



Domestic Cases Up 100% Drizzling Rain Can't Dampen Terrace Park's Holiday Spirit

In his first report to Council after returning from surgery, Police Chief Bob Bacon said he is disturbed by the tremendous increase in domestic disputes in Terrace Park. Chief Bacon said in November and December of 1993 there were five domestic calls, but this year for the same time period the number has soared to ten.

There have been no arrests with the people dealt with this season, according to Chief Bacon. He said the problems have not all been between spouses. Confrontations have also been between ex-spouses or between a parent and a child.

Chief Bacon is pleased "people are more willing to call the police." He feels the community is getting to know the police department better and actually feel better with a familiar face. He added that not all calls for help are made by women as men have called for help when they feel things are getting out of hand.

Encouraging people to call the police, Chief Bacon said they are always willing to help resolve problems before they escalate to violence. He concluded by asking people to keep their dander down, learn how to talk and call us if you need intervening.

Chief Bacon also warned Council there had been three incidents of phone fraud in just the last month. He warned residents to be cautious in what information is given out over the phone and if they have any questions, don't hesitate to call the police department.

Council passed resolutions increasing by four percent the salaries of both police and maintenance employees. Council also renewed its contract with the Milford Community Fire Department for daytime coverage at the same annual rate as last year, \$6,700.

By authorizing the purchase of two new radios, which have the Milford City Band, Terrace Park police can actually talk to each other without being picked up by scanners. Chief Bacon concluded this increases safety for both the police officers and the community.

Council heard reports from:
*Mayor Randy Casteel that Council members Wilson, Startzman and Brown must work with record keeping. Mayor Casteel noted Village Archivist Esther Power needs cooperation and proper response from those involved. He concluded the archivist "works hard and she's ready to go; please help her."

*Julie Rugh that the Community House roof leak was temporarily fixed and more repairs will need to be made after the first of the year. The Boy Scout Cabin, which is village property, also has a roof leak caused by vandalism.

*Sally Gilchrist that a public hearing on zoning will be held before the January Council meeting. The zoning of areas near the Sleepy Hollow subdivision will be updated to prevent any future use for offices.

*Treasurer Al Roberts that Terrace Park can not follow in the financial footsteps of bankrupt Orange County as the village money is invested in the Star Ohio Fund. The State Treasurer, who oversees the funds, has basically said they don't do derivatives.

TP White Squirrel Moves to Museum

On the rainy afternoon of Nov. 27, an albino squirrel, who has been a familiar and beloved sight to the residents surrounding the Village Green, was struck by an automobile and killed near the corner of Park and Elm. Park Avenue resident Wes Cowan, Curator of Archaeology, and Director of Special Projects at the Cincinnati Museum of Natural History, retrieved the squirrel's body, and its skin and skeleton have been added to the museum's mammalogy collections. An examination of the squirrel by museum scientists revealed it to be a robust male, although his diminutive sexual organs suggest he was incapable of breeding with others of his kind. His passing is mourned by Terrace Park residents.

Council Approves Eagle Scout Project

In a dozen page report to Council, Boy Scout John Harth outlined his Eagle Scout project proposal to construct and install 100 boundary marking signs in the Wilderness Preserve. Harth noted Chief Bacon had suggested the village had a problem with people going into and out of the Wilderness Preserve without knowing it. The Chief said they frequently get complaints of trespassing because the boundaries are not clearly marked.

Harth also told Council he plans to make and install several birdhouses to encourage more birds to live in the preserve. He also plans to construct a bird blind near a clearing to create an area for bird watching.

Members of Terrace Park Scout Troop #286, parents and surveyor George Kipp will work with Harth on the project. After an extensive period of questions, Council approved the project.

Weakley Suggests Jones Check Facts

In response to Steph Jones' letter in the last issue of the Village Views, it is too bad Ms. Jones did not take the time to check her facts. While it is true the Golf Team was given a dozen balls at the beginning of the season, those twelve balls were totally inadequate for the 15 nine-hole matches and three 18 hole tournaments that were listed on the schedule. Three dozen would have been much more appropriate, for by the time the season was less than half over, the boys, did indeed, have to provide their own balls. They were also without team uniforms (shirts) all the way through the district competitions and had not some of us parents ordered shirts for them, they would have been without at the State tournament. It is true the school coughed up the money for the shirts and some balls, which we also made sure would be available to them in Columbus, but the tardiness in supplying this fine team was inexcusable.

