

FIESTA 76 benefits Terrace Park Recreation Commission

Bill Fahnstock, Terrace Park Recreation Committee Chairman, is masterminding the FIESTA 76 Labor Day festival, to raise funds for the Terrace Park Recreation Committee which supports nine recreation programs for the youth of Terrace Park.

The programs are girls' softball, boys' knothole baseball, girls' soccer, boys' soccer, football, basketball, the Memorial Day Junior Olympics, the summer crafts, Games and Sports Program, and riflery.

Other members of the Terrace Park Recreation Committee, with their current responsibilities, are: Ed Larkin, Vice Chairman; Jim Ryan, Treasurer; Dottie Vickers, Secretary; Bill Abernethy, basketball;

Enrollment in these programs in Terrace Park is about 1000. The Recreation Committee's annual budget, over \$4,000, is provided by contributions to the money-raising projects each year: the Raffle and Labor Day Festival.

Raffle tickets were distributed to Terrace Park residents in mid-August and are being collected right now. Raffle tickets will also be sold on the Village

Green at FIESTA 76 September 6. The Raffle drawing will be at 5:00 p.m. on Labor Day. The following prizes will be awarded to winners:

Entrants will assemble on the school driveway at 9:30 a.m. Judging of bikes and pets at 9:45 a.m. Awards for best entrants, in a variety of categories, will be awarded when the parade arrives at the Village Green. Besides Terrace Park Volunteer Fire Department personnel and vehicles, neighboring musical, marching and volunteer units will participate in the FIESTA 76 Parade.

BBS Co. goes to court in quest for condominiums

BBS Co., developer seeking to build condominiums on property it owns at Elm Road and Wooster Pike at the south end of Terrace Park, has filed suit — as expected — to challenge Terrace Park's zoning.

The developer had sought a zone change but after hearings last spring, Village Council took no action. That paved the way for BBS Co. to sue.

BBS Co. alleges that Terrace Park's zoning ordinance is unconstitutional as applied to the Elm-Wooster property.

The developer also asks the court to overturn the present zoning (part family residence and part office)

and to order the village to permit development of condominiums without the requirement that the developer also get approval from the state Environmental Protection Agency for a "package" sewage treatment plant.

Septic tank sewage-disposal, the suit contends, is sufficient for the development planned.

As of mid-August, no action had been taken by the village, other than the winning of a continuance by Solicitor Leming, to give Council time to instruct him how to proceed. Council has held a closed-door meeting on the matter but made no public report.

Council ponders motor-bicycles

Village Council is considering imposing local regulations on low-powered motorbikes.

The issue was raised in July by Dick Griffith, chairman of council's Safety Committee; he noted what the council minutes term "the proliferation of motor bicycles" on village streets and "the hazards they create."

Solicitor Robert Leming advised council that the present village law on the subject matches state law — in effect saying that motor bicycles or "mopeds" of less than one horsepower may be operated without license plates or operator's license.
