Village Joins County In Support of Clause To Protect Drywells

The drywell issue Terrace Park officials resolved last year is back. A proposed amendment to Ohio's budget would undo the relief granted to property owners who depend upon drywells for sewage treatment.

A state mandate outlawing drywells by 2025 was postponed until 2045 following an appeal led by Terrace Park and its legal counsel. Now an amendment, believed to have originated in Gov. Mike DeWine's office at the behest of the Ohio Department of Health, will impact 632 local properties if approved.

At Village Council's March 14 meeting, Mayor Tom Tepe said the amendment was brought to his attention by Hamilton County Health Commissioner Greg Kesterman, who is seeking addition of a clause that would protect the extension.

"What these guidelines have to do with the budget is unrelated," Tepe said. "But it was inserted and needs to be addressed."

Council agreed and letters supporting a clause to the budget amendment that protects the drywell plan adopted by the county board of health will be sent to elected officials.

In his monthly report, Administrator Jerry Hayhow said aging sidewalks damaged by tree roots in pedestrian heavy areas near St. Thomas Church and the elementary school have been

marked for replacement, and bids are being sought for black mat sealing of specified village streets. In his role as police chief, Hayhow praised EMS volunteers for their professional handling of a tragic incident along Wooster Pike that resulted in a drug overdose death. "I was proud to be next to them," he said.

In other village news:

- A three percent increase in the wages and salaries budget for village employees was approved, and Administrator Hayhow was authorized to award raises at his discretion.
- Also approved was correspondence to Gov. DeWine and members of the Ohio General Assembly urging restoration of the

local government fund to its prerecession level. The reduction, which began in 2011, annually eliminates \$37,000 in state funds to Terrace Park and necessitated passage of a levy in 2013 to compensate for the shortfall.

In other business:

- Meddie Jon Kalegi was sworn into service as an emergency medical services volunteer by Mayor Tepe.
- Solicitor Jeff Forbes is updating the village signage ordinance and hopes to have something definitive by the May meeting.
- The Planning and Zoning Committee is revising building height and property clean-up guidelines with plans for a first

reading in April and a public hearing prior to May's council meeting.

- The Public Works Committee met Feb. 21 to discuss the Elm Avenue water line connector and continued maintenance of the village water line system. Pax Lindell, councilmember who oversees public works, said the two projects will require major investments in time and money.
- Emergency Medical Services recruits will finish their training in mid-May.
- Volunteer EMS personnel and firefighters recently participated in a well-attended and highly informative joint training session.

Dear Neighbors,



Eggs and More at William's Store




William's first market stand on the Village Green in March.

Terrace Park's William Timmons is a young entrepreneur and philanthropist. He recently opened a local market stand selling fresh, local eggs and more. William knew he wanted to sell eggs as soon as his family acquired some backyard chickens, but it took a season of laying before his workers produced enough inventory to start a business. He spent that time learning about egg collection and chicken care while developing a business plan. But William is not just in it for the profits. He's motivated to raise for money for two charities: The Ronald McDonald House and The Children's Tumor Foundation (CTF), which raises money for Neurofibromatosis (NF) research.

He hopes to offer half-cartons of fresh eggs at each market event in addition to at least one other item. At his first sale, held Sunday, March 19 on the Village Green, home made dill pickles were also for sale. The Timmons family grows cucumbers and William has an herb garden that produced fresh dill. The family even handles their own canning.

After raising an impressive \$64.00 at his March sale, William plans to host a market stand once every month. Future items offered for sale may include jams and jellies, tumbled and polished river stones, hand crafted bird houses, and products from the summer garden such as salsa and tomato sauce. Early's book is the true story of the bloodshed, creation, and destruction that occurred in this area over 200 years ago as one empire began and another began to disappear. It also covers the earliest days of Cincinnati, cated on the banks of the Little Mariemont's own Beasley's Station, and the Ferris family, who bought land that would later become Mariemont and Fairfax in 1799. In fact, the event is being held at the Eliphalet Ferris House, which belongs to MPF al hunting ground by the Miami and is located at 3919 Plainville and Shawnee and neither had Road. Built in 1802, it is one of

the oldest homes in Hamilton County and a wonderful setting to hear about this area's colorful



Relocating back from Europe, we found Terrace Park based on our house search criteria: high walking score, great school district, historically established village, and proximity to the broader Cincinnati metropolitan. Shortly after moving in on Christmas Eve of 2019, the COVID pandemic shocked the world. Then, we discovered the communal spirit of Terrace Park and realized that we have found something more special. We are the Qu family: Angela, David, Samuel (5th grade TPE), Dan-ny (3rd grade TPE), and Anna Rose, our labradoodle that loves to invite herself into your living

I (Angela) grew up in Taiwan but have lived in Canada, Brazil, Israel, Switzerland, and the USA. My husband David grew up in poverty and a closed communist Chinese society. He escaped and immigrated with his parents to America at 14 years old with zero English. Prior to Cincinnati, our family lived in Virginia, Atlanta, Milwaukee, Hershey, Zurich, and Taipei. Danny had lived in six cities when he arrived in Terrace Park at 5 years old.

When COVID reached
Terrace Park two months after
we arrived, we didn't live as isolated strangers in the two years
of the pandemic thanks to the
TP community. For David, the
TP Bulldog cycling group embraced him and the Crossroads
Church men's group in Terrace
Park anchored him and encour-

aged him. For an immigrant who used to be alone figuring things out to fight for the future, the support and friendship in Terrace Park were priceless to him.

For me, amidst the peak of the racial divide and the Asian hate news across America, I received overwhelming responses to my Asian culture camps in the summer of 2021. It was a strange time when our identities were challenged and intentions doubted by many, but we as Asian Americans received overwhelming support from Terrace Park with your genuine acceptance and curiosity to learn about our cultural heritage. Despite our skin color, we felt belonged in Terrace Park, and began to believe we can contribute to the community!

David and I knew the importance of building a trusted support system wherever we moved to, but we did not understand the importance of a deeprooted community until we arrived here. Terrace Park taught us its value and now we understand why many native Cincinnatians identify themselves by the high schools they attended.

COVID slowed down life

COVID slowed down life and shut down business travel. This extraordinary time helped David realize we were never rooted in a community as he pursued a corporate career. After examining his immigrant life journey, he desired to invest in local communities not just for himself, but for our children.

Nicolas Kristof once said: "We all stand on the shoulders of our ancestors." The Cincinnati community stands on its founders more than 200 years ago. As late immigrants to this special community, we admire the strong family heritage and the legacy Cincinnati offers. And this is especially true at Terrace Park.

With a fresh perspective, David decided to step off the corporate ladder and venture into a foreign space of entrepreneurship, to pursue a new kind of American dream. None of these would have happened without the Terrace Park community and heritage.



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