Moreover, on at least three occasions, the van which is supposed to transport the team to and from matches, would not start and parents had to be summoned at the last minute to provide transportation. That they rented a van to make sure the team got to Columbus and back seems like the least they could do and not worthy of special praise.

The golf bags are without stands, so that every time there is moisture on the ground from dew, sprinklers, or rain, the grips of the team's clubs become wet and slippery, which is a very difficult distraction in a game that requires intense concentration and focus. I personally have not seen an umbrella in the three years my son has played on the varsity team, and in fact, loaned two umbrellas to members of the team at the district competition.

This was a great golf team with an incredible amount of heart and determination that made it to the state championship for the first time in almost thirty years. They did a really great job. The picture and its caption are correct and should stand as a tribute to this fine team and the obstacles they overcame. Next time you want to criticize, Ms. Jones, dig a little deeper and see what kind of hole you are dealing with.

My family hopes I'll make a New Year's resolution to maintain this newly cleared spot on the table big enough for a cereal bowl and a glass of juice. I hope you find some of this information useful, and/or interesting.

*** The Children's Museum** located in Longworth Hall on Pete Rose Way has booked more than 350 school groups through the end of the academic year. Effective Jan. 1 to accommodate these groups, the Museum has adjusted general admission hours, reserving weekdays 10 a.m. to noon for scheduled groups. The Museum is open to general admission noon to 5 p.m. on Wednesday, Thursday and Sunday. General admission is noon to 8 p.m. on Friday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday. During the summer and over Cincinnati Public School System breaks, (ie. Christmas) the museum is closed Monday and open to general admission 10 to 5 on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday. General admission is 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Friday and noon to 5 p.m. on Sunday. If you're totally confused now, call the Museum at 421-5437 before heading downtown.

Winter quarter classes begin throughout the quarter, some as early as Jan. 3, others as late as Mar. 12. ***Use Caution When Shoveling.** Although the winter has been mild to date, Terrace Park can anticipate some snow in '95. The American Heart Association, which warns snow removal can be hazardous if not done properly, advises observing the following health precautions:

-Wear a hat or scarf as most heat is lost through the top of the head.

-Create "pockets" of warm air during outside activities by wearing lightweight, well insulated clothing in layers.

-Protect ears and hands, which are susceptible to frostbite.

-Don't drink caffeine or smoke cigarettes if you're planning outdoor exercise. These stimulants cause arteries to constrict and the heart to beat faster, which the cold will also do, doubling the stress on your heart.

-When using a snow blower, wear goggles to prevent stones or ice from hitting the eyes.

-Don't fill shovel completely, so there is less weight to lift and less strain on the heart.

-Rest every 15 minutes, even if you don't feel tired.

-Stop shoveling or exercise immediately if you experience any of the following: rapid heart beat, shortness of breath, fatigue or pain/pressure in chest, arms, neck. If these symptoms persist longer than a few minutes, get medical care at once.

-If you have a history of high blood pressure or heart disease, seek your doctor's advice before shoveling snow.

He has appeared with several orchestras, including the Cincinnati, Symphony Orchestra, the Indianapolis Symphony, the Columbus Symphony, and the Cincinnati Pops Orchestra. The other half of the recital will be performed by Niklas Sivelov from Sweden. Last July Sivelov won second prize in the artist's division of the American Music Scholarship Association's annual piano compe-

titition here in Cincinnati. He has won prizes in major piano competitions in Europe and has several recordings to his name. *Fire Chief Phil Schneider that his department made one run last month to St. Thomas Church, which had an electrical problem in its organ. Schneider also reported the new pumper is operational, and the new doors providing an extra three inches are installed in the fire house. New recruit John Burbank joined the department for this month's drill.

*Building Inspector Tim Harth that six permits were issued totaling a little more than \$63,000. Harth reminds residents a permit is needed to install any antenna, including satellite dishes. A dish was recently installed without a permit and the village received 14 complaints. The dish has subsequently been removed.

*Assistant Life Squad Chief Sally Gilchrist that 18 squad members have completed the recertification course and taken the test. She noted almost the entire squad will be certified through 1999 - "we're in great shape."

Amherst Avenue resident Paul Power informed Council that a number of cars are not stopping at the intersection of Amherst and Elm.

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


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
