stop by the Village office to meet Patricia Wirthlin, the new Assistant Fiscal Officer.


Martin Marietta mine

Village bulletin boards for government use only

Most Terrace Park residents are familiar with the wooden bulletin boards located at various points within the community. In the past, these boards were used for a variety of postings, including events and activities within Terrace Park. Today, however, the Village administration has limited the use of bulletin boards to postings pertaining to Village government business.

In her August 2012 "Did You Know?" email through TPList, Melanie Stutenroth, Clerk of Council, noted that the boards are located on Village property and are regulated under Chapter 1137 of the Zoning Code. Specifically, Chapter 1137.07 (G) of the Zoning Code states that, "No sign, with the exception of governmental signs, shall be placed in the existing public right of way." Stutenroth stated in her TP list message that

strict sign regulation is necessary "to avoid potential expensive legal battles for the Village..." The potential for legal action against local government entities and public universities arising from public bulletin board use has become a reality for several communities across the nation.

Non-governmental signs are subject to removal by the Terrace Park Police Department.

In related news, the bulletin board formerly located at Wooster Pike and Miami Avenue has been replaced with a smaller board and relocated further south on Miami Avenue. According to Chief Jerry Hayhow, the prior bulletin board, along with a Village sign, was located on property owned by the City of Milford. The move was described by Chief Hayhow as "proactive" and was not prompted by a request from Milford officials.

News from the Terrace Park Historical Society

Can living in Terrace Park be good for you? In a letter reflecting upon his life at age 100, one of our Lifetime Members, William "Zip" Ferriell, would seem to think so. In 2010, his three children, Kathleen, Dennis and Roger, made him a Lifetime Member of the Terrace Park Historical Society.

Zip was born at Christ Hospital in Cincinnati, the third of four children, including siblings Virginia, Kate and Bob. In his letter, he speaks of his childhood in Milford and his early years in Terrace Park:

"Life in those days was much more Spartan for us than we all

The Turkey Buzzards of TP

Capistrano California has its swallows, Hinckley Ohio has its Buzzards and Terrace Park has its Turkey Buzzards. I'll bet you are wondering why every year about this time these large birds pay us a visit. Let's learn a little bit about these big birds and then I will tell you what I think.

The Turkey Buzzard (also called the Turkey Vulture) is the most widespread vulture and lives from southern Canada to South America. It lives in a variety of open and semi-open areas, including subtropical forests, shrub lands, pastures, and deserts.

With red crinkly skin on a bald head and dark feathers, turkey vultures would finish last in any birding beauty contest. But they are well adapted for their job of finding and eating rotting carrion, including road kill. It finds its food using its keen eyes and sense

of smell, flying low enough to detect the smells produced by the beginnings of the process of decay in dead animals. For this reason, they are often called nature's garbage collectors and play an important role in our environment by disposing of dead animals which can lead to disease.

It uses warm drafts to move through the air, flapping its wings infrequently. It roosts in large community groups and has very

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ultimately achieved.... The High Street (Milford) unit was like a fourplex. A couple of our homes had outdoor plumbing. We paid \$5/week to the two elderly women that owned the unit. I slept in the living room on a day type bed with Bob, and when the weather was nice, we slept on the front porch. Among my various documents, Dennis found the passbook savings book from the Milford High School weekly savings program where I would save \$.05/week and that was a lot of money. How things have changed!"

"I can remember playing down by the Little Miami River with Bob, Virginia and Kate. There was a rope swing over the water.... When I reflect upon my early years, I think about playing baseball and basketball in high school at Milford. Around 1928 I started working part time for the Milford Water Works at \$.35 /hour, then at the Terrace Park Country Club I was employed as

the Caddy Master. In 1935 I began my 41 year career at the Camargo Club."

"In 1939 I married the love of my life, Kay. That lasted for 69 wonderful years. In 1950 we purchased the lot in Terrace Park from the Eveland's. Bob's in-laws, the Hensgens and I completed the house at 809 Stanton Avenue. That house was built with modified plans by John Eberhard who subsequently built the house next door. We had a \$10,000 mortgage with a \$36/month payment."

"We had all the wonderful trappings of the suburbs: Scouts, St. Thomas Church, Mariemont Schools, Clodhoppers Dance Group, various golf groups, etc. ...I have been blessed with a wonderful life. My mom, my wife -, my siblings - Bob, Viginia, and Kate, my children, my faith, and my job - what a wonderful 100 years."

