years in Terrace Park

A welcome addition to the Terrace Park Historical Society (TPHS) archives are the recollections of those who've lived or been associated with Terrace Park. Prior to her death in 2009, Eleanor Gallagher shared memories of 65 years as a Terrace Park resident with Helen Barnett for TPHS. She was married to Graydon Gallagher and they raised three children at 714 Myrtle Avenue. Eleanor was known by many as a teacher and a friend. The transcript of her oral history may be read at TPHS; here are a few excerpts that recall her husband's bout with tuberculosis beginning in 1955:

"Graydon's health improved almost immediately after he was hospitalized, that is his physical health. but his emotional health did not. I could visit him only two hours a week . . The children could visit him only once every three months and then that was across the room. So he suffered mightily from all that separation . . . It was a hard time but a time of many blessings. Friends and neighbors and family were so kind to us and so helpful and so prayerful so that we came included to call 248-1777

He missed us so much that he asked if we would do morning prayer every morning at 7:30 at the same time he would and then evening prayer at the same time he would and that would make us seem closer together. Witness to the birth of aviation

The following report is from a diary available for reading at the Terrace Park Historical Society's archives. The author's name is not disclosed in this public report to protect the personal nature of the original work.

With and without field glasses, a pair of eyes in Terrace Park regularly watched for planes over the Village of Terrace Park and recorded his observations and comments in 1928 and 1931 diaries. His interest in aviation led him to subscribe to aviation magazines, to order U.S. model aircraft catalogs, and to build models in his workshop near his home on Park Avenue.

On a sunny Sunday in 1928 he counted eight airplanes in two hours that flew over his house and identified one as the Happy Flamingo. A May diary entry reported on an American Eagle plane accident near Coney when the plane went into a tailspin resulting in three fatalities. Another Sunday in May he saw a group of plans "visible for just a few minutes" that flew over Miami Grove. They were part of a big air circus over Watson Airport (now Blue Ash Airport).

One disappointment came in October when the Graf Zeppelin, built in Germany in 1926-27, was expected to fly over Cincinnati but bad weather prevented it from leaving the Lakehurts. N.J., field. It returned to Germany. The

same week the diarist included mention of the deaths of two pilots killed in the crash of the Yankee Doodle in New Mexico in an attempt to complete a nonstop transcontinental flight.

In 1931 the entries focus chiefly on mail planes when he would go out regularly at 9 p.m. to watch for them. Some times he saw them flying higher and fast and saw exhaust flames. Another time he could see cabin windows "all lit up" and assumed that plane had passengers. Early mail planes did not carry passengers, combining mail and passengers became more common after 1930. As the year went on he would note whether planes were on time, director of flight and add morning flights that flew right over his workshop. He mentioned seeing three Fords flying north one day and saw one of the new Pilgrims used as a mail plane flying south over the hill at another time. He thought the airship "Akron" (commissioned in 1931) flew over the sky on a test flight but not in his viewing area. Again he sighted a fleet from Watson Airport, A highpoint came in November when he got a good look at a Goodyear blimp flying very low following the railroad.



Police report

Terrace Park police responded to six mutual aid requests (Milford and Newtown) and two Life Squad runs.






