

New traffic pattern for Stanton announced at March council meeting

Police chief Gerald Hayhow reported that, due to construction at Terrace Park Elementary, changes will be made in the traffic patterns on Stanton Ave. Hayhow announced the following: "Beginning April 1st and continuing through June 10th and then again during the 2011-2012 school

year, the 600 block of Stanton, between Myrtle and Elm, will become a one-way street traveling west towards Elm. Also, during that period the same block will be closed to vehicular traffic during school days from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Residents who use that particular route to commute should expect

delays due to children being dropped off in the morning and picked up in the afternoon in front of the modular classrooms. The street will be clearly marked by both cones and signs.

Detour signs on Elm and Marietta will indicate the route around the closed street during the affected period.

The traffic on Stanton will return to the normal pattern once school recesses for the summer."

Mayor Jay Gohman is asking the police to watch for cars on Wooster Pike using the center turn lane to pass, as it is dangerous. The center lane should be used only to turn. Also, Hayhow asked all residents to please drive carefully as potholes are difficult to repair during wet weather.


Heroic TP native awarded Bronze Star Medal

Chief Special Warfare Operator, David McDonald, Navy SEAL, was awarded the Bronze Star Medal with Combat "V" (for valor) for heroic achievement in connection with combat operations against the enemy.

His citation read in part: "Acting as an Assistant Team Leader for a Joint Task Force in support of Operation Enduring Freedom from June to October 2009, Chief Petty Officer McDonald displayed extraordinary tactical performance during the execution of numerous direct action missions that resulted in the elimination of enemy fighters and disruption of strategic enemy networks. On July 8, 2009, he conducted a direct action mission against an enemy network facilitator with involvement in the capture of a United States service member. By his extraordinary guidance, zealous initiative, and total dedication to duty, Chief Petty Officer McDonald eliminated a threat to the assault force...

reflected great credit upon himself and upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

David is the son of Trish McDonald of Terrace Park. He lives in Virginia Beach with his wife, Jessie, and twin girls. He has been a Navy SEAL since 1999.

THE ADDITION ON THE SCOUT (LOG) CABIN WAS FUNDED BY THE HAINES

From the oral history of Robert (Bob) and Dorothy (Doe) Haines, Lifetime Members of TP Historical Society and former

you'd have to go around when they'd go on a camping trip to be sure that all the kids had their things for the camping thing. With this addition, they could put all their things in the Scout Cabin.

Interviewer: The Boy Scouts



Bob and Doe Haines, former long time residents of TP, funded the log cabin addition for the Boy Scouts. (All three Haines' sons were raised in TP. Son Bob raised his three children: Brett, Stephanie and Ryan in TP)

longtime residents of TP, now in their 90's:

Bob: So we came up with the idea of building an addition on that building dedicated primarily to the Boy Scouts. And that's what we did.

Doe: Well, they didn't have any place for their equipment. And they needed it desperately. It would be at someone's house, and

used to have paper drives all the time. Were you involved with a lot of that?

Bob: Yes. But the big problem there and I have to tell you this: The paper drives were on Saturdays when kids were out of school and they could go around and do it. But you had to watch those boys awfully carefully.

Because every once in a while they'd disappear and we couldn't find them. Obviously they'd found some copies of *Playboy Magazines* somehow. And they'd slip off into the bushes and read these magazines. But we knew what was going on with those guys.

LABOR DAY FESTIVAL IN THE '50S AND '60S

Interviewer: What about Labor Day? It's always been a Terrace Park event.

Doe: Oh, yeah... everyone would dress up and it would be the whole day...with the parades in the morning and then food and rides. It ended with a potluck dinner that all the moms did in the late afternoon/early evening. It was a big event. Bingo and beer sales very popular. And it earned a lot of money and that was also for the community activities.

Interviewer: It's over right about 1 o'clock now. They're still doing it but they don't do as much. They had to deal with some kind of laws on gambling so the Bingo can't be – and they can't sell beer any more.

THE LITTLE MIAMI RIVER AND MIAMI GROVE (currently the Miami Grove Nature Preserve)

From the oral history of Dave Strong West, born in Terrace Park in 1922 and former long time resident, father of current resident Mary Hyer,

Dave: We had loads of fun on Little Miami River. We would go down and swim in the warm weather. In the winter we ice skated and played ice hockey quite often. I don't think we've had

those winters for a long time to do that. One thing I did, right after the war, I was sort of goofing around not knowing what I wanted to do and before I went back to school, I decided to build a boat. I got the materials from Clermont Lumber Company, Ferd (Bro) Critchell and his dad there, and build it out of Cyprus. Beautiful job, mainly because I had a neighbor who was a master carpenter, Stan Mathis. And we put that boat together and put it in the water. It was so heavy it took a dozen guys and none of us had a truck so we'd take it up by the old country club and put it in the water there. But the next spring floods took it away. So I built another one just like it but it wasn't quite as good because Stan didn't help me. I put it in and I lost it. So I decided that was enough.