After his long career as golf pro and manager for the Camargo Country Club, his love of golf has

continued with the younger generation. "On August 24, 1979 my grandson W.D. was born and I am blessed that he has carried forward my interest in golf. I follow golf though W.D.'s eyes and accomplishments. This year he won the stroke play championship at the Columbus Country Club in Columbus. He was runner-up in the Match Play Championship, and in the final 18 holes of the 36 hole event, he made a hole in one on the 13th hole. He is a third generation member of the club from the Ferriell/Shaw families. He traveled to Bandon Dunes in Oregon with a group of guys for a golf trip. He played in a National Pro/Am Event in Jackson Hole this summer as well."

Zip now lives in Largo, Florida, where he celebrated his 100th birthday. "I received a nice letter from Willard Scott and a letter regarding my golfing career from Allan Wronowski, President of the PGA".

Search for Mariemont schools superintendent begins

The Mariemont Board of Education has launched its search for the next superintendent of schools for the Mariemont City School District. The goal of the Board is to announce the next superintendent by mid May. To assist with the search the district has retained the services of Effron & Associates, who also assisted the board in the search for current superintendent Paul Imhoff more than six years ago.

"We're seeking a leader that can bring the educational expertise we need to continue our strong academic vision as well as bring to us strategies and programs that will meet the current and future educational needs of our students," said Peggy Braun, president of the Board of Education. "We are fortunate to have a strong link between the schools and our four communities, and we are looking for someone that understands how important that is to all of us."

An in-depth recruitment process will occur through early April. The superintendent search

webpage is on the district website, www.mariemontschools.org/about/Superintendent-Search.cfm, making this the first all-electronic application process for the district. Besides the selection and application process information for the candidates, the page also includes community outreach components, such as a survey request and a list of community meetings. 



few natural predators. Turkey Vultures frequently circle and gain altitude on pockets of rising warm air, or thermals. When they reach the top of the thermal, they glide across the sky at speeds up to 60 miles per hour, gradually losing altitude all the while. When they need to gain more altitude, they locate another thermal and so begins another sequences of circling, rising, and then gliding. Turkey vultures can cover many miles going from thermal to thermal without ever needing to flap.

Don't worry. They rarely, if ever, kill prey. The Turkey Vulture can often be seen along roadsides scavaging or near bodies of water, feeding on washed-up fish. It also will feed on fish or insects which have become stranded in shallow water.

These birds spend winter in the southern states and move north for the summer to breed. Most are

just passing through.

So why do they come to Terrace Park and hang out at the end of Amherst Avenue? Here are some possibilities - It is possible that years and years ago, that there was a large number of dead animals in the area that may have attracted them. Those that come back year after year may have been taught to do so and it may be just a habit. It is also possible they like the roads and the available road kill. Another theory is that these guys like Terrace Park because it is safe - they won't get shot here. The most likely answer though is that these birds like the bluffs that are next to the Little Miami River. I think the combination of the road kill, the availability high trees that are next to the bluff, the river and its warmer water and uplifting air allow these birds to stretch their wings and soar on a February cold morning. It's sort of like a warm cup of coffee before breakfast.





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

The Three Essential Elements of Direct Mail Marketing

Despite the popularity of e-marketing – e-mail campaigns, SMS messaging, and social media – direct mail is still a proven way to generate new business from existing customers and identify potential new customers from among prospects. Used correctly, direct mail can generate leads, communicate with customers, build name recognition or brand awareness, and build traffic.

A strong direct mail program is built on three essential elements. In this issue of Printtips, we'll explain the importance of each one.

Element #1: The Mail List
According to the Direct Marketing Association, the mailing list accounts for 80% of the response to a direct mail program. That's greater than the influence of the offer and the design combined. The best response rate comes from mailing to those who are already familiar with your business or organization. This can be your customers (active and inactive), prospects who have contacted you for some reason, and referrals from customers or friends.

A list you put together yourself consisting of customers, prospects, and referrals is known as a house list. A house list can be compiled from customer purchase transactions, donor records, membership rosters, and similar sources. In general, a house list produces a higher response rate than a purchased list because so many of the individuals on the list already know you.



If you want to expand your house list by adding a purchased list, a good technique is to submit the house list for data append. This adds demographic information (such as household income, gender of the head of household, home value, presence of children for residences, and SIC code for businesses). Data append creates a profile of those on your house list, then the profile can be used to select prospects whose profile is a match.

After the list is compiled, it is important to engage in some data hygiene. This means establishing a structure for the mailing list that allows each element to be in its own separate field, sized appropriately for the data. (A very

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
