Holly Purcell presented Resolution 11-2, 2017 for the consent of Council regarding the Mayor appointing Mason Mayfield to the Volunteer Emergency Medical Services Department. The resolution passed. The Mayor recognized Holly as she is retiring from Council, for her excellent work leading Building & Grounds for two years and recently Public Safety. She was presented with a service plaque and flowers.

Fire Chief, Luke Frey, urged residents to have their wood burning fireplaces inspected and chim-

neys cleaned.

Many of our Terrace Park boys received their Ohio lacrosse state championship rings on Fri-


day, December 15 during halftime of the MHS Varsity basketball game. The team is pictured con-

This was just one reason why the TP Business Directory came into fruition. The Directory strives to make it easy to find babysitters and other service providers without making a public announcement. It also seeks to reduce the number of email messages that people receive through the TPList.

The TP Business Directory continues to grow and provide helpful reviews of local youth, service providers, and businesses. Today there are more than 100 businesses and services listed in the Directory with over 150 reviews

by TP residents.

Using your computer or phone, residents can easily email, text, or call service providers and babysitters directly through the TP Business Directory. This means you can make your request privately and help eliminate the number of emails on the listserve. Cary Maish Brodie to be Featured Speaker at Evening Affair

The community is invited to the annual Garden Club Evening Affair being held on Tuesday, January 2nd at the Community Building with appetizers and beverages being served at 7pm. There will be a very short business meeting around 8pm followed by our guest speaker, Cary Maish Brodie, who will give a presentation on development, ecology and restoration of the Duck Creek and its watershed. Many of you will probably remember Cary, daughter of Jerry and Lucy Maish who raised their family on Park Avenue.

As interest in redevelopment in Madisonville and Madison Place grew, Cary became involved in the task force which is bringing awareness to this valley and nature preserve. In the 1948 Cincinnati Master Plan, the concept of the Little Duck Creek Bike Path appeared. It wasn't until 1978 that a report for the corridor in Madisonville was developed. This addressed natural components, topography, existing open spaces, tree cover, land use, zoning, building and engineering.

The Duck Creek area begins in Madisonville, just south of Plainville Road to Roe Street, continuing south between Homer and Marietta. At Bramble it veers sharply westward flowing into Bramble Park and eventually crossing Murray Avenue. The project ends at the Murray Avenue Bike Trail. The creek flows through the village of Fairfax into the Little Miami and on to our great Ohio River.

The task force Cary is involved in is focusing on removal of invasive plants, enhancing Bramble Park and connecting the Murray Trail to Madisonville. This will improve health outcomes, build community, restore land, and enhance the quality of life in this under-invested part of Cincinnati.

Cary will discuss this ambitious project, the role she is playing and how we too can play a part in creating a positive change in an area so very close to home. The Garden Club looks forward to seeing you.

around the country.

PASSED AWAY- Robert A. Haines, Sr. of Naples, FL, former resident of Terrace Park, passed away peacefully on November 22, 2017 after finishing a life well lived. He was born in Toledo, OH on May 16, 1918; the eldest son of Frank and Mabel Haines. After graduation from Blanchester (Ohio) High School in 1936, he attended and graduated from Miami University in 1941. He earned a B.S Degree in Business. He was a proud member and Business Manager of the Alpha Chapter of Phi Delta Theta Fraternity.

On September 18, 1942, Bob married his High School and Miami University sweetheart, Dorothy Brown. After graduation, he joined the Navy to serve in WW II. After serving 4 years as an Intelligence Officer in a unit that helped break the Japanese code, he returned with his new family to Cincinnati, OH.

Bob joined the Kroger Companies National Headquarters in Cincinnati as a buyer and merchandise Manager. In 1956 he started his own business, the Johnson-Haines Co and founded Robert A. Haines Co., selling private label products. He also became partners in the AL Meyer Food Service Co. and served as President of the Cincinnati Food Brokers Assn among other honors. Bob was active in Boy Scouts, United Appeal, and Little League Baseball. He was an avid golfer and member of Terrace Park Country Club and an early member of Royal Poinciana, Naples, FL. He and Dorothy loved Miami University and became members of the Presidents Club

Bob was a dedicated family man. His wife of 75 years passed away in May of 2017. He is survived by three proud sons, Thomas (Cindy) Haines of Lawrenceburg, IN; Robert A. Haines, Jr. of Naples, FL; Richard (Susan) Haines of Cincinnati, OH; seven grandchildren; and eight great-grandchildren. A proud family! He lived a life of Grace, Dignity and Honor.

A private Memorial Service will be held in Blanchester, OH, where he and Dorothy will be buried in the Family Plot.

TP Women's Club Provides Building Survey for Benefit of All

How many of the Village residents know about the site tpsurvey.org? I imagine not very many.

At the recent meeting of The Terrace Park Women's Club, Carol Cole gave a very interesting and informative review of our club's website. Even our members didn't know just how unique and important this website is. It has been nationally recognized and other communities have been encouraged to take on a similar project. It is regularly used by genealogists, estate agents and people interested in current and previous occupants of the Village buildings. Because the Village is relatively small, the site can cover not just the "Important Houses" but every building in the Village.

[Tpsurvey.org](http://tpsurvey.org) contains historical information and photos of these building. The site opens with an alphabetic listing of Terrace Park streets with all the street numbers displayed. A user can select the item of interest and will then find all the owners beginning as far back as information currently exists. Photos of homes and how they have changed over many years are also there. The initial home on a lot may even have been torn down and replaced. All the historically interesting information about the family and the house or building is also there. Other records include birth and census information from the eighteen hundreds to the latest one in 1940, death notices, phone directories, deeds, and more.

The project started at the April 1995 meeting when Janette Pruiss read a letter from Pat Henley to the group. She suggested that the TPWC take on a project to record the houses in the Village

that were changing so quickly. The original committee was Pat Henley, Janette Pruiss, Marilyn Julnes, Ester Powell and Carol C Cole, later joined by Jane Harrier, Bette Griffiths and Lynn Nelson. They believed that a lot of the history of the Village would be lost if we didn't do something to save it. To begin with, we sent out a survey to all home owners and all TPWC members were involved in collecting information. Carol recruited her husband, Lee, to design a computer program that made it possible to organize and search the information. Carol entered the information into her home computer and was the only one able to do this work.

Recently, the site has been unavailable due to being hacked but thanks to Terrace Park resident and member of the Historical Society, Susan Rodgers, it has been wonderfully restored. Susan continues to work on it to making it even more user friendly and she and Carol enter additional information as it becomes available. In the original version, the site could only be edited by one person at a time. Of course, any number of users can access the site at once but it can now handle several editors working simultaneously. This will make things so much more efficient when updates such as current photos need to be entered and when newly discovered information becomes available. Carol wants all members who own a computer to help with the task of replacing lost material and keeping the site up to date. The members will have one on one coaching to learn the system. Some of the members are apprehensive but all work will be reviewed by the

experts.

Everyone is invited to look at this fascinating web site.