Interviewer: Well you probably remember Miami Grove. (continued on page 4)

What are some of your memories of Miami Grove growing up?

Dave: Well I remember it was in the depression and we had quite a few students in Terrace Park School and most of them were real nice people but living in desperate conditions. During prohibition we did hear that all kinds of things

Tower Hill and all those places were just torn apart...pathetic when you walked through afterwards.

It would be horrible to think that the people went back to those homes, but that's all they had. I remember seeing the overstuffed chairs sitting in the dirt roads and they were covered with that kind

house hunting we had had lunch at the Mariemont Inn; we somehow just gravitated to this area. I had looked at Madeira, Mariemont, Montgomery, Milford, but hadn't turned into Terrace Park; didn't really realize it was here. And the minute I came into Terrace Park, I was so delighted because Mary was only four and I was looking for a spot that had sidewalks for her to ride her tricycle on. Sue and Tim were about 10 and 14, and I wanted a school that could be walked to, and the minute I came into the village I thought this is it.

Interviewer: Can you tell me some of your early recollections of Terrace Park when your children were younger?

Jane: One of the things that's gone... but the building's still there...was the Terrace Park Market. Mary, by the time she was in first grade, I really rarely saw her again. She was such a

social being and loved athletics and she loved the Terrace Park Market. One of the wonderful things was, and I tried to be sure it was after lunch or after dinner, to go over to the Market and buy some candy or ice cream. Then the horse was down at the corner in that wonderful, old barn, and the kids would go down there,

always cautioned to be very careful when near that busy street. But they loved to visit the horse. This is just the most wonderful child community in the world. It just absolutely is!

went on down there in Earl's Café. You know one of my brothers and his buddies would sneak away from school, go down to Earl's...they were in high school...I think Earl would even slip them a beer or two.

You know...there is a house there now...as you go in towards Miami Grove (currently Hap and Ann Lindell's home on Elm) and there was a big dance hall and roller skating rink. You know I was pretty young then but I know you could hear it...no air condition in the summer...you slept with the windows open and you could hear the music for the roller skating or the dancing.

During the floods, which came every spring, I do know the people who lived in Miami Grove had a horrible time. For instance Newtown was completely under and quite a few of the students came from Newtown. Several of them stayed with families in Terrace Park so they could go to school. But the Miami Grove and

DISCOVERING TERRACE PARK IN THE '60'S

Jane: Stanley and I met when we were at USC. We were married and after years of his working in the aircraft industry, we went to Sacramento with Aerojet and then to GE here in 1965.

Interviewer: So you moved from California to Cincinnati?

Jane: Yes...and to Terrace Park, which I feel was the luckiest thing that ever happened because in looking all over the city I just found the east side to be the most desirable; hadn't discovered Terrace Park. Our first day of

All are welcome. The meeting will be held in the auditorium of the Indian Hill Primary School.



Martin Marietta mine

Robert Malloy, Solicitor, reported that the Martin Marietta case management conference to decide when oral arguments will be scheduled is March 30.

Life Squad/Fire Dept.

Life Squad Chief John Maggard reported nine emergency medical services (EMS) runs in February. Recent training included diabetic emergencies and trauma, as well as FD communications and equipment familiarization. The EMT class should graduate four in the spring.

Luke Frey, Fire Chief, reported a recent audit by ISO rated TP's fire department as a four, the best rate a volunteer department can receive. The safety committee met to consider replacing Engine 294 (1980) with a Rescue 94 (1976) that Milford is selling. New volunteers are welcome!

Permits

Bill Fiedler, Building Official, reported two appeal applications in February. A Planning Committee hearing was held regarding the height of the elementary school.

Trees and emerald ash borer

Councilman Jeff Krueger, Buildings and Grounds, reported that 66 trees were removed and the rain is slowing the stump removal process. Call the Village Office if you are aware of dangerous hanging branches on Village street

trees. If residents are treating street trees for the Emerald Ash Boer, please call Randy Haller, TP Arborist, so the tree can be documented and assessed structurally. Krueger mentioned that woodpeckers eat EAB and that is an initial sign a tree might be infected. An EAB distribution map has been plotted and filed in the Village Office. Please do not remove private ash trees during the summer. This will slow the spread of EAB in TP.

Finance

Councilman Mark Porst, Finance, is checking with Hamilton County to clarify what renewal dollars the levy will generate and he discussed a recent Enquirer article about how Ohio's financial challenges will be transferred to local governments. Estate taxes generated an average of \$178K over the past four years. The local government fund revenue from the State of Ohio could impact TP's budget as much as 13 percent. Porst is also calculating the declining home values and how close TP will run to break even.

Public safety

Councilman Stefan Olson, Public Safety, presented the first reading amending the street parking zoning ordinance. There is a Safety Meeting at 7pm on March 10th in the EMS Building, open to the public. Coyotes are in the area. Watch your pets and immediately call in sightings.
